

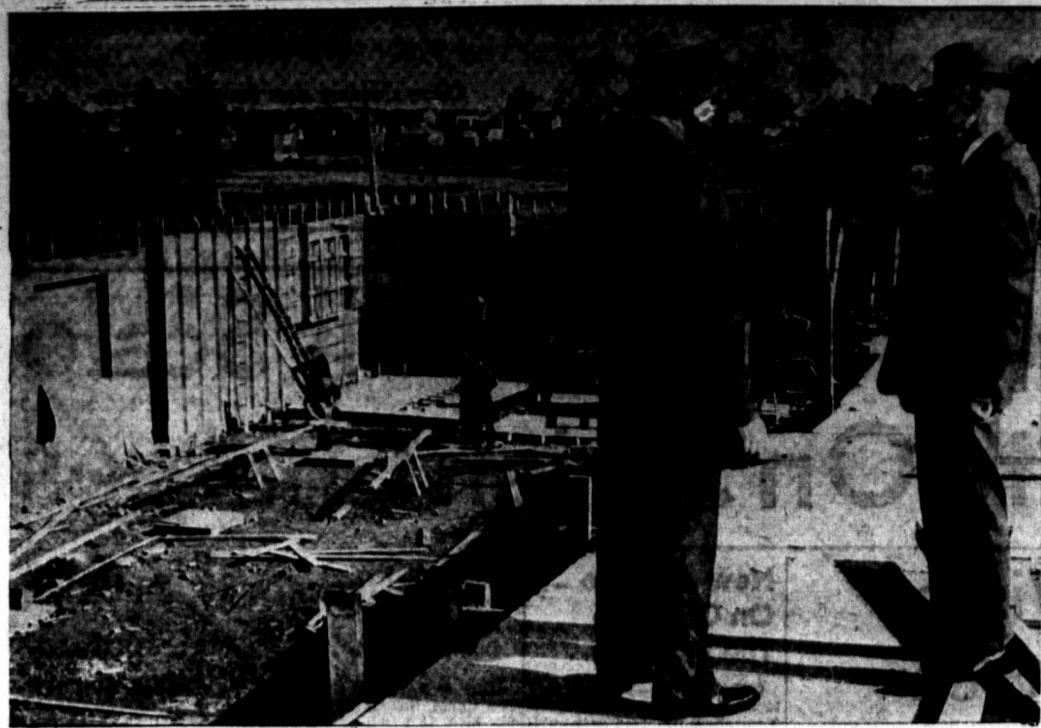

Note Found At Fire Scene Being Studied By Police

A printed note on a piece of yellow cardboard pinned to the bulletin board of Queen Square School has convinced Police and Fire investigating officials that a series of fires which started in the school building last Tuesday are not, by any means, accidental. The note found following a fifth attempt to start a blaze going in the school Thursday evening was partly printed and partly written and stated in effect that the writer was responsible for all of the previous fires. It was addressed to Mr. MacDonald, presumably the Principal of the school and stated "I am not a pupil of this school." The first fire was discovered on Tuesday shortly after the children had assembled for the afternoon classes. City firemen were called and quickly had the blaze under control but again responded to a second call about 2.30. On Wednesday a map was burned off the wall and some papers on one of the teachers' desks were set ablaze. These two fires were extinguished by the teaching staff. On Thursday evening while contractor Wilfred Burke was making some repairs caused by one of the first two fires, he noted a person (either man or boy) run down one of the corridors of the school. Mr. Burke shouted, thinking the fleeing person to be someone looking for him. However, the runner made his exit through one of the crash doors which are used for emergency exits. Shortly afterwards, Mr. Burke smelled smoke and upon investigation found a pile of papers ablaze in one of the class rooms. A half gallon bottle labelled "Methyl Alcohol" but containing only water was found nearby. Police say the bottle had been taken from the Principal's office. Further investigation revealed that piles of papers were arranged in a number of other classrooms but no attempt had been made to ignite these. Chief MacArthur said yesterday that no arrests have been made but the investigation is continuing.

Park Royal Church Contract Awarded To County Cons't.

The contract for the erection of Park Royal United Church was awarded yesterday to County Construction Ltd. The amount of the contract which calls for completion of the interior of the church only is for \$50,000. The total estimated cost of construction is in the vicinity of \$110,000. The building of brick and steel will be 105 feet in length by 55 feet wide. It will have a seating capacity of 360 and will have provision for a gallery with additional seating of 240. Great care has been taken in the designing to provide adequate space for the training of the children and young people. It will have a minister's study and church office. Nursery and kindergarten facilities will be included in the structure. There will be a large social hall with stage at one end. Adequate parking facilities for the parking of over 80 cars will be provided on the church site at Mount Edward Heights.

At the present time work on the foundation is rapidly nearing completion and it is expected that the actual work of erecting the walls will commence within a week. Work will continue with all speed until completion. The new church will serve the areas of Parkdale, East Royalty and Central Royalty. Mr. MacPherson was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. J. MacPherson, his mother having been the former Maud Tombs. He leaves to mourn, besides his widow, the former Wilmet Worthy; two sons, Harold of Charlottetown and Ralph, living in Moncton; three grandchildren. He is also survived by two brothers, Harvey and Norman, both of Charlottetown.

Concerned Over Obscene Books

OTTAWA (CP) — Justice Minister Fulton said today he still is concerned about legislating against obscene literature as he was when in opposition. But he indicate in the Commons that some legal problems at present stand in the way of taking immediate action to outlaw such literature. These problems were being actively studied. Mr. Fulton was replying to a Commons question by William Hoock (L—Niagara Falls) who referred to Mr. Fulton's speeches on the subject while in opposition. Mr. Fulton said he will recommend legislation as soon as possible. The question had been considered in Calgary at a recent conference on uniformity of laws, which preceded the Canadian Bar Association convention there. That conference had raised further problems which now were being studied.

Says Most Requests For Potato Pickers Have Been Met Here

The National Employment Office in Charlottetown reports that by and large it has been able to meet most of the orders received for potato pickers and harvest workers in general. The office believes it could use possibly ten more workers if these were readily available. The office is not aware of conditions in Prince County where the Summerside Office has jurisdiction. It has made approximately more than 50 placements of potato pickers, but it is understood that Summerside which looks after many large potato growers, has made between 700 and 800 placements. The Charlottetown Office wishes it knew that it realizes that some farmers in certain areas have been having difficulty in securing help, and for such people, this situation gives cause for worry. Nevertheless, the office feels that over the two counties, under its employment administration, the general situation is fairly good.

Begins Life Underwriters Training Course

On Monday morning, approximately 20 life underwriters of Prince Edward Island will begin a voluntary training course known as the Life Underwriters Association Training Course, according to Mr. R.J. Rupert, C.L.U., Chairman of the committee supervising the course for this Province. The course comprising 25 weekly classes is sponsored by the Life Underwriters Association of Canada with the cooperation of most of the larger life insurance companies. Developed by leaders of the insurance industry, it was established to provide a nation-wide training program for the career life underwriter. Mr. Rupert stated that the course will bring together progressive life underwriters of the community, who under the leadership of the Moderator, F. Walter Hyndman, C.L.U., will study specific case histories from actual experience, searching for the best solutions to current life insurance and other problems. The classes will be held in the premises of Hyndman and Company, Charlottetown who have very generously made a special room available for the purpose.

Queen Relaxes For Short Time

WASHINGTON (AP) — Queen Elizabeth, who usually is either demure or regal, eased up considerably at the British Embassy party Friday afternoon. Perched in a relaxed way on the edge of a sofa, the Queen was talking a blue streak, gesturing a good deal and laughing until she shook. She was observed at a tea with the wives of the Commonwealth ambassadors before guests arrived for the embassy party. Apparently unaware she could be seen through a window, she chatted happily and was seen to clap her hands in a girlish gesture as she laughed. Then she caught sight of a couple of reporters through the window. Suddenly, she again became the austere Queen who opened Canada's Parliament last Monday with monarchical dignity.
