New "Bomb" For Cancer Treatment

WINNIPEG, Aug. 28 — A radioactive "cobalt bomb" for the treatment of cancer passed through here today on its way to Vancouver where a British Columbia clinic will shortly begin using it in the fight to kill cancerous growths on human beings.

The bomb, housed in a massive 7,000-pound structure built by an Ottawa firm, is being carried in a sealed Canadian National Railway car under special orders. If the cobalt were not shielded and controlled, it would give off 100,000 times the radiation a person standing two feet away could safely absorb.

Parliamentary Ass'n. Members Due In Montreal

OTTAWA, Aug. 28 — (CP) — Practically all races, colors and creeds will be represented here at a conference of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association.

The Association will meet Sept. 8-14, inclusive. Before the meeting delegates—they will arrive in Montreal tomorrow—will visit Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. After the discussions—the first in Canada since 1928—they will visit Ontario and Western Canada.

The delegates, representing all parts of the commonwealth, the United States and the republic of Ireland, will return home Oct. 5.

They will travel to Quebec Sunday after a brief trip to the Laurentians. Sept. 1 they will inspect developments of the Aluminum Company of Canada at Arvida. The following day they will visit Quebec and be guests of the Governor-General Vincent Massey at his summer home, visit the Legislature and attend a reception by the Lieutenant-Governor, Hon. Gaspard Fautoux.

In Quebec the delegation will be split into two groups—one will visit Charlottetown and the other Halifax.

The first group will arrive in Charlottetown at 6:10 p.m. EDT Sept. 3 and be greeted by the provincial cabinet. The following day they will inspect Confederation Chamber, visit Government House and drive to Summerside. They will leave the Island Sept. 5.

The Halifax group will arrive there at 7:50 p.m. EDT Sept. 3. They will spend a day in the city and district. The two groups will spend most of Sept. 5 visiting points in New Brunswick. They will be reunited in Fredericton and from there will leave Sept. 6 for the Ottawa meetings.

The Brownies, Guides, Cubs and Scouts, who had been drawn up to take part in the ceremony of tree planting, were further thrilled to see three of their friends and leaders, receive well merited decorations at the hands of His Excellency.

Civic Luncheon In Honor Of The Governor General

The informal civic luncheon arranged for at Dalvay in honour of His Excellency the Governor General and male members of his party yesterday, proved a most pleasing interlude in the series of more formal activities associated with the Vice Regal visit.

On arriving at Dalvay, the party was met by the manager, Mr. Wendell H. Worth and Mrs. Worth, and conducted to the cottage occupied by Viscount Alexander and his family when they vacationed here during his term of office as Governor General.

The grounds at once took on an atmosphere of informality as His Excellency moved about, with members of his staff, exchanging greetings with members of the City Council and administration. Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse, and Premier J. Walter Jones were present as guests of the city.

The same atmosphere of pleasurable informality prevailed during the luncheon hour, which called for a fish menu with fresh boiled Prince Edward Island lobster. An unexpected meeting with a friend of long standing, Mr. Paul Penimore Cooper, a grand-nephew of James Penimore Cooper, who regularly spends his summers at Dalvay, gave His Excellency an opportunity to renew his acquaintance and chat over earlier times.

Before leaving on return to the city, His Excellency expressed his pleasure at being in such pleasing surroundings, referring more than once to the beautiful view of sea and sand dunes, and other attractions in the National Park Area, which he described as "delightfully refreshing."

Another Name On Golden Shovel

The Golden Shovel, used successfully since 1912 by distinguished visitors in planting trees at the Experimental Farm, was stepped up another notch in historic value, when the first Canadian-born Governor General of Canada, the Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey, planted a Linden on the now famous lawn.

After each performance, the shovel has a name added to the upper side, and care is always taken to use it as a clay container for two or three small portions of earth. The actual filling and tamping is done after the ceremony. The following inscription appears on the implement: "Trees planted Experimental Farm: Duke of Connaught 1912; Albert Edward Prince of Wales 1919; Duke of Devonshire 1920; Lady Byng 1923; Earl of Bessborough 1931; Earl of Bessboro 1935; Lord Tweedsmuir 1937; Earl of Athlone 1940; Duke of Kent 1941; Viscount Alexander 1946; Dr. Newbold 1947; Dr. Graysey 1947; St. Williams 1947; H.R.H. Princess Elizabeth 1951; Dr. J. A. Clark 1952; Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey, Governor General 1952."

Visit Here Of Colonel Morrison

Col. George Morrison of the Head Office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission, spent yesterday in Charlottetown on official business. During the morning he visited the Department of Veterans Affairs, and spent the afternoon at the National Employment Office. Col. Conrad, District Administrator of D.V.A. is a personal friend.

Much of Colonel Morrison's work has to do with veterans employment problems, and during his Maritime tour he has called on most of the Veterans' Employment officers attached to the various National Employment offices.

The Colonel is a native of Amherst but his people on both sides of the family are Islanders. During the first war he served with many Islanders in the 6th C.M.R. and later joined the Flying Corps. In World War II he had a staff position at Canadian Headquarters.

In addition to his duties with the Unemployment Insurance Commission, he is also serving on a committee administering and directing the Canadian contribution to the Colombo plan; a united effort of the British Commonwealth Nations to assist other Commonwealth countries in the Near East.

Colonel Morrison is also a contributor to the highly regarded Canadian periodical Saturday Night. He is known to a very wide circle of Island military men, many of whom are intimate friends.
