1964. And he made the spectacular one-day trip to New York to address the General Assembly in a peace appeal.

The Pope had planned to make the first papal journey behind the Iron Curtain with a visit to Poland earlier this year to mark the country's 1,000th anniversary of christianization. But, in a flareup of church-state differences, the Warsaw government blocked the trip.

Pope Paul has received invitations to visit numerous countries in Latin America, as well as France and the Philippines. It had been generally thought he might choose to accept one of those invitations before returning to North America so relatively soon after his trip to New York.

handier to most delegates' capitals—would be Switzerland, between Geneva and Lausanne.

Barody said delegates were grateful to Americans and New Yorkers for their help. But he added that there were four factors that make New York City a bad place for UN headquarters:

1. New York is too crowded.
2. Colored delegates suffer from racial discrimination.
3. Diplomats are bothered by political pressure groups.
4. The cost of living is too high.

Barody contended that UN headquarters originally was located

in New York to "make sure the United States would join" and to give an adequate forum to the Soviets, who "couldn't fight the propaganda of the U.S. against them except by being in the middle of it." Both purposes had been fulfilled.

"When Gordon was in finance, he was called the best the Liberals ever had. Now they say Sharp is cleaning up the mess Gordon left while Gordon goes across the country saying there is a rift in the cabinet—and I can't disagree with him."

Mr. Diefenbaker said a new form of Liberalism is evident in Canada, a form which enables ministers to make statements one day and change them the next.

"Last week the Liberal convention decided the civil service should be bilingual. Later, Mr. Pearson thanked them for the resolution and then said it was not the government view."

In a sweeping attack on the Liberal administration, Mr. Diefenbaker charged that the Liberals have broken many promises—the latest being the medical care plan—and that the Liberal government is trying to "destroy the freedom of Canadians."

He said the Bill of Rights, implemented when he was prime minister, is not now obtainable from the Queen's printer.

"Mr. Pearson has ordered its printing to be discontinued in an effort to destroy the Bill of Rights. It's another attempt by the Liberal party to rewrite history."

CRITICIZES STAND

He also lashed out at the Liberal attitude toward the Canadian centennial celebration, saying that "to too great a degree this national celebration seems to have been appropriated by those in office in Ottawa for their own purposes without regard to the fact that there are other political parties that made their contribution to Confederation."

Mr. Diefenbaker said the Conservatives have asked the government to act on inflation by cutting its expenditures.

But, he said, "now they are going to buy nine of 10 costly aircraft because ministers can't get around fast enough. They're all over the world and expenditures pile up."

"Prices are going up inordinately and all the government has done is to set up a parliamentary committee to ascertain if prices are going up, and by the time it reports, the cost of living will be up another six

or seven points. Action is needed now."

### ATTENTION TO YOUTH

Turning to Conservative policies, Mr. Diefenbaker said that if re-elected, his party would appoint a minister of youth affairs and a minister of urban and municipal affairs. The Tories, he said, would implement a national water policy to assure that this resource is retained in Canada, and a national transportation policy aimed at providing adequate transportation for Canadian commodities.

Charging that the Liberal government has reduced the price of wheat by 17 or 18 cents a bushel "without justification," he said the Conservatives "believe the time has come for the government to increase the minimum floor price to \$2 a bushel F.O.B. Fort William a m. from \$1.62½. This will assure farmers a reasonable return on their product and will not cost the Canadian people money."

Mr. Diefenbaker said opposition members had been asking the government to raise the initial payment on the 1966 wheat crop by 25 cents from 14 cents on barley and 10 cents on oats.

"Last week at the convention the Liberals advocated this," he said.

### Elderly Lady Passes Away

SUMMERSIDE — Mrs. William Stanley Ahearn, 68, died early Sunday morning following a fire in her Russell Street home early Saturday. She had suffered minor burns and smoke damage in the fire.

Police rescued the 68-year-old Mrs. Ahearn from the burning home at 12.30 Saturday morning. She was blind and confined to a wheel chair.

One of her sons, Jack, who was in the building when the fire broke out, said last night that he smelled smoke and went to the rooms to arouse his two brothers, Michael and James, but when he returned to rescue his mother, the intense heat drove him back.

Mrs. Ahearn's other son, Mark, was in New Brunswick at the time of the fire.

The fire was believed confined to the front room and kitchen, and is said to have started in the living room. Cause is not known.

The former Clara Kilbride, she is the daughter of the late Mathias Kilbride and Mrs. Kilbride of Foxley River.

Her husband died a few years ago.

She is survived by five sons, John (Jack), Michael, James, and Mark, at home, and William in Germany; and four daughters, Irene (Mrs. Charles Hogan), Summerside; Anne (Mrs. Guy Fox), New Brunswick; Rosemary (Mrs. Alonzo Barlett), Saint John, N.B.; and Margaret (Mrs. Bill Nelson), Buffalo Gap, Saskatchewan.

OTTAWA (CP)—A long-standing informal ban on Roman Catholic participation in YMCA activities in Canada appears near an end.

The Canadian Catholic Conference, an organization of the church's hierarchy, has reported that it has approved a joint study with the YMCA national office regarding policies for Catholic activity in Y programs.

Archbishop Philip Pocock of Toronto told a news conference: "The YMCA has been regarded by the church with certain reservations before." It had been felt that YMCA programs in Christian teaching were liable to foster a religion of indifference.

SUMMERSIDE — Considerable damage was caused in two separate two-car collisions over the weekend in Prince County.

The first mishap occurred at Wellington at 8.30 p.m. Saturday when a three-ton truck, owned by Thane Ellis of Summerside, and driven by Joseph Albert Arsenault of Summerside, collided with a one-half ton International truck. The half-ton was driven by Anthony Joseph Gallant of Wellington. Total damage was estimated at \$750.

At 1.15 a.m. Sunday, at Margate, a 1953 Ford, driven by Alvin Bruce MacLeod of French River left the road and snapped off a power pole. He was taken to Prince County Hospital with undetermined injuries.

The accident occurred on the corner of Russell and Harvard Streets about 1.30 p.m.

The driver and four passengers in the Moose station wagon were not injured.

The Summerside police investigated the accident. The police did not release the names of the drivers.

### Forces Seek More Women

TORONTO (CP) — Defence Minister Hellyer says the Canadian armed forces are seeking more women members.

Speaking Saturday night at the 25th anniversary dinner of the Royal Canadian Air Force Women's Division, he said the RCAF already has started a recruiting drive and the other services will begin campaigns soon.

"We are back in the business of wanting well-qualified young ladies to do a number of jobs."

On integration of the armed forces, Mr. Hellyer said there is no question that it is the correct move.

Canada should take the lead in armed forces integration because other countries eventually will adopt a similar format.

The three-day reunion of former members of the RCAF women's corps from across Canada ended Sunday.

### Camp Stresses Need For Unity

WATERLOO, Ont. (CP) — Unity is necessary for survival of the Progressive Conservative party, President Dalton Camp, said Saturday.

"We are no longer in an age where authoritarianism can carry a political system," he told a one-day convention of the Ontario Progressive Conservative Students Association.

The 24 voting delegates adopted a resolution calling for a general meeting of the party once a year. They also urged that the national party leadership be re-assessed by secret ballot at every second general meeting starting in 1967.

### Chrysler Plans Salaried Layoff

DETROIT (AP) — Chrysler Corp., citing increased costs, plans to lay off a number of its 30,000 salaried employees. The number of planned layoffs was not reported.

Chrysler's recent action in which it trimmed proposed prices of 1967 models to meet lower prices listed by General Motors Corp. was cited as a factor in the expenditure trimming.

Six years ago, Chrysler laid off some 7,000 general salaried employees to permit the firm to operate profitably.

## Christianity In U.S. Pictured In Danger

DURHAM, N.C. (AP)—Bishop Pike, charged with heresy by a group of fellow Episcopal (Anglican) bishops, says Christianity in the United States could become defunct unless the church is revitalized soon.

"The educated populace will not accept the old cliches, the old affirmations," Bishop Pike said in a sermon at the Duke University chapel here.

"They want to know what they can do."

He talked enthusiastically of the church becoming "a cause in the world but said this renewal must take place in the next two years if Christianity is to survive."

"Sermons should not only comfort the afflicted, but should also afflict the comfortable," Bishop Pike said.

Later, he told reporters that churches have been "holding up the wrong emblems. People are in it for security not for challenge."

"It's expensive to be a Christian," he continued. "You may get it like Jesus got it. The pharisees disagreed with him on doctrine, but what really nailed him was civil disobedience—when he upset the money changers' tables."

Episcopal Bishop Henry Louth of south Florida initiated the heresy charges pending against Bishop Pike. He is charged with promulgating heretical views on the Trinity, the virgin birth and other doctrines. The charges are to be reviewed by the Episcopal House of Bishops at their annual meeting Oct. 23-27 in Wheeling, W. Va.

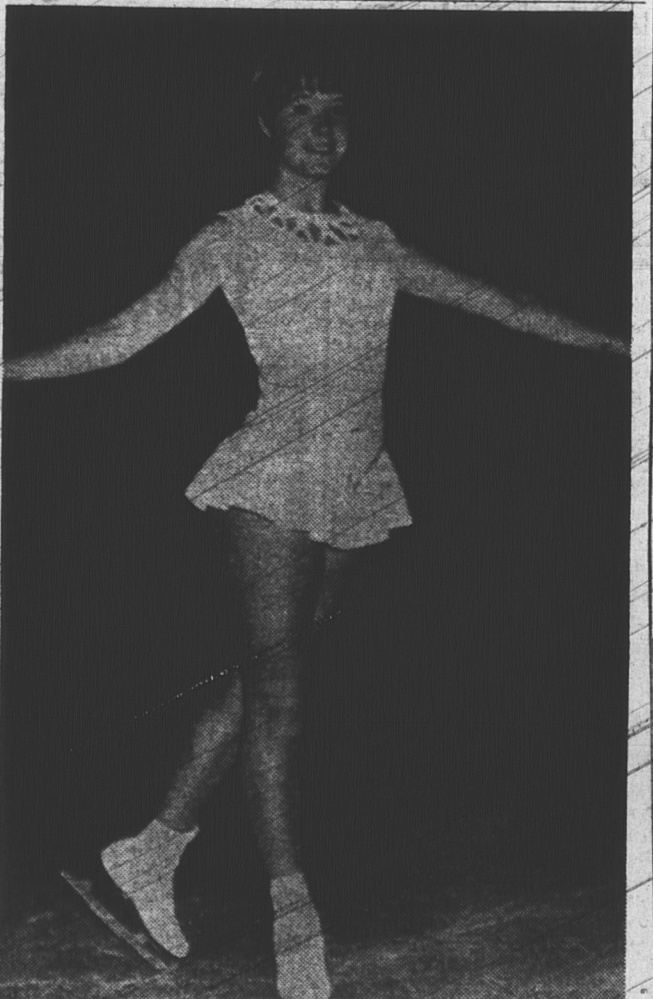
