THE CAMPANA.—The steamer Campana left Quebec for Charlottetown yesterday.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.—The Methodist Conference of New Brunswick and P. E. Island will meet in Moncton next month. Preparations are now under way for the entertainment of the clerical and other delegates.

The Moncton Times of Wednesday last in speaking of the appearance of the Lyceum Company in the "Merchant of Venice" on the previous evening says among other things that "the piece was given a beautiful interpretation, and the large audience was highly delighted with the performance. The Lyceum Company is well balanced and is easily among the best ever seen here."

VERY SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—Last night while the regular train from Charlottetown was entering Georgetown station little Angus Currie, the eight-year-old son of Allan Currie, attempted to board the train, but fell beneath the wheels and had his arm cut off above the elbow. Dr. Stewart attended the little sufferer, and amputated the arm two inches below the shoulder. He is doing nicely this morning.

FIRE.—A barn belonging to Mr. R. Heartz, and situated on the street running west from Boyle's Tannery, caught fire shortly after midnight last night and was beyond saving before the firebell rang. The firemen reached it about 12:30. It was allowed to burn fairly well out before water was applied. During the first of the fire the west wind carried the sparks down among the houses in Spring Park. In the barn were some wagons, sleighs and a barouche owned by Mr. W. F. Robins which were destroyed. On these there was some slight insurance. There was about \$100 insurance on the barn.

Local and Other Items.

LOBSTERS.—Lobsters are being taken in fair quantities west.

SEEDING.—Seeding has commenced pretty generally over the province. The new meadows look well we are told.

HERRING.—The catch of herring on the north-west side of the Island is very large. The nets are full of them at every setting.

THE RIGHT THING.—A handsome new flag staff 75 feet high, thoroughly rigged, painted and surmounted by a weather vane has been added to the Sacred Heart Church grounds, Alberton. Quite a number of ordinary staffs has been added to the prominent buildings of the place. The suggestions of a few months ago had effect. Let other places follow suit.

A CARD OF THANKS.—Professor and the Misses and Mr. Charles Earle desire to tender their sincere thanks to the people of Summerside and surrounding district for the magnificent reception accorded to them on Thursday evening last, also the ladies and gentlemen who so kindly assisted them. The large audience which greeted them was in the highest degree gratifying.

We are pleased to hear that Mr. Vinnicombe's orchestra is getting up a special musical programme for the Merchant of Venice Monday night. Among the musical numbers will be selections from the Opera, some of the latest waltzes, also Mr. Tuppe's great overture light cavalry (descriptive battle scene). The trumpet call to horse, the charger, battle, cries of the wounded, etc. This in itself will be an interesting musical treat.

A PECULIAR FIND.—On Saturday last while Messrs. NORMAL BIBLE CLASS.—Although this class has closed its weekly sessions for the summer, yet it is expected that many of the members will continue the study of the text-book and be prepared to pass an examination thereon, either during the month of June or September. In order to assist those intending to carry on the study, there will be a test examination at Pastor Raymond's home, corner of Queen and Fitzroy streets, on Tuesday evening, May 22nd. This examination will cover only up to page 54 of Hurlburt's Revised Normal Lessons. All the members of the class are invited to try this test. Come at eight o'clock on the evening of May 22nd, bringing only a cheap blank book and lead pencil.

DAIRY ASSOCIATION.—A meeting of the directors and officers of the P. E. Island Dairy Association met in the city on the 8th of May. Present: Arthur Simpson, Bay View, President; John Anderson, Kensington, Vice President; Directors—Laughlin McDonald, East Point; James E. McDonald, Cardigan; D. P. Irving, Vernon River Bridge; Sec. Treas.—Robert Jenkins, Mount Albion. A letter was read from Professor Robertson saying the same grant would be given the Association as last year—\$300. The Secretary stated that the Provincial Government promised to aid the Association and would give the same amount as last year—\$400, provided an instructor was engaged for the full year. Frazer S. Morrow who has lately returned from the Kingston Dairy School, was engaged as Inspector and Instructor for 12 months beginning May 15th. Everett Mutch was appointed auditor to act in conjunction with Auditor L. L. Jenkins appointed at annual meeting. The next meeting of the Association will be held in Charlottetown on the 3rd Friday in June when the Cheese Board will hold its first meeting for the year. Factories intending to join the Board will instruct their salesman to meet at the Provincial building, city, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon. Cables from London and Liverpool with actual sales from best boards in Canada, the day previous to our meeting will be posted for the guidance of salesmen.—Robert Jenkins Secretary.
