Among Canadian issues, Dome Mines and Hudson Bay Mining each rose 1/4, while McIntyre Porcupine gained 1/4 and Canadian Pacific lost 1/4 and Aluminum Ltd. 1/4.

Prices were irregularly higher on the American exchange. Volume was 1,970,000 shares compared with 1,800,000 Friday.

Born in Brudenell, P.E.I. he was the son of the late George and Catherine (MacCallum) Stewart and was educated at West Kent School and Charlottetown Business College.

He began his Army career in early life and enlisted for overseas service in World War I on July 3, 1915 with 98th Seige Battery R.C.A. which was redesignated as 2nd Seige Battery R.C.A. He proceeded overseas with this unit Nov. 1915 with rank of sergeant and also served an active service with 8th and 11th Seige Battery R.C.A. and was discharged in fall 1919.

He enlisted with Canadian Permanent Force attached to P.E.I. Med. Artillery Regiment in 1920 and resigned Sept. 1930 to enlist for active service with Royal Canadian Engineers as sergeant and held rank of Q.M. S.WO2 on his discharge in 1946 after 34 years of service.

In his youth he was active in many sports and an ardent fisherman until his last illness. Surviving are his wife Alice and daughter Joan (Mrs. George Cadmore).

Funeral service was held from Cutcliffe Funeral Home on Jan. 13, 1965 conducted by Rev. W.O. Weale of Central Christian Church, Charlottetown. TORONTO (CP) — Industrial shares declined fractionally in moderate stock exchange trading Monday, breaking a five-day string of advancing prices. Most losses were small.

Massey-Ferguson reported earnings for the first quarter of 1965 of 27 cents a share compared with 30 cents a share in the corresponding 1964-65 period. The stock fell 1/4 to 32 1/2 and traded 34,233 shares.

Canadian Westinghouse was off a point to 68 and Dominion Stores and Quebec Natural Gas 1/4 each to 26 1/2 and 11 1/2.

Versatile Manufacturing dropped 1/4 to 19 1/2. The company said last week it is negotiating with Ford of Canada to sell Ford combines that Versatile makes. The stock hit a high of 21 1/2 Monday.

In speculative, Texaco traded 276,175 shares and added 9 cents at \$1.46. Almine rose 40 cents to \$4.35 in junior oils.

Inco fell a point to 87 1/2 in steady senior base metals trading. Cominco lost 1/4 at 65 1/2 and Brunswick 1/4 to 19.

In golds, Dome rose 1/4 to 40 1/2. Home A and B led oils higher. The A issue gained 1/4 to 30 1/2, as did the B issue to 21 1/2.

As the issue, industrials fell 3/4 to 17 1/2 and the Toronto Stock Exchange index 42 to 161.94. Golds rose 1.50 to 169.25, base metals .01 to 81.72 and western oils .71 to 99.72. Volume was 3,963,000 shares compared with 3,913,000 shares Friday.

M-F Net Income Shows Decline In First Quarter

TORONTO (CP) — Massey-Ferguson Ltd.'s net income for the first quarter ended Jan. 31 fell to \$1,122,000 or seven cents in the quarter, compared with \$1,200,000 or eight cents in the same quarter last year, President A. A. Thornbrough said Monday.

He told the company's annual meeting the sharp drop was due to limited availability of the company's new worldwide line of tractors and to non-recurring charges met in tractor production changesover.

He predicted that sales and earnings by the end of fiscal 1965 will compare favorably with 1964, when the company earned \$45,015,000 on sales of \$772,040,000.

First-quarter sales were \$128,900,000, a decrease of \$6,800,000 or 4.5 per cent compared with last year.

Sales were up 9.2 per cent in North America and 6.1 per cent in Australia, but off 11.8 per cent in Europe, 28 per cent in Latin America and 11 per cent in Africa.

Mr. Thornbrough said capital expenditures this year will be an estimated \$60,700,000, compared with \$21,700,000 in 1964.

"Expenditures on capital and continued expansion of sales volume thus continue to place heavy pressure on the resources of the company despite the major improvements in the financial situation of Massey-Ferguson over the last few years, particularly through measures to improve not only earnings but also utilization of assets."
