



**Special Stamp
To Commemorate
Queen's Visit**

OTTAWA (CP) — A special five-cent stamp will be issued next June 30 to commemorate the centennial-year visit to Canada of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip.

Postmaster-General Cote, announcing this gave no details of the stamp's design. A post-office spokesman said it will be described to the public about two months before issue.

However, it was learned that the stamp will bear a likeness of the Queen, at least, plus the centennial symbol of the stylized, 11-point maple leaf.

The royal visit stamp will be one of eight issued in 1967. The others were announced last summer.

Mr. Cote said the issue date for the Expo 67 commemorative stamp, originally set for April 26, has been changed to April 28 to coincide with the opening of the world's fair in Montreal.

The other 1967 commemorative stamps and their dates of issue: Centennial, Jan. 11; 50th anniversary of women's franchise, May 24; Pan-American Games, July 19; 50th anniversary of The Canadian Press, Aug. 31; centennial of Toronto as capital of Ontario, Sept. 20; Christmas stamps, Oct. 11.

**Blind Pianist
Fined \$10,000**

BOSTON (AP)—Ray Charles, 35, renowned blind pianist, has been sentenced to a five-year suspended jail term and fined \$10,000 in federal district court on two counts of possession of narcotics.

The entertainer, who pleaded guilty Nov. 22, 1965, also was placed on probation for four years. A condition of the probation requires Charles to undergo medical examinations every six months to determine whether he has given up drugs. Charles was arrested Oct. 31, 1964, as he arrived from Montreal.

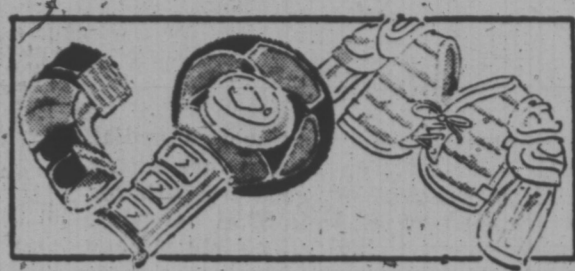

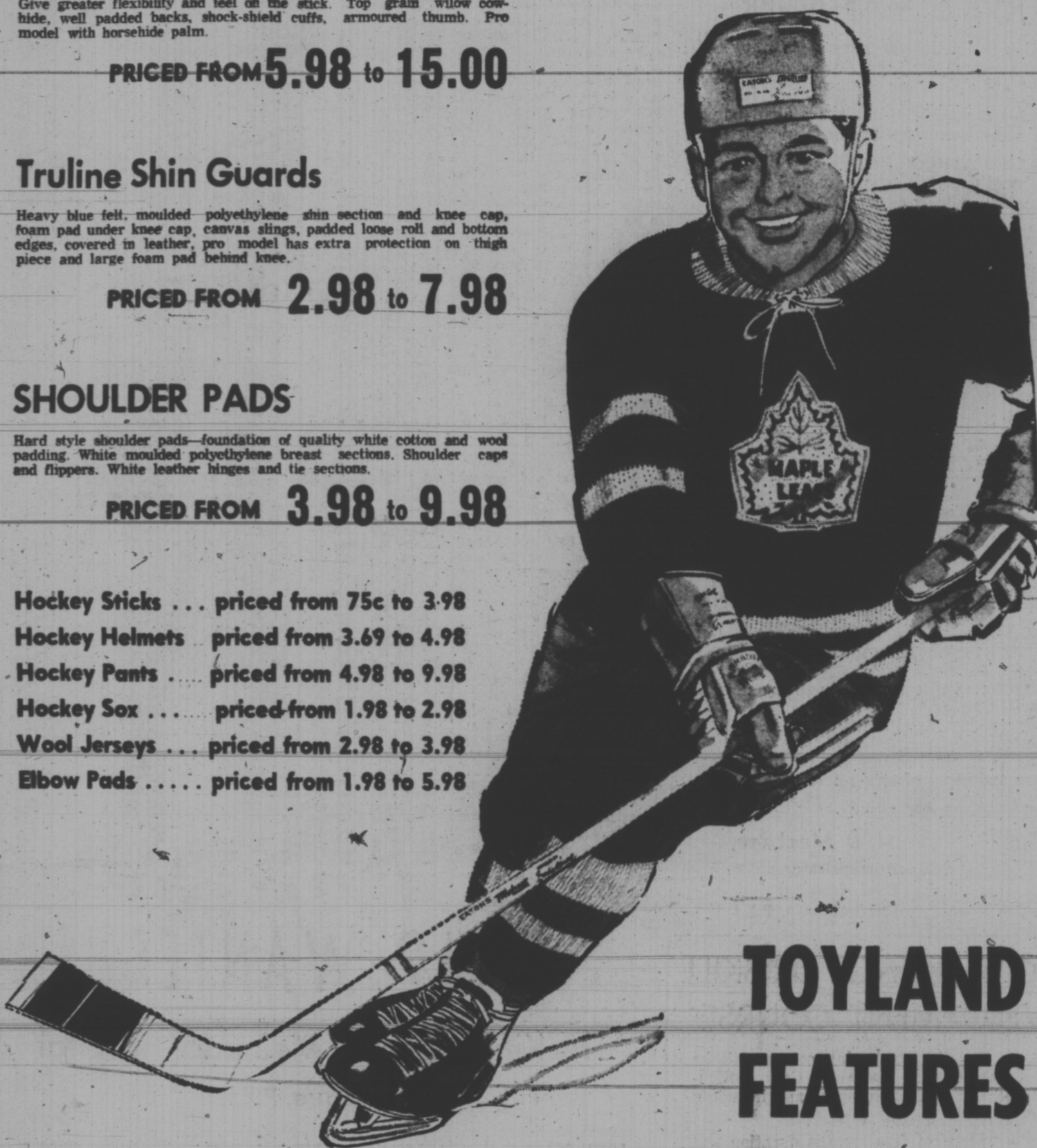
