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fight and a round of festivities. A set-back to the drive on behalf of the Townsend \$200-a-month pension plan made the task of the all-night platform drafting subcommittee somewhat easier.

CONSTITUTIONAL ISSUE

The constitutional amendment issue remained a principal burden, and with the impetus provided by Senator Barkley's keynote speech promised to show up again in the campaign ahead, even if left out of the platform, as indicated. Another of the convention's prospective fights—with a minority opposing abrogation of the two-thirds rule—was set for an initial showdown just before noon tomorrow. The rules committee will vote then; the convention itself during the afternoon. Virginia led the apparently foredoomed battle against repeal of William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, came forward to ask an amendment to the constitution to prevent the Supreme Court from killing laws by 5 to 4 decision, at least two-thirds vote being required. Among many other things, he advocated also a five-day, 40-hour week.

Broken Liberal

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The increase in taxation by Premier King was also severely criticized by Dr. MacMillan. He denounced the manner in which Premier Campbell was fooling the people with this business of choosing a site for a National Park, telling the people at public meetings that the matter rested with the investigators from Ottawa when he knew perfectly well that an order in council had been already passed as to where the park was going to be and it was not going to be at Foxley River, said Dr. MacMillan. The speaker said when he was in office he was more concerned about providing the people with the necessities of life than presenting them with a National Park. The roads were a disgrace and many of the old people had been cut off from the Old Age Pension, instead of receiving an increase as they had been promised by the Liberals. Very few had received relief this winter. The Doctor referred to the victory of the Conservatives in a three cornered election in British Columbia as an example of the way the political pendulum was swinging in favor of the Conservatives.

DUNNING, EULER SAIL SATURDAY FOR ENGLAND

Prime Minister Likely To Remain In Ottawa For Some Time.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 24.—Although Parliament prorogued only yesterday, the customary calm of the recess has descended upon Canada's legislative building. Commons and Senate chambers, yesterday scenes of stirring debate and age-old ceremony, were deserted save by groups of summer tourists looking over the building under guidance of the protective staff. Corridors which resounded the feet of busy members were almost empty. A cabinet meeting summoned today by Prime Minister Mackenzie King was attended by eight ministers. Several members of the government have left town for a few days holiday after a heavy session, before buckling down again to their official duties. Hon. Norman Rogers, Minister of Labor, Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Railways and Fisheries, are having a few days' fishing in New Brunswick.

First of the contingent of ministers to go abroad, Hon. W. D. Euler, Minister of Trade and Commerce, and Hon. Charles Dunning, Minister of Finance, will probably sail from Quebec next Saturday on a mission to increase Canada's external trade. Mr. Euler's travels will be extensive. Revision of the Empire trade agreements will be discussed in London, but the trade minister also plans to visit Holland, Belgium, Germany and Russia before he returns. He may also go to Switzerland and Poland.

The exodus will go on with the departure of Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice, Hon. C. G. Power, Minister of Pensions, and Hon. Ian Mackenzie, Minister of National Defence, who will represent Canada at the unveiling of the Canadian war memorial on Vimy Ridge. Hon. James G. Gardiner, Minister of Agriculture, plans to go to England to take up marketing problems connected with Canadian agricultural products.

Prime Minister Mackenzie King said today he will probably remain here until it is time for him to go across to attend the September meeting of the League of Nations. Today he presided over a long meeting of the cabinet. At its conclusion he had no announcements. He intimated some time might elapse before the government would fill various positions created by legislation passed this session.

Seven directors will have to be appointed under the new Canadian National Railways set-up; four directors are required for the Bank of Canada. The new radio corporation has to be given a board, a general manager and assistant general manager. There are now at least two vacancies on the bench to be filled. Also the permanent commission has not yet been able to function owing to death and illness.

Among the cabinet members who it is expected will remain in Ottawa or vicinity during the greater part of the summer are Labor Minister, Rogers, Railways Minister Howe and Interior Minister Crehan. Problems of the Labor Department are confined very largely to Canada, and they are of such a nature the minister will want to be on hand.

Ask For Investigation

The following resolution, moved by Rev. W. C. V. Martin of Saint John, N. B., was adopted unanimously by the Grand Lodge at the opening session yesterday morning. The text of the resolution was as follows:

"Whereas this Most Worshipful Grand Lodge has learned with deep concern of the action of the Canadian Radio Commission in banning Rev. Henri Lanctin from the air under circumstances set forth by the executive of the Grand Lodge of the Province of New Brunswick,

"Be it resolved that this Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of British America express its earnest anxiety at what appears to be summary action on the part of the Government's officials in this case and presses for an investigation to be held in the Province concerned on behalf of the Government of Canada of the charges or any statements upon which this banning of Rev. Lanctin was passed and that this Grand Lodge would point out that freedom of speech on the air is not to be summarily denied any British subject any more than freedom of the press or freedom of speech generally."

C., stating that during his last visit at Ottawa, he had secured an agreement with the Minister of Labor for the increasing of the grant for the Summerside sea wall project from \$2,000 to \$2,713. This has been confirmed by the Executive Council of the Province.

The Street Committee was authorized to fill in the ditches on Harvard Street east of the Electric Light plant and make a new ditch on the south side. Mr. Jerry Doucette's tender for painting the outside of the Town Hall building was accepted.

Several communications were received and filed.

Council adjourned until June 30, at 7:30.

MacPhee, County Master of Toronto, as well as Mrs. Mary MacLean, Past Grand Mistress and founder of the L. O. B. A. in Prince Edward Island; Mr. N. D. MacLean, Past Grand Secretary; Mrs. L. In recalling the early history of the Orphanage, Mr. W. W. Japan Rejects London Treaty?

(C. P. Cable By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, June 24.—The Japanese Embassy here has not yet received from Tokyo any communication concerning the reported decision of the Japanese cabinet not to adhere to the recent London naval treaty.

Pending delivery of a Japanese note on the matter, it is difficult to estimate the reaction to be expected to the Japanese decision.

The point most immediately affected is the clause of the London treaty limiting battleship armaments to 14-inch guns, provided Japanese adherence to this provision is obtained.

Rowe Opposes Hephburn Separate School Policy

Earl Rowe, new leader of the Ontario Conservative party, addressing a luncheon gathering of Conservatives today, said the Ontario Government's legislation giving separate schools a greater share of corporation taxes was only the first step to a greater share of Ontario's revenue going to the Roman Catholic Church.

He challenged Premier Hephburn and his colleagues to face the people of the province for endorsement of the legislation.

Thinking Leaders Great Need, Claim

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) REGINA, June 24.—Need of thinking leaders to combat corruption of youth and disregard of constituted authority was voiced today by Rev. Leo Burns, S.J., rector of Campion College, Regina, in speaking to the 16th annual convention of the Catholic Women's League of Canada.

Father Burns made his remarks when discussing the report by Mrs. W. O. Story, Montreal, on activities of the lay retreat movement in the past year. The report, read by Mrs. J. A. McCabe, Ottawa, paid tribute to Archbishop M. J. O'Brien, Kingston, for his assistance in the movement.

It was said, said Father Burns, to see universities tending toward Communism. Leaders were needed who had a single purpose for God and country, who were blameless in character, who had a calling to a noble cause and who had a comradeship with Christ. Closed retreats were the best schools of training for such leaders, he said.

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Air Service To Link Saint John And Halifax
(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) SAINT JOHN, N.B., June 24.—Commencing on Monday next, a regular air service for passengers will be established between Saint John and Halifax. Two trips per day each way are planned and the service will be maintained every day of the week except Sunday.

Announcement to this effect was made here by Thomas Thompson, Manager of Maritime Airline. Hitherto the company has been known as Maritime Airways. The change in name has been made with no change in organization, Mr. Thompson said.
