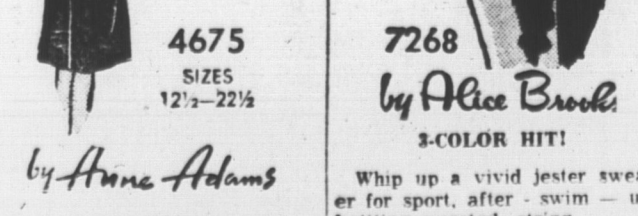
The groom was attended by his brother, Myron, while Ralph Younker, also brother of the groom, and Lloyd Fournay ushered the guests to their seats.

## Our Roast Lamb Syrian Appetizing And Exotic

PLANNING the menus for this column and taste-testing foods made by the recipes suggested present a pleasant challenge.

Pleasant, because it makes this writer feel close to the country's homemakers and their menu problems; a challenge to bring them new ideas, to glamorize old favorite foods, and to produce columns so planned that they will prove both interesting and helpful to all readers.

Today, for example, we are featuring Roast Lamb Syrian, equally appetizing whether made with boned leg or boned rolled shoulder of lamb.

**TOMORROW'S DINNER**  
Minted Gelatin Mold Saladettes - Roast Lamb Syrian, Parsi Boiled Potatoes, Carrot Rounds with Lemon-Butter - Rice - Fig Cup Custards, Coffee or Tea, Milk.  
Measurements level; recipes for 6

**MINTED GELATIN MOLD SALADETTES**  
(Delightful with Lamb)  
1 1/2 tsp. unflavored gelatin  
2 tsp. cold water  
1 c. boiling water  
10 cloves  
1/2 c. sugar  
1/2 c. small sliced sweet pickles  
1/2 c. fresh lime juice  
1/4 c. fresh lemon juice  
1-16th tsp. salt  
1 c. sweet white wine or cider  
1/2 c. minced fresh mint  
Add gelatin to cold water to soften. Combine boiling water, cloves and sugar; boil 5 min. Stir in gelatin; strain. Stir in pickles, fruit juices and salt; cool. Add wine or cider; refrigerate 30 min. When beginning to thicken, stir in mint.  
Rinse very small molds with cold water. Fill with gelatin mixture. Chill 4 hrs. or until firm; unmold. Serve on lettuce as a saladette, or as a relish.

**ROAST LAMB SYRIAN**  
3 lb. boned leg of lamb or rolled boned shoulder of lamb  
2 peeled sections garlic sliced thin, or 1 peeled medium onion sliced and cut in 1/2" lengths  
2 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
1 c. boiling water  
2 tsp. flour  
1/2 c. hot water (additional)  
1/2 c. sour cream  
Remove all fat possible from lamb. Cut small gashes in lamb; fill with garlic or onion. Mix salt, pepper and cinnamon; rub into lamb.  
Place lamb on rack in roasting pan. Roast 20 min. in hot oven at 425 degrees F. Reduce heat to 350 degrees F.; continue to roast until fork-tender, allowing 20 min. to the lb. or when a meat thermometer registers 180 degrees F.

**THE CHEF EXPLAINS**  
When preparing Roast Lamb Syrian, be sure to add the cinnamon, a must in Near East cooking when pepper is used.

## Congress Becomes Restive Under Iron-Handed Control

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congress is becoming restive under iron-handed White House direction and is beginning to reassert its prerogatives by pin-pricking President Johnson on sensitive issues.

Qualified observers believe that the frustration and uneasiness members feel over the increasing U.S. involvement in the war in Viet Nam have contributed, as a kind of political reflex action, to several recent actions to curb presidential authority.

Some members seem to feel that if they aren't going to be consulted in Viet Nam they are going to have more to say about what is going on closer to home. The Senate's consideration of the foreign aid authorization bill is a case in point.

A majority of members not only cut \$200,000,000 off Johnson's \$3,440,000,000 request but they wrote into the bill an amendment reducing to 15 per cent - instead of the 20 per cent the administration wanted - the amount of money the president could transfer to international agencies from a \$780,000,000 development loan fund.

By a voice vote the Senate also put into the bill a provision directing the president not to extend aid to countries which have confiscated American property. Presidents don't like to be tied down by such restrictions.

For practical purposes Congress's ability to shape presidential policies lies in three general fields: (1) It can reject or alter his legislative proposals. (2) Deny funds to carry out his program or revise money bills to restrict his operations, or (3) Reject his appointments of key officials.

## Wives Take Trip Abroad To Save Grocery Money

OSLO (AP) - Norwegian housewives plagued by increasing prices take a trip abroad to save household money.

Thousands of them make the 24-hour round-trip to neighboring Denmark to shop up the vastly cheaper Danish foodstuffs.

That solution is available only to those Norwegians within easy reach of the southern ports, however.

Most of the 3,500,000 population must struggle for economic survival in a price-wage inflationary climb.

The price index, on which wage adjustments are decided, soared from 100 in 1959 to 120.8 today. There has recently been another round of wage increases with some salaried workers getting raises of 10 per cent.

Automatic and semi-automatic increases in wage rates accorded in general wage agreements will just help boost inflation in months to come, economists claim.

The Socialist government is facing growing demands from the opposition parties for action to stop inflation.

Meanwhile the people aboard fishing boats, behind machines and tools, counters and typewriters, are worrying.

"I must catch more fish today than five years ago to pay for the same amount of goods and fixed expenses," one fisherman complained.

The foodstuffs index (100 in 1959) rose to 121 last December. The meat index rose to 136 and the fish index soared to 136. Fish is one of the most important factors in every Norwegian's diet.

## CANADA'S NEW LABOUR CODE/Hon. Allan MacEachen, Minister of Labour, answers some questions:

"Our new Canada Labour Code has been called a 'first,' Mr. MacEachen. Would you agree?"

"Briefly, who does this new Code apply to?"

"Let's get down to specifics. What, exactly, does it promise to those employees who are affected by it?"

"You said the new Code applies to industries under Federal jurisdiction. Would you name them?"

"Yes, and it is one of the most all-embracing. Canada has a right to be proud of it. It sets higher standards than have been set for any other country I know. Other countries are taking note of the way Canadian Parliament is ensuring that more workers share in this country's growth."

"It applies to industries which fall under Federal jurisdiction—and may well prove to be a guide for other industries. The Government itself, which is a large employer in its own right, will take the lead by applying the Code's standards to its own federal employees."

"As we said, it sets minimum standards—and I stress that these are minimum, because, of course, a lot of workers already enjoy higher standards than the Code sets. First, it sets a standard 8 hour day and a 40 hour week, with overtime limited to 8 hours a week, and paid for at time-and-a-half.

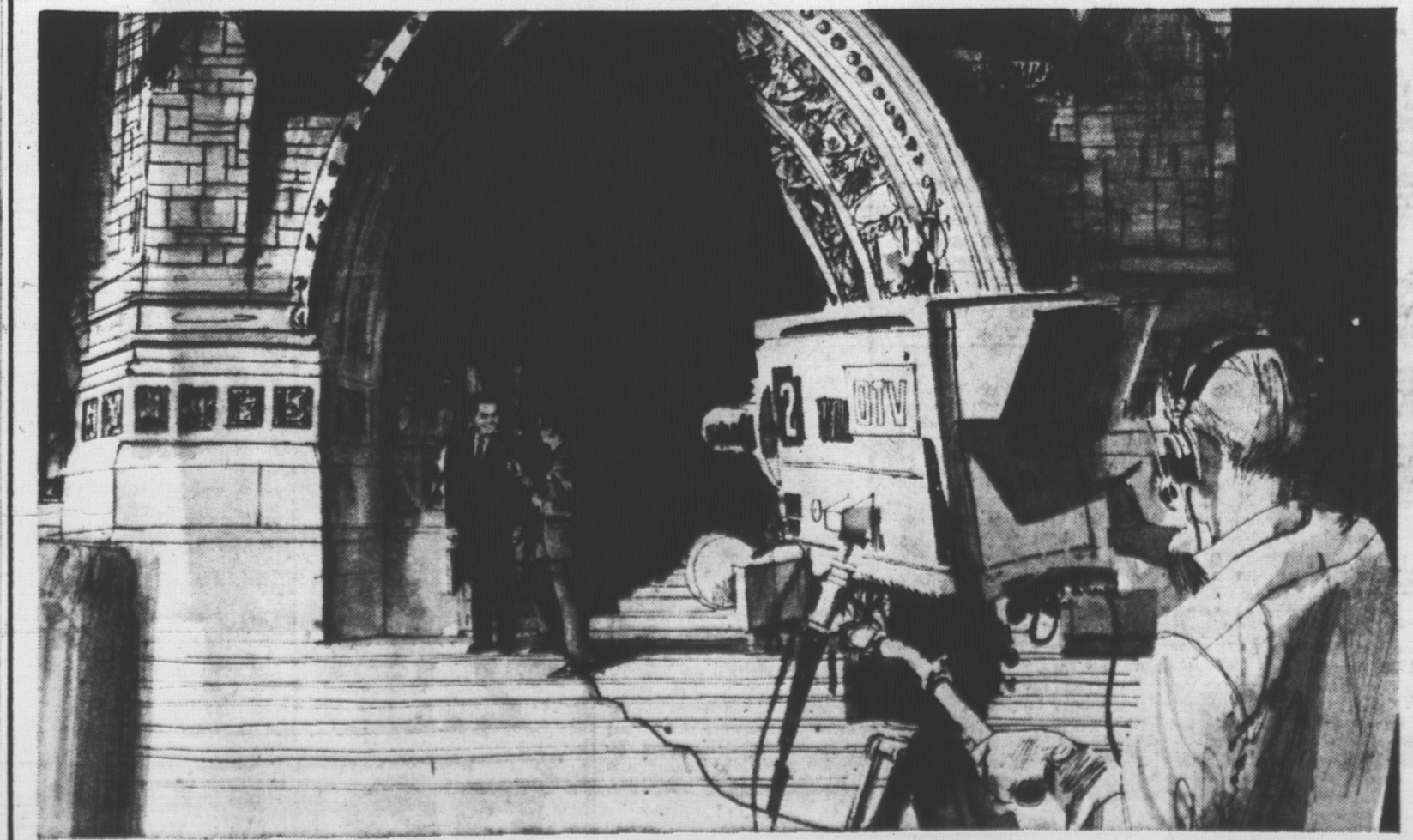
Second, it sets the minimum wage rate for all men and women over 17 years of age at \$1.25 an hour.

Next, it provides for two weeks annual vacation with pay, after one year's service; or 4% of wages as vacation pay for those with from 30 days to a year's service.

Finally, it stipulates that each employee shall get eight statutory holidays with pay a year—or get a full day off in lieu of the holiday."

"The Code covers interprovincial or international rail and highway transport, primary fishing where the fishermen work for wages, air transport, radio and TV, shipping, banks, uranium mining, grain elevators, flour and feed mills and warehousing, seed cleaning mills, interprovincial or international pipelines and ferries, interprovincial or international telegraphs and telephones, most Crown corporations and one or two other smaller industries."
