SHAVING LOTION BRINGS CHARGES - For the first time in Summerside, and probably in the Province charges have been laid against store proprietors for being in possession of ordinary shaving lotion contrary to the Temperance Act. Yesterday before Magistrate R. S. Hinton, K.C., in Summerside the owner of a store was fined \$25.00 and costs for being in possession of one bottle of shaving lotion and nine bottles of bay rum. These were ordinary manufacturers' brands used by many male citizens for outward application to their faces after shaving and reportedly used by a minority of people inwardly. Street Paving Program Scheduled For S'side

An indication that some permanent street paving will be done this summer in Summerside was given at the regular monthly meeting of the Town Council held last evening. His Worship, Mayor Henry Wedge presided and all members of the Council were present except Councillor J. Lorne Driscoll, who is out of town.

The street matter was brought up by Councillor H. B. Schurman reporting for the street committee, who said that when Councillor Driscoll, chairman of the committee, returns a survey will be made of all clay streets and the committee will bring in a recommendation at the next Council meeting as to which streets should be paved. He said that a three-year program will probably be drawn up and only a part of the work will be done this year.

A petition from residents of Duke Street, asking that that street be paved, was read and a motion was passed to the effect that this petition will be considered in the over-all survey. Mayor Wedge said that while such petitions are welcomed as a guide to the street committee there may be some streets that will be paved for which no petitions were received. He said that the Town has the authority to do this and to assign the property owners.

Councillor Schurman also brought in a resolution which was passed regarding certain "no parking" zones and reserving a single parking space on Central, Summer and Spring Streets for taxis. These will allow room for one car to park in each space and he said that if the taxis do not abide by the regulations they will be prosecuted.

As the result of a petition a motion was made by Councillor Schurman, seconded by Councillor Gorrill and passed that a cement sidewalk be built on the east side of Granville Street from Beaver Street to Victoria Road.

A copy of a resolution sent to the Provincial Government was read from residents of the area where the Government garage is located asking that this garage be moved as much noise of running on at night is annoying. The Council passed a motion supporting this resolution.

Light Committee Reports - Councillor T. D. Morrison reported for the electric light committee and said that the new extension is now on its base and the addition to the plant is three-quarters completed. He also reported on the airport contract matter stating that regarding Premier Jones' statement in the Legislature that Maritime Electric Company are taking over the airport, Mayor Wedge, Councillor Driscoll and myself went to Ottawa and got in touch with our local representative, Mr. MacNaught.

Homes For Married R.C.A.F. Personnel

OTTAWA, April 11 (Special) - Contract for the construction of 105 homes for married R.C.A.F. personnel at the R.C.A.F. station at Summerside has been awarded to Eastern Woodworkers Limited of New Glasgow, N.S. It was learned here today from J. Watson MacNaught, M.P. for Prince and parliamentary assistant to Fisheries Minister Mayhew.

Amount involved in the contract is slightly over \$700,000. While it is expected that work on the new group of homes will begin shortly, their construction may be deferred until completion of the 150 R.C.A.F. married quarters now under construction at Summerside.

It is not the intention of the Defence Department, it was learned, to provide a government-built home for all married personnel. At present, the target is to build housing sufficient for about 50 percent of the married strength of R.C.A.F. and Canadian army units.

Bulk of the amount to be voted for construction purposes for the Defence Department will go into housing and barrack buildings for the active forces, it was stated by the Department here today. This will mean that until these needs are well advanced, there is little hope for construction of new armories for reserve army units.
