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Quebec Expenditures Estimated At Record

QUEBEC (CP)—The Quebec government's expenditure estimates for the fiscal year 1966-67 total a record \$2,304,711,000, it was announced here.

Supplementary spending estimates during the course of the year will bring total Quebec spending for fiscal 1966-67 to nearly \$2,500,000,000.

The figures were disclosed when Premier Jean Lesage tabled the 1966-67 estimates in the legislative assembly.

The approximate spending by Quebec in the current year, ending March 31, totals \$2,086,243,010.

The figure of \$2,304,711,000 for the fiscal 1966-67 is made up of net estimated expenditure of \$2,083,146,800 plus federal government contributions of \$150,403,000 for shared-cost programs and \$161,161,200 for other contributions and reimbursements.

The estimates established at more than \$1,661,000,000 the normal Quebec government spending which must be balanced annually against an equal amount of revenue.

The total of these plus the \$1,661,000,000 is the net budget of the province.

The major share of the net estimates goes to the departments of education and health.

The education department anticipates spending of \$451,900,000 of Quebec revenues and the health department \$467,100,000.

The total estimates for these two departments, including federal contributions and reimbursements, anticipates spending of \$818,900,000 for education and \$472,700,000 for health.

The health department estimate represents an increase of \$56,700,000 over the current year.

The province's plan of universal hospital insurance coverage and its services at outpatient clinics are expected to cost \$333,100,000 up from \$288,600,000.

A government spokesman said the higher figure results from increases in hospital staff salaries, population, and in the number of days persons remain in hospital, and also from the construction or enlargement of hospitals.

The amount set aside for treatment of the mentally ill was boosted to \$60,300,000 from \$48,900,000.

The department of family and social welfare has estimated spending of \$252,200,000 and the department of roads \$351,400,000.

The most substantial increase in the estimates for the department of family and social welfare covers payments to needy mothers.

The allowance for this climbs to \$28,500,000 from the 1965-66 figure of \$20,100,000.

This increase follows the decision to increase to \$20 from \$10 the monthly allowance for each child.

A bill is currently before the assembly to authorize the allowance increases.

The estimates set aside \$318,733,100 for capital expenditure; \$54,705,700 for interest repayments and \$28,185,500 for depreciation costs.

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Vast Hunt For Missing Bomb To Be Continued Indefinitely

By ELTON C. FAY WASHINGTON (AP)—The longest hunt for a missing nuclear weapon—four weeks—still is going on and a U.S. defence department source has indicated it will continue indefinitely.

The search began Jan. 17 when a collision between a U.S. Strategic Air Command B-52 jet bomber and a refuelling plane over the coastal area of southern Spain resulted in four unarmoured thermo-nuclear weapons falling with the wreckage.

Three were found. But the search of land and sea bottom so far has failed to turn up the fourth.

The time, the number of searchers and the amount of equipment used surpasses by far any of the hunts made in 14 other officially reported incidents involving loss or damage to nuclear weapons.

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The previously-reported nuclear accidents similar to the Spanish one down to mere minor damage to the casing of a weapon.

Several of them were in plane crashes over land where there was little or no difficulty in finding the weapon or weapons.

In at least one case, the plane was carrying only non-explosive components of a nuclear system.

In none of the incidents has there been nuclear detonation or serious radioactive danger.

The loss of the weapon last month has a significant aspect: It is the first reported occasion a nuclear weapon has been lost or involved in any other incident outside the United States or its territorial waters.

This apparently accounts, in considerable measure, for the intensive, prolonged search.

There are several reasons: 1. To reassure Spanish residents by locating and removing the weapon and end apprehension over possible radioactive contamination.

2. To ease the pressure on the Spanish government from some of the population for getting rid of U.S. military bases.

3. To find the missing weapon before overt or covert searchers of an unfriendly government obtain possession.

From the weapon and from classified portions of B-52 wreckage foreign weaponers could compile valuable data.
