The death occurred at her late residence in Beach Point of Mrs. William D. Irving in her 90th year.
The late Mrs. Irving was born at Murray Harbour in 1864, the last surviving member of a family of nine. Mrs. Irving was a hospitable and kind person whose home was the scene of much friendliness. She endeared herself to young and old by her quiet and thoughtful ways. She was always interested in current affairs, and the present day trends in life. Prompt Action Reduces Possible Loss In Fire

Quick and heroic action of Arnold Ford, 18-year-old son of Kenneth Ford, British-American Oil Company agent at Summerside, prevented serious loss by fire at Clinton on Tuesday afternoon.
While delivering gasoline to the home of Mr. Lewis O'Connor, about 3 p.m., the young man was in the act of filling a large tank when the gasoline fumes became ignited, causing a vapor explosion that set fire to the gasoline truck and farm tank that was being filled.
Without fear for his own safety the young man jumped into the blazing 1 1/2 ton truck still carrying 200 gallons of gasoline, and hastily drove the flaming vehicle onto the road and well clear of all buildings, leaving the truck only moments before two explosions occurred.
The truck, complete with pumping unit, was a complete loss. The farm tank had also caught fire and in the process of burning itself out, it also ignited a nearby building and a paling fence.
However, the fire department from Kensington responded to a call for assistance and saved the building and fence, and extinguished the other blazes.
Great clouds of dense black smoke poured skyward attracting the attention of people for miles around.

World Championship Plowing Organization

TORONTO-Nine countries, including Canada, have confirmed their entries in the first world plowing championship to be held this October at Cobourg, John A. Carroll of Toronto, president of World Championship Ploughing Organization, reported on his return from England. Mr. Carroll attended meetings of W.C.P.O. and the annual meeting of the British Ploughing Association.
Confirmed entries for the world match are expected from other countries. Four countries, said Mr. Carroll, have already chosen their national champions to compete at the match, and others will be selected within the next two months.

The first world plowing championship (restricted to two tractor classes) is being held by W.C.P.O. in conjunction with the Ontario Ploughing Association's annual four-day International Match. The International will be held on the grounds of the Durham-Northumberland Counties Home Farm at Cobourg, Ontario, October 6 to 9.
To date, said Mr. Carroll, Great Britain, Northern Ireland, Eire, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Holland and Germany have confirmed their entries.

Britain will be represented by Leslie Dixon, tractor plowman of County Durham, and Reginald Hog, horse plowing champion from Yorkshire. Mr. Dixon has won some 80 first prizes in British plowing competitions since the war. He still has a long way to go to equal the record of his 73-year-old father who won 263 plowing first prizes and championships in 40 years. Both British entrants plan to enter some of the O.P.A. open classes in addition to the world classes.

Northern Ireland
The Northern Ireland competitor, Robert J. Carse, Ulster's champion tractor plowman and a bachelor farmer from Carrycuiff near Belfast, will travel as a member of the British team. The team will be managed by a Scot, William Muirhead of Stirling, past vice-president of British Ploughing Association, and a well-known German success story, Clydesdale hand, president of British Ploughing Association, will accompany the party. Also from Britain will come Alfred Hall and G. T. Weir.
