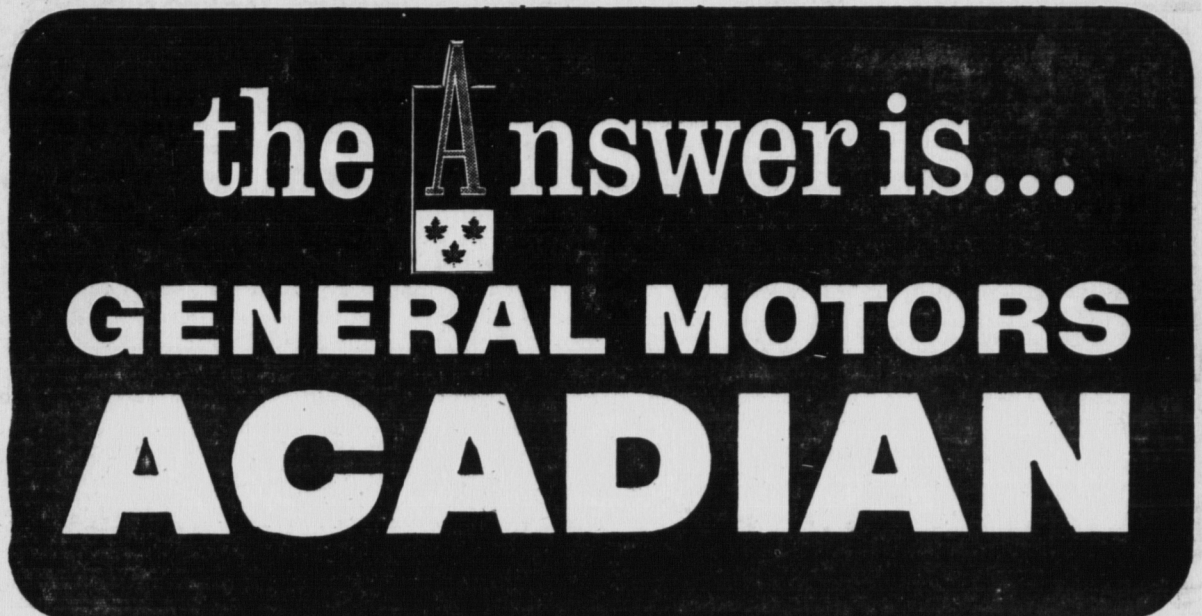
P.E.I. Hospital Aid Has April Meeting
