## Claims Chemical Industry No Cure For NS Coal Ills

GLACE BAY, N.S. (CP) — A highly placed informant has shattered the long-held dream that a driving chemical industry based on coal derivatives is the solution to the ills of Cape Breton's mines. He wrote off chemicals using the same argument as employed by the people who have stopped buying Cape Breton coal: "It's too expensive."

Ever since the \$75,000,000 Nova Scotia coal industry began running head on into production and marketing difficulties, the idea of a chemical complex has appealed to many, both directly and indirectly connected to the industry whose output of 5,500,000 tons a year is sorely threatened by the inroads of oil and other domestic fuels.

People have argued that if Cape Breton coal no longer can be sold for fuel, then the Dominion Steel and Coal Corp. should quit trying and instead turn to the manufacture of by-products like nylon, tar, perfumes and plastics.

**HIT BY HIGH COST**  
"The only trouble with that approach to the problem," the informant said, "is that a healthy chemical industry must be right on top of a plentiful supply of cheap coal."

## October Conference On National Health Insurance Scheme

OTTAWA, (CP) — Federal and provincial leaders Wednesday agreed to take up the question of launching a national health insurance scheme when they hold their main 1955 conference here Oct. 2. Premier Frost of Ontario, who had urged other premiers to take quick action on a study scheme, later expressed satisfaction with the agreement and said he hopes it will lead to progress on this longstanding issue.

The subject is to be discussed under the general heading of "health and welfare services," one of the five items placed on the agenda by the chieftains of the 11 governments for their fall session.

Premier Douglas of Saskatchewan told reporters after the wind-up of the two-day preliminary meeting of government heads, that his province "is ready to go any time" on participation with the federal government in any national health insurance scheme.

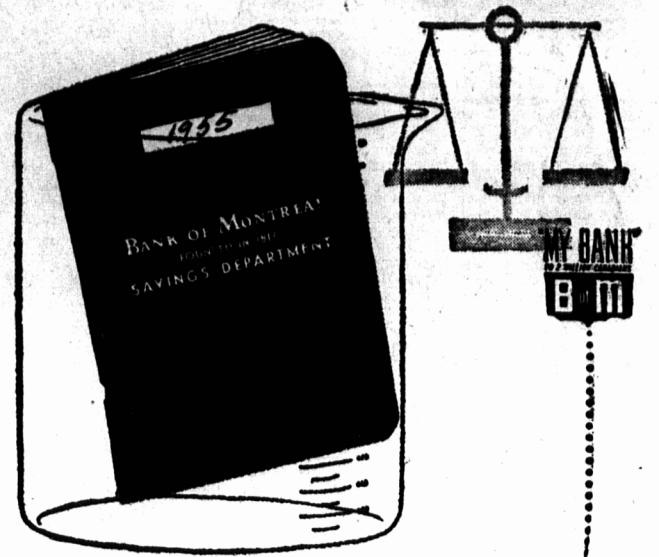
**MARTIN SPOKE ON PLAN**  
He disclosed that Health Minister Martin spoke on the subject at Wednesday's closed-door sessions and appeared to indicate that the central government would be prepared to participate in an insurance plan, provided a majority of provinces agreed to join.

Mr. Douglas was told by some reporters that this appeared to be a different federal approach than the one recently enunciated by Mr. Martin. The federal minister said in a recent radio press conference that Ottawa would participate only if there was unanimous consent by the provinces to join the scheme.

The Saskatchewan premier said Mr. Martin appeared to indicate by his remarks that the federal government would participate if six of the provinces joined, including one of the main ones—either Ontario or Quebec.
