Want Ties And Long Trousers

By ALVIN STEINKOPF LAGOS, Nigeria (AP)—A sign in the new and splendid Mainland Hotel here says: "The management requests that for evening, gentlemen wear ties and long trousers or appropriate African attire."

Shorts, sandals and open necks won't do—but jackets may still be skipped.

This is one manifestation of the manner in which Lagos and all Nigeria are polishing their manners and giving the country a thorough scrubbing for the three-week visit of the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh starting Saturday morning.

The Queen leaves London by plane today with the duke for the 19-day tour.

The 4,000-mile flight to Lagos, via Tripoli, will take the royal couple from cold and rainy Britain to the heat and humidity of tropical Africa.

They will be travelling in a Canadian-built British Overseas Airways Corporation Argonaut, the "Atalanta," with an immediate entourage of five. Another Argonaut will carry other members of the party and luggage.

Proposal For Federal Aid To University Students Approved

OTTAWA (CP)—A Liberal backbencher's Commons proposal Thursday for federal assistance to needy university students won immediate support from members of all Opposition parties.

A. H. Hollingworth, York Centre, urged the government to introduce legislation providing student aid through a system of national bursaries and scholarships. He said an estimated 20,000 Canadian students need financial help to get a university education.

The money would come from the federal treasury but the plan should be developed with full recognition for provincial rights in the field of education, he said.

His resolution was supported at once by Opposition leader Drew and members of the CCF and Social Credit parties. Prime Minister St. Laurent was an interested listener.

Mr. Hollingworth said the embryo for the plan exists in federal assistance now given to provincial bursary programs.

GAVE TO ONTARIO In 1955-56, the federal government had contributed \$100,000 of an Ontario bursary fund of \$420,000 administered by a committee of provincial education officials and one federal labor department representative.

The effort was commendable but more should be done to provide student aid.

Mr. Hollingworth said federal assistance to universities for capital works such as libraries, laboratories and other buildings is "woefully inadequate" for present and future needs.

He estimated there are between 55,000 and 65,000 university students in Canada now. The number would grow to 135,000 in 10 years.

Mr. Hollingworth said his plan is not designed to assist brilliant students who are independent of British, manufacturers report.

means. It would help students without the money for a university education.

MARITIMERS SPEAK A. J. MacEachern (L—Inverness-Richmond) said financial assistance for students is needed especially in light of Canada's growing unemployment.

War veterans who attended university with governmental financial help had been successful partly because they were relieved of many worries.

Sam Balcom (L—Halifax) said there is a wide gap between what students can earn and their university fees. A male student could earn \$300 during the summer, a female \$200, but \$1,200 was needed annually for college training. More than half the students who dropped out of college did so for financial reasons.

George Nowlan (PC—Digby-Annapolis-Kings) said the time has come for Parliament and the government to give more attention to the needs of universities and provide scholarships for students.

National research scholarships, mainly for scientific studies, had benefited graduate students. More aid should be given to undergraduates and students of the humanities, arts and social sciences.

AERIAL PLANTERS DARWIN, Australia (CP)—A company financed by Australian and United States interests started the first aerial sowing of rice this month in Australia's Northern Territory about 60 miles south of Darwin. Three hundred acres are under experimental cultivation.

NONE TO RUSSIA LONDON (CP)—Russia was the only major country which did not import Harris tweed in 1955, a record year for the industry in Britain, manufacturers report.
