

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

NEWS NOTES.

It is said that Chief Justice Strong and probably two other Judges of the Supreme Court will be retired shortly. Prices on hard coal have dropped 25 cents a ton in Boston; and in Montreal, which has been considered low at \$3.65 a ton, dropped to \$3.25. Severe shocks of earthquake occurred at Venice and Verona on Tuesday. Many buildings were damaged and several persons injured, but no one killed. Mr. Hayter Reed, the government Indian agent, reports every evidence of progress towards the full privileges of citizenship among the Indians of Quebec, who are rather inclined to retrograde toward their old tribal system. Manitoba politicians appear to be quite certain that Premier Greenway contemplates bringing on the provincial elections at an early date. The opposition are so well convinced of this that they are already discussing candidates and a policy in respect to the school question. The Newfoundland seal fishery has resulted in a catch rather over the average. It is estimated that equivalent to 300,000 white coats have been taken. This, even at the lowered prices ruling, will represent a cash value of \$450,000. As Mr Bond remarked, Newfoundland has resources, and valuable ones, too. The latest news from Stockholm is far from reassuring. The situation in Norway has not improved. A royal commission of eight members of the diet is sitting secretly trying to devise means of upholding King Oscar in his refusal to yield to the Norwegian majority. The Commission was convoked under the special convention article framed to meet only the gravest political crisis. It has not been in session before since the Crimean war. The members are said to have advised the government to mobilize the fleet at once and prepare to mobilize the army. Nicholas Flood Davis was asked at Winnipeg if the province refused to pass remedial legislation what the Dominion Government would do. He replied: "I can't say but having done what they have, I think they will feel bound to give remedial legislation. For myself I am opposed to it. I am opposed to interference with Manitoba. I told Archbishop Tache in 1899 that he was making a mistake in making this a federal question. He would by this raise up a party in federal politics who would oppose him on ground outside of the school question—the ground of provincial rights. What he should have done was to throw himself on the justice of the people of Manitoba, and they would have seen it right done." Sir William Harcourt will have a surplus of over half a million sterling to play with when he comes to present the budget to the British House of Commons. The estimated income for the year which ended on March 30 was £94,175,000, the sum actually paid into the Exchequer was £94,683,572, giving a surplus of £509,000. The expenditure has fallen below the estimate, and it is expected that this will increase the surplus to the extent of a quarter of a million more. In these days of difficulty and depression Sir William Harcourt is a happy man among finance ministers. But it should be remembered that this increased revenue arises, as the London Times points out, "from the imposition of new taxes or the increase of old ones." "We are afraid," the Times adds, that none of the increase can be attributed to improved trade. Mr Gladstone received at Hawarden, a few days ago, the deputation of the Armenian refugees who recently arrived in London from the scene of the massacre. He expressed his deep sympathy with the Armenians and said that, unfortunately, the Turk was an old enemy. The danger of the situation, he declared, was that useful action might cease owing to the Turks' promise of reform, which was not worth the breath spent in their utterance. The Sultan should not have a penny's worth of credit for promises, which were not actually promised. Mr Gladstone added that he had read with much pain the refugees' deposition in regard to their horrible sufferings. They must appeal to everyone who recognized any duty to Christians in distress. He was now 85 years old. He no longer had the same keenness of sight as in the past and had altogether retired from public life, but as long as he could use his voice it would be used in the cause of humanity.

LATEST SUMMERSIDE NEWS.

The Foresters' entertainment and lecture here on Tuesday evening is pronounced to have been a grand success. The lecture delivered by Rev. G. M. Campbell, of Charlottetown, is considered the best ever delivered here on that subject. There were more people under the influence of liquor here yesterday than there has been for some time. One had to be carried to jail. Rev. F. M. Dill has been appointed the delegate from the Y. P. S. E. in connection with the Presbyterian Church of this town, to attend the Convention which meets in Boston in July. The C. M. E. A. concert which was to take place at Emerald last Monday evening, was postponed on account of the storm until Monday evening, the 22nd inst. Considering the bad state of the streets quite a large number attended the Women's Missionary meeting in Epworth Hall last night. Dr. McNeill, of Kensington, will deliver in the Y. M. C. A. rooms the last of the W. C. T. U. course of lectures this (Thursday) evening. As the subject, "Hereditary Alcoholism," is one of wide interest, we hope to see a large audience.
