Forecast Report Will Censure Senator McCarthy

DENVER, Col., (AP)—A Senate investigating committee today will recommend the censure of Senator Joseph McCarthy (Rep. Wis.) on three points and report critically on the senator's action on other matters, the Denver Post says.

The committee headed by Senator Arthur Watkins (Rep. Utah), will recommend that the Senate censure McCarthy for being contemptuous of a Senate committee which was investigating his affairs; for the senator's "vulgar and base" language in referring to another senator, and for his treatment of Brig-Gen. Ralph Zwicker at a committee hearing, The Post says.

The possession by Senator McCarthy of a confidential FBI document will be criticized by the report. The Post adds.

Oakville Ford Plant Employees Vote For Strike

OAKVILLE, Ont., (CP)—Members of the United Automobile Workers Union CIO-CCL Local 707 voted Sunday to authorize their executive to call a strike if necessary to support negotiations with the Ford Motor Company of Canada.

Union officials said the balloting showed an 86 per cent majority in favor of an executive-sponsored resolution to allow strike action at any time the executive feels further negotiations are no longer worthwhile.

The resolution was the same as one approved by members of the UAW Local 200 at the Ford plant in Windsor a week ago.

Union officials said the vote was heavy and union members filled the Oakville arena to capacity. Local 707 has a membership of about 3,000.

Union officials said a meeting with Ford officials has been called in Oakville, 20 miles west of Toronto, today.

Ford has been negotiating with the UAW since last December. No company offer has been announced but the union is seeking 10 1-2 cents an hour increase plus fringe benefits estimated at 4 1-2 cents. Some 5,700 men are involved. Their basic wage rate is about \$1.60 an hour.

Commission On Korea Gives Report To U.N.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., (AP)—The UN commission for unification and rehabilitation of Korea reported to the general assembly Saturday night that the cost of maintaining a large South Korean army is severely hindering reconstruction there.

This situation, the report said, could nullify all reconstruction plans entirely.

Israel Objects To Border Patrols; U. N. To Hear Report On Question
JERUSALEM (CP)—United Nations truce observers received orders Saturday to discontinue their independent patrols inside Israeli territory along the armistice line with Jordan.

Maj.-Gen. E. L. M. Burns of Canada, new chief of staff of the truce observation commission, called his men off after the Israeli government announced Friday it had ordered its border guards to stop them from carrying out observations unless they were accompanied by Israeli liaison officers.

The general introduced the patrols when he assumed his post at the beginning of this month. The idea was that truce team members, patrolling both sides of the border and in constant communication by radio, could quickly fix responsibility in the event of any new affray.

Israel held that the patrol action violated Israeli sovereignty and the Jordan-Israel armistice agreement.
