# Time Expects To Stay Here

MONTREAL (CP)—Time magazine "will do its best to find a way to stay in Canada" despite legislation proposed to the House of Commons last week by Prime Minister Diefenbaker.

A spokesman said here this statement will appear in Time's Canadian edition this week.

"On the assumption that the Diefenbaker government does not really wish to expel Time from Canada and that it will discover that its own scheme is 'unjust and ineffective,'" Time editor-in-chief Henry R. Luce said: "Time will do its best to find a way to stay in Canada."

One measure proposed by the federal government would allow Canadian advertisers in Canadian editions of foreign magazines to deduct only half the cost as a business expense for tax purposes.

Time began printing its Canadian edition in Montreal last week.

# CONTRACT BRIDGE

## TEST YOUR PLAY

1. You are declarer with the West hand at Six Notrump. North leads the nine of diamonds. How would you play the hand?

♠ A Q J 10 9 8 7 6 5 4 3 2  
 ♥ K J 10 9 8 7 6 5 4 3 2  
 ♦ A K J 10 9 8 7 6 5 4 3 2  
 ♣ A K J 10 9 8 7 6 5 4 3 2

2. You are declarer with the West hand at Five Diamonds. The bidding has been:

West North East South  
 1 ♠ 2 ♣ 3 ♦ 4 ♣  
 4 ♣ Pass 5 ♦

North leads the king of clubs. How would you play the hand?

♠ A K J 7 6 5 4 3 2  
 ♥ 8 5 2  
 ♦ A K J 10 9 8 7 6 5 4 3 2  
 ♣ A 10 7 5 2

3. This problem was composed by Paul Lukacs many years ago. If the hand is played correctly, it cannot be defeated regardless of how the adverse cards are distributed.

Declarer wins the diamond in his hand and plays the queen of spades. If the queen is taken by the king, West has twelve tricks consisting of four spades, two hearts, four diamonds and two clubs. So let's assume the king is refused.

He may also be defeated. If he tackles the hearts by leading the A-K-J in succession. He cannot be sure of making the contract unless he leads the jack of hearts before cashing the ace and king.

2. Ruff the club, lead the queen of diamonds, and finesse if North follows low. The finesse, if successful, will produce twelve tricks because you can then lead another diamond and cash four spade tricks, discarding two hearts from dummy. All you would lose is a heart trick.

If the finesse loses to the singleton king, as it might, the contract is still sure to make. All you would lose is a diamond and a heart.

If you failed to finesse the diamond, the contract would be defeated if it turned out that North had the king of diamonds, was short in spades, and South had the ace of hearts.
