LIVESTOCK MONTREAL (CP) — Steers were steady to 50 cents lower, heifers and cows were steady to 50 cents higher and hogs steady to \$1 higher on the Montreal livestock markets this week. Trading was generally active and demand good, except in steers, where trading was slow. Receipts this week were: 1,653 cattle, 1,102 calves, 835 hogs and 20 sheep and lambs. Last week cattle receipts were 1,510. Good choice steers sold at 24-25, medium 21-24 and common 14-21-75. Good heifers were 20-21, medium 17-19-75 and common 10-18-75. Good cows made 16-50 - 17-75, medium 15-16-50, common 12-50-15-75 and canners and cutters 13-15. Good bulls were 18-20-21 and common and medium 14-25-19. Good vealers sold at 31 - 36, medium 27-31, common 12-50 - 27, grassers 12-17-50 and feeders 17-50-19. Good lambs sold at 19-25, common-14-19 and sheep 5-10. At the west-end market, grade A hogs were 27-28 and sows 20-21. Grade A hogs were 27 plus 20 cents each at the east - end market and sows were 18 - 20. Some sows were 18 - 19 plus 20 cents each.
