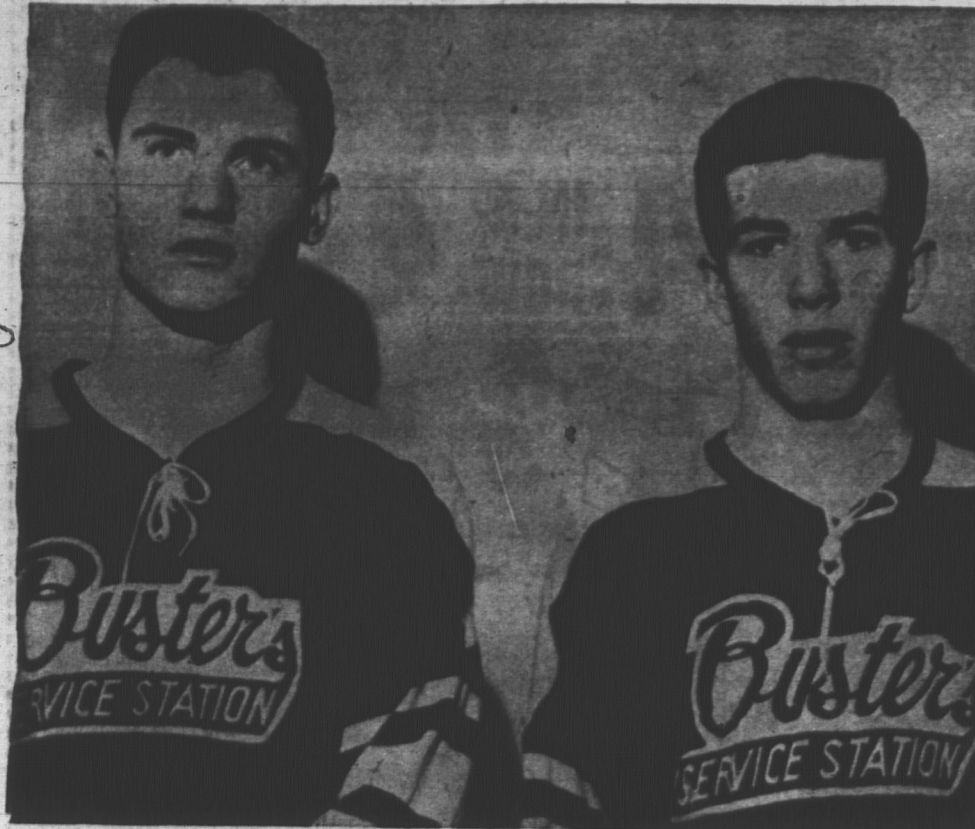
Hampshire Nips Nine Mile Creek
