GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

TORONTO, April 15.—The World says: "We understand that one of the conditions of Newfoundland's joining the Canadian confederation will be a constitutional clause, guaranteeing separate schools to the Roman Catholic population of that Island. For school purposes the ancient colony is now divided into districts, and the education is denominational. In each district a board of education, consisting of Catholics of the Catholic schools, and another consisting of Protestants of the Protestant schools, are appointed by the governor-in-council. The governor also appoints the inspectors. In schools established by the governmental boards a tuition fee is required from all pupils. Besides these governmental schools the colonial church and school society and all religious denominations maintain their own schools and receive aid from the government. In 1893 there were 549 elementary schools, attended by 33,834 pupils.

LOSANOS, April 17.—The Daily Telegraph despatch dated Rancagua, April 6, via Kars, April 15, which says that owing to the representations of the powers energetic measures have been taken which, as has now been proved, have prevented a series of massacres. Christians in Erzeroum, the despatch says, were terror-stricken on the night of the 2nd inst., on account of a report that more than one hundred Turkish soldiers had attempted to leave their barracks and begin the butchery of Christian inhabitants. The report was true and a massacre was prevented only by the action of the commander of the garrison, Shaikh Pascha, who at the first sign of the outbreak ordered the troops to return to their quarters immediately. The command was obeyed, whereupon Shaikh Pascha ordered a volley to be fired, by which the rebels who remained faithful, and 13 of the rebels were shot on the spot. Precautions against a massacre have been taken throughout the province, but a sense of insecurity prevails.

LOSANOS, April 17.—The Herald's special cable despatch from Nassau, N. P., says: From Palenque, Cuba, General Macao is reported to have proclaimed Dr. Thomas Estrada Palma provisional president of the Cuban republic, and General Marti secretary and general and diplomatic agent abroad. Gen. Maximo Gomez is recognized as supreme military director and will have also supreme command of the province of Pinar del Rio. The rebel chiefs throughout Santiago have been instructed to avoid engagements with the Spanish forces until after April 26, and to endeavor in the meanwhile to gather all horses and arms possible to perfect their organization and centralize their forces.

A correspondent of a Chicago paper says that Georgia pine timber for general purposes is considered the most useful furnished by any forest tree. It is light and enduring; it is soft, and yields readily to tools; it will endure water and weather better than any other of the soft woods; its resinous qualities enable it to hold paint and varnish longer than other lumber; it has a toughness and a tensile strength greater than that of any other of the soft woods; it is equally good for building and for cabinet work and furniture, and will wear as well out of doors as in. It has a straight, even an beautifully-marked grain, which is susceptible of high polish, and can be finished in almost any size and length required. The admirers of Canadian white pine will be inclined to dispute some of these assertions.
