WILLIAM BAGWELL, Esq., is now purchasing draft and driving horses for the United States market.

The nomination of officers for the ensuing term for St. Lawrence Lodge will take place at Odd Fellows' Hall this evening.

Those women who took part in a disgraceful wordy brawl on King street, Sunday evening, will be in attendance at Court to-morrow.

Two Indians and a Frenchman were drowned by the breaking up of a raft on the Chaughauga River, on the 11th inst.

JAMES McCORDECK, of Westfield, N. B., was killed while attempting to jump on a train in motion, at Carlton, on Friday last.

TORONTO people are arranging a regatta for professional rowers with prizes to the amount of \$4,000 to \$5,000 to take place in July. They expect to induce Boyd to take part.

It is reported that the Anglican Bishop and the Roman Catholic Archbishop, of Toronto, propose waiting on the Princess Louise to solicit her intercession on behalf of the convicted murderer DeCoursier.

PICNICS.—The members of the Benevolent Irish Society will hold their annual picnic on or about the 15th of July, and the members of St. Patrick's T. A. & B. Society will hold their annual picnic early in August. Full particulars of both will shortly be published.

A PASTORAL has been issued to the Catholic clergy and people in Quebec, Bishops of Montreal, Three Rivers, Rimouski, Sherbrooke, Ottawa, St. Hyacinthe, and Chicoutimi. The question with which it deals is the amenity of the clergy to the Civil Courts, and the bull of Pope Pius pronouncing sentence of ex-communication against all who, directly or indirectly force civil Judges to bring before their tribunals ecclesiastical persons against the disposition of the Canonical law.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS.—Advices from the Magdalen Islands of the 10th inst., says the steamer "Albert," wrecked last November there and which floated off on the ice, is being towed by the steamer "Scud" to Picton for repairs. Mackerel, cod and fish generally are very scarce. The fishermen are in want, the unusual fog prevailing preventing them from their work. Very few vessels are in port for net or mackereling, and Labrador men are getting ready for that fishery.

FISHWICK'S steamer "Edgar Stewart," arrived from Halifax this morning, at 5 o'clock, with freight and the Misses Fishwick (3), Miss White, Miss Stevenson and Miss Barnaby, as passengers. She is now loading 6,000 bushels of potatoes for the New York market, by Messrs. Whight & McGown and Longworth & Co., and will probably sail for Halifax at 7 o'clock this evening. The potatoes will be reshipped at Halifax on board the Cromwell line steamer "Cortes," which sails immediately after for New York. The potatoes were purchased at 14 cents per bushel.

THE "GONDOLIER."—The names of the three drowned sailors were: August Hingel, a German; Cornelius Post, belonging to Holland, and a Prussian Pole named Fritz. When the "Newfield," which arrived at Halifax on Friday, left Sable Island, the "Gondolier" was nearly on an even keel, with a list to port, heading towards the NE, and full of water, and was lying very still. Some of the materials, and a portion of the cargo which was recovered from the wreck by the men employed on the Island were also brought up to the city. Most of the cargo is expected to be saved, and two vessels are already at the scene of the wreck.

PEDESTRIANISM.—The Halifax Herald says:—"The Park Street skating rink presents quite an attractive appearance having been decorated and renovated for the pedestrian contest on Monday. The track has been carefully laid and surveyed and Bombardier Taffe and Mr. Probart, who practised on it yesterday expressed themselves highly pleased with it. Mr. W. Scott, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., and Jos. Legget, of Sussex, N. B., arrive per train to-night. John Francham, of Charlottetown, if not here by Carroll from that port is on the same train with the others. Warren Smith will be present at start on Monday morning and will accompany the walk for a short time.

A CRICKET MATCH was played at Victoria Park on Saturday between the married and single elevens. The weather was all that a cricketer could desire. The married men went to the wickets first. They, after a very short innings, scored 54 runs, the highest number being made by George McLeod, who scored 11. L. H. Davies came next with 9. The single boys then took their turn at the bat, and, after a short innings managed to run up a score of 53, just one behind their opponents. The highest score on their side being made by J. H. Yeo, 14; J. A. Longworth, 12; L. Yeo, 9. We may mention that the married only sent ten men to the wickets, so they were the victors by one wicket and one run.
