Annual Employment Drive For Berry Pickers Begins

Warm June sunshine and its accompanying spirit in general growing conditions provides an almost infallible sign for the National Employment Service that it is time to prepare for the strawberry picking season.

Berry growing has become big business on Prince Edward Island and the growing, picking, retailing or processing of the berries is a far cry from the berry patch that lay at the end of most farm gardens just a few years ago.

Many of the growers now plant from two to 15 acres of strawberry plants. These must be planted the year before and cultivated and hoed all summer, then covered with straw in the late fall.

The following spring the growers remove the covering straw and spread this between the rows to help keep down weeds and insects, then they dig their fingers crossed against a late frost which can in one night destroy the work of a year.

RECRUIT PICKERS

About the first week in June the staff of the National Employment Service steps into the picture, timing their actions to suit the seasonal weather conditions. Visits are made to the local high schools, Y.M.C.A. and the Youth Centre to place posters inviting young people over 14 years of age to come to the National Employment Service office to register as pickers.

Advertisements in the local papers are used to follow up these visits. National Employment Service personnel then call on the growers and on the processing plants to determine their probable needs. This work is usually carried out by Miss Joan Strain and Mrs. H. E. Moore of the National Employment Service staff.

ALBERTON BOARD OF THE GUARDIAN

Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade held their regular meeting last night in Royal Valley fire hall with the president Ed. Turner presiding and with a very large attendance.

The secretary, C.R. Leard, gave an encouraging report of a meeting in Moncton with the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade's committee on northern area concerning a proposed shipping service from Point du Chene to Island ports and Newfoundland. Further information is expected in the near future.

Frank Bryan, chairman of the tourist committee, reported that a tourist promotion committee is operating very well and a brochure is being prepared. The committee is headed by Mrs. William O'Brien of Alberton.

EXPERIMENT

Twenty-one farmers have taken advantage of an agricultural experiment being conducted under the sponsorship of the board through the West Prince Development Foundation, the secretary told the meeting.

Crops being planned or completed include: sugar beets, grain crops, soy beans, tomatoes and turk tobacco. The planting and seeding operations are being supervised by fieldman Charles Thibault.

The secretary gave a comprehensive report of the annual meeting in Charlottetown of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade. It was noted that out of 128 boats, West Prince has had a member on the eight-member executive since 1956. At present, Mr. Leard is vice-president for P.E.I.

SHALLOW HARBOR

Harvey Hutt, reporting for the fisheries committee, told the meeting that there are only about seven to eight feet of water on the outer bar at Alberton harbor and it was apparent that the department of public works have the harbor protection surveyed.

Don MacKenzie, O'Leary, gave a brief report on transportation. Some complaints were received from the Tyne Valley area regarding the present mail truck service and a request to be made for a mail pickup on the truck's return trip.

Social Science Council Holds Symposium

The Social Science Research Council of Canada met yesterday in Memorial Centre Museum for a symposium on the financial and institutional support of research in the social sciences in Canada, including outlines of the present situation.

Afternoon session began at two o'clock, and was chaired by T.C. Falandys, who recently won the Governor General's award for his two-volume Brown University of Toronto. He was representing history. There were also representatives of economic sociology, political science and geography.

The evening session dealt with experience abroad in the field, and was chaired by J.A. Corry, principal of Queen's University.

Work of the American equivalent of the council was discussed by Pendleton Herring, president of that organization. The international council's deputy secretary, general, Clemens Heller, outlined the program of social sciences research councils in general. A. B. Charns from the department of scientific and industrial research spoke in support of the Social Sciences in Britain.

The council has scheduled only a one-day meeting.

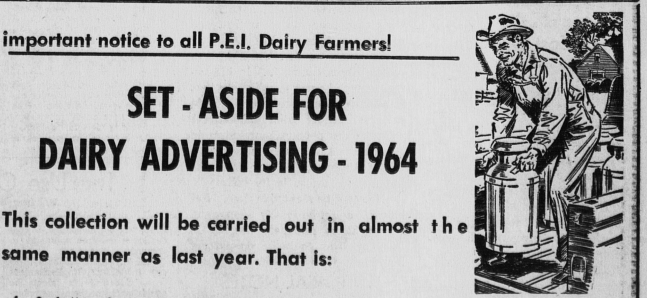
