A NARROW ESCAPE.—The Halifax Herald says: The schooner J. G. Goudey, bound from Orwell, P. E. Island to Yarmouth, with a cargo of produce, sprang a leak on Monday, and the water gained so rapidly that at one time it looked as though she would go. It was only with the greatest exertion that she was kept afloat until reaching port. Her cargo of produce, principally potatoes, is badly damaged. The Goudey is 27 tons, and is owned at Shag Harbor.

MORE SHEEP SHIPMENTS.—We learn from the Summerside Farmer that the heavy shipments of sheep still continue. On Monday Mr. John Henry sent to Bancroft & Sawyer, Lawrence, Mass., 416 sheep; on Tuesday Messrs. Drummond & Avarid forwarded to St. John 400, and on Wednesday Mr. James Kane sent to the same market 450. On the latter day there were also taken away by Mr. J. T. Prescott, of Troy, Maine, 100 ewes for breeding purposes. These were very fine specimens and shows that P. E. Island is not only famed for her horses, but is coming into note for her fine sheep as well.

THANKSGIVING DAY.—The usual tea and great, which for the last few years has regularly taken place at the Poor House on Thanksgiving Day, was held yesterday afternoon. The poor old people thoroughly enjoyed the good things provided by the kindness of many friends. After tea was over several of the ladies present sang songs and hymns, which much pleased them. About forty sat down to tea, the sick ones, ten in number, had cake and tea taken to their rooms. Mrs. Allen (wife of Sergeant Allen, the Superintendent), the kind, good matron who died last December, was much beloved by all who knew her. She was present at the last Thanksgiving Tea; and on this occasion was much missed by all.

Elections in Newfoundland.

The Government Defeated.

HALIFAX, Nov. 7. Advice from Newfoundland indicate that the Government were badly beaten in the general election. Returns so far received show that Colonial Secretary Fenton and Surveyor-General Penny were defeated.

A Rule Suspended.

OTTAWA, Nov. 7. An order was recently adopted calling attention to the act requiring seamen shipping with foreign vessels in Canadian ports to do so before the shipping master of the port. Representations subsequently made from Washington urged the repeal of the rule on the grounds that such seamen, by American rules, was bound to ship before the American Consul, who exacted a fee, and that the Canadian rule would force seamen to pay a fee to the shipping master. In view of the apparent hardships and the fact that the American statute is similar to ours it is held in suspense. So far as Canadian vessels are concerned the Minister of Marine has recalled the recent order.

A Remarkable Run on the Ocean.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6. The steamships City of New York and Teutonic finished the most remarkable ocean race on record to-day. They left Queenstown at exactly the same time last Thursday, and this afternoon came into New York Harbor at full speed neck and neck. The decks of both vessels were crowded with passengers, who waved their handkerchiefs and cheered enthusiastically at each other. The owners of both vessels claim a victory. The time was six days six hours and fifty minutes.

Australian Confederation.

MELBOURNE, Nov. 7. The Premier of Victoria has consulted with the governments of the other Australian colonies in reference to the question of federation. Replies received all concurred in the opinion that the existing federal council has sufficient power to decide upon the basis of confederation, and that no special convention to consider the subject is necessary.

The Parnell Commission.

LONDON, Nov. 7. Before the Parnell Commission to-day, Sir Henry James resumed his speech on behalf of the Times. He read extracts from speeches made by Parnell, Davitt and others, in which the speakers advocated boycotting. Sir Henry contended that the persons who made those speeches were responsible for the crimes following their delivery.

A Caution.

LONDON, Nov. 7. The authorities of the Island of Jersey had a conference to-day that resulted in the landlord of the hotel at which the Boulangist conference is held being cautioned that he would be held responsible in the event of any overt demonstration arising from the conference.

Aggressive Germany.

ZANZIBAR, Nov. 7. It is reported that the German flag has been hoisted at port Durnford, and that Capt. Wissman, with a large force, will attack Daadani to night.

They Will Accept.

QUEBEC, Nov. 7. It is understood that the committee of the council of public instruction have decided to accept the \$50,000, the amount of its share of the Jesuits' estate grant.

A Bye-Election.

MONTREAL, Nov. 7. Writs have been issued for the Brome election—nomination the 5th December, and the election a week later.

Thanksgiving Day.

OTTAWA, Nov. 7. Thanksgiving Day was more rigidly observed in the Government offices than any other holiday of the year.

THE PROPER COURSE.—A sorry-looking specimen of humanity, who gave his name as Butler and said he belonged to Cape Breton, arrived here in the steamer from Pictou on Tuesday evening. As the greater portion of his face was covered with cancer, and the smell from his person was not at all suggestive of cleanly habits, he could not obtain lodgings, and later on in the evening applied at the Police Station for shelter. He told the Marshal that he was trying to get to Boston to have an operation performed, and that his visit to Charlottetown was to collect funds for that purpose. The Marshal gave him shelter for the night, and the following morning sent him back in the steamer.
