

# R.C.M.P. Corporal Tops Riflemen At First Day Of Provincial Meet

A Royal Canadian Mounted Police Corporal W. M. Beatty of the Summerside detachment totalled the highest aggregate yesterday in the opening day of the Annual Island Rifle Association Prize Meet.

Beatty scored a total of 106 out of a possible 200 and in doing so won two of the four matches fired yesterday. The veteran rifleman won the Prowse Bros. and the Moore and MacLeod matches with possible scores of 50.

In winning the Moore and MacLeod match he was forced to shoot-off with Miss Elsie Strong and Gnr. W. E. Hardy who also posted possible scores.

The DeBlois Bros. Match was won by Sgt. G. G. MacLennan of Alexandria with a possible score. Officer Cadet T. Baines of the R.C.M.P. (R) Halifax with a score of 49 won the Cameron-Vinnicombe Match.

The four day match will continue this morning at the Squaw Point Range with the City of Charlottetown Match being fired. Riflemen will fire 10 rounds at 300 yards and 10 rounds at 600 in this competition.

In the afternoon the Rogers Hardware Match (15 rounds at 600 yards) will be fired. In addition the first two practices of the United Services Officers Club will be held.

The first practice will see the marksmen fire 10 rounds at 600 yards without the sling. The second practice will be the run-down with two rounds each of the 500, 400, 300, 200 and 100 yard ranges.

## Marciano Kayos Matthews In Second To Earn Shot At Jersey Joe's Title

NEW YORK, July 28 (AP)—Vicious Rocky Marciano crumpled Harry Matthews, the pride of the great northwest, with two crunching left hooks to the jaw tonight to score a spectacular knockout win in 2:04 of the second round at Yankee Stadium.

Earning a September title shot at heavyweight champion Jersey Joe Walcott, 27-year-old Rocky, unbeaten in 42 straight fights, dumped Matthews flat on his back in his own corner—almost in the lap of his manager Jack Hurley, with the two thundering hooks.

The 29-year-old Matthews, from Seattle, unbeaten since 1943, wore a bewildered expression on his pain-drawn face as he went down with his head against the ropes.

Gamely trying to gather his numbed senses, Matthews clawed at the ropes as he tried to pull himself off the deck. As the west coast fighter started to rise, he collapsed over the bottom strap like a wet rag. Referee Ray Miller tolled off the final 10.

Weaving low in a Jack Dempsey-style attack, the pride of Brockton, Mass., drove to the attack from the opening bell. A scowling slugger, with mouth agape, the brawny son of a shoemaker beat a crushing attack on Matthews' jaw. Marciano weighed 187½ and Matthews 179.

With an 8½-pound advantage in weight, Marciano bulied the counter-punching Matthews around the ring with his wild, but numbing punches.

For the first minutes of this battle, fought in 83-degree heat, Matthews' sharp counter blows ripped at Marciano's body and head. Yet they never once slowed the attack of the aroused Rocky.

## Basketball Teams In Riot At Olympic Games

HELSINKI, July 28 (CP)—The comparative tranquillity of the Olympic Games was broken today when a riot erupted at the end of the Uruguay-France basketball match and the American referee was painfully injured.

In contrast, the heralded meeting between the United States and European basketball champions was a friendly affair, the Americans overpowering the Russians 86-58.

Two of Canada's boxers won first-round victories, two swimmers qualified for the 400-metre semi-finals, the best kickers in the world were named and the best of the Islanders are far back.

In the unofficial point-standing the U.S. scored 40 points against only six for Russia. But Russia still is in front 502½ to 425. Other countries are far back.

The attack on referee Vincent Farrell of Newark, N. J., came at the end of the game in which France won 68-66. Several Uruguayan players charged Farrell because of a decision and then a spate of punches and kicks were hurled in the groin, flooring him. Farrell was given medical treatment.

**One Tense Moment**  
There was one tense moment in the Russia-U. S. game. Clyde Lovellette of the United States and Otar Korkkia, the Russians' best player, fell to the floor in a scramble for the ball. When

HELSINKI, July 28 (CP)—The Duke of Edinburgh has four Canadian Olympic pins—one for himself, one for the Queen and one each for Princess Anne and Prince Charles.

He got them last night when he visited Canadian headquarters in the Olympic village dubbed "Canada House".

The Duke was greeted by Jim Worrall of Toronto, a Canadian Olympic Association official during his brief visit.

He saw the swimmers and basketball players and talked for a minute or two with George Genereux of Saskatoon, winner of the gold medal for trapshooting.

Earlier he had dinner at the village with Commonwealth athletes. At one point during his visit he told a group of Canadian girls: "I had a wonderful time in your country last year. I shall never forget it."

The Duke made a hit with the women athletes. The great Fanny Blankers-Koen of the Netherlands after meeting him said: "It was the greatest moment of my life. How charming he is. I did not sleep a wink at all last night, waiting for today."

## Halifax St. Mary's Find Financial Support Cut

HALIFAX, July 28 (CP)—Halifax St. Mary's, of the Maritime Major Hockey League, today were without a backer, less than a week before the league meeting at which they must make known their intentions for the coming season.

Announcement by club general manager Jimmy MacDonald that Victor Oland, who backed the club the last three seasons, would be interested only in a minor role with the club, came as a surprise. At the last league meeting of the league in New Glasgow, Halifax was one of the definite entrants.

The franchise is owned jointly by Oland and MacDonald with the former major stockholder. MacDonald said last night he would probably ask for an extension at the meeting to enable him to line up another backer.

## Luke Sewell Quits As Cincinnati Reds' Boss

NEW YORK, July 28 (AP)—Luke Sewell became the fifth major league manager to walk the plank today when he quit as boss of Cincinnati Reds.

Eddie Sawyer, who "resigned" as manager of Philadelphia Phillies June 27, was reported headed for the job although General Manager Gabe Paul made no announcement.

Paul said only that Sewell's successor is not now a member of the club, a statement that apparently eliminated the coaching staff of Ben Chapman, Paul Page and Earle Brucker.

Other names mentioned in baseball circles were Rogers Hornsby and Frankie Frisch. Sewell said he quit "because when you don't win in baseball, the only thing to do is get out."

The Reds won steadily in early season, driving into the National League's first division. But they settled back into the second division and now are seventh, 26 games behind the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers.

Sewell agreed to remain as manager of the club for the games in Philadelphia tomorrow and Wednesday to give Paul time to line up a new skipper. The Reds were idle today after beating New York Giants yesterday.

The resignation by Sewell, 51-year-old former St. Louis Browns manager, was accepted by Powell Crosley, Jr., president of the club, who is vacationing near Sudbury, Ont.

Sewell is the third National League pitcher to step out since the 1952 season opened. First was Tommy Holmes of Boston Braves and then Sawyer at Philadelphia. The American changes saw the departure of Rogers Hornsby of St. Louis and Red Rolfe of Detroit Tigers.

## Rogers Hornsby New Manager Of Cincinnati Reds

CINCINNATI, July 28 (AP)—Cincinnati Reds tonight named Rogers Hornsby as new manager to replace Luke Sewell who resigned earlier today.

Gabe Paul, general manager of the Cincinnati baseball club, announced from New York that Hornsby will be manager through the balance of the season and through 1953.

Paul said Hornsby will take over the club when the Reds return to Crosley Field Aug. 5 for a series with Chicago Cubs.

Paul said that Luke Sewell will continue as manager of the Reds through the Philadelphia series that closes Wednesday night.
