

Fraser Brothers Ousted; Laver, Mulligan In Finals

WIMBLEDON, England (Reuters)—Red Laver, missing for tennis' grand slam, and rising young fellow Australian Mary Mulligan advanced Wednesday to the finals of the men's singles event in the all-England lawn tennis tournament.

Red-haired Laver, 23, the defending champion and No. 1 seed, beat third-seeded Neale Fraser, 10-8, 6-1, 7-6, and Mulligan defeated Neale's brother, Dr. John Fraser, 6-3, 6-2, 6-2 in the all-Australian semi-finals.

Laver, who lost to Neale Fraser in the final here two years ago and beat American Chuck McKinley last year, was superb in winning to become the first man in 49 years to reach four successive Wimbledon finals. New Zealand's Tony Wilding did it 1910 to 1913.

Mulligan, 21, is the fourth seeded player to reach the finals, but his survival has not been freakish. He had a match point against Laver in last month's French championships before losing in a quarter-final match.

Laver won the French and Australian championships and needs wins at Wimbledon and the August United States tournament to complete the tennis grand slam, which would bring with it lucrative offers to tour professionally.

FRASER FIGHTS HARD

Neale Fraser, 23, fought back after being two sets down against his former Davis Cup teammate, but Laver, as in the previous round against Spanish champion Santana, was more than equal to all he could offer.

Dr. Fraser, 23, playing in his first Wimbledon, could not recapture the fire and spirit that carried him through the earlier rounds. He seemed to lose heart

"THE greatest thing that has happened to the American League in years" is the way President Joe Cronin sums up the close race being waged in the loop under his jurisdiction.

Undoubtedly Joe is thinking of some semblance of a race in fact when the teams round into the turn for the last September drive. If things were then like they are now, man on man, wouldn't he be interested?

We're afraid, as most folks are, that the Yankees' power will soon take control and bell these ambitious ones such as Angels and Twins all over the lot. Mind you, we are not hoping this will happen. On the contrary, it would be a most delightful surprise to see somebody other than the Yankees getting home in front and facing the National League champions in the world series.

Much as we would be overjoyed to see such a thing occur, we must openly admit we just don't think it possible for Ralph Houk's boys to miss out on this 1962 pennant.

We can't say, however, that we are overcome by the courage of those folks who are picking the Yankees. It surely doesn't require a great spirit to bet a few dollars that the Bombers. But to bet in front of a crowd would take about the same amount of courage as would be required to buy a two-dollar show ticket on June Byrd here this Saturday night.

We certainly don't insist that the Yankees are the best team in the American League. We agree with that. But we can't stand those "heroes" who try to set themselves up as prophets by predicting that the Yankees will triumph. They are the type of citizens who would be willing to bet you that Saturday will follow Friday this week.

Stengel vs. Houk

AND then there are those oddities who are not satisfied with the way manager Ralph Houk is managing things in New York. They still want to talk about Casey Stengel as tears come to their eyes.

Those folks will probably be telling us that Casey is one of the coaches for the National League All-Star team next Tuesday because of his great achievements with New York Mets this season. We're just waiting for somebody to try to push that down our throats.

We think it's most fitting that the man who managed so many American League teams in all-star competition be recognized in his first year in the senior circuit. It was an honor that Old Case has earned by his own merit.

But those "diehards" who still aren't convinced that Ralph Houk belongs in the majors had better have another look at the Major's record last season. He won the pennant, the world series and saw Whitey Ford enjoy his greatest season on the mound. This season with Mantle still doing over a month with Maris hitting far below par and with the great reliever, Don Aronow, out of action for a long time, Houk has stayed in the thick of things and right now is a heavy favorite to finish in front. We aren't saying Stengel wouldn't have done as good as we insist he surely couldn't have done any better.

NO, we aren't pulling for the Yankees to win the pennant. We think it would be great to see some of these upstarts grab the flag. However, that doesn't blind us to the fact that we are certain that Houk has done an excellent job as pilot of the Bombers. He is a tough job to take over but he handled himself with distinction.

We know that if Houk was managing the Mets instead of Stengel, this season would be still floundering around in the league basement. Casey can't make a silk purse out of a sow's ear and neither could Houk.

But the Yankees will be still pursue all ready-made. It's Stengel who needs to see a transformation taking place. It's likely Old Case will see much change for the better in 1963. He likely will be hired to manage the Yankees. His last job was managing a pennant winner. This time—through no fault of his own—he's most likely to wind up directing traffic for the cellar-dwellers.

Angels Grab AL Lead; Landrigan Cops Top Rifle Honors

The Angels took over as the baseball capital Wednesday as the Angels climbed into first place in the American League. The tight race and the Dodgers held onto their slim lead in the National League.

Both leagues swept holiday doubleheaders. The Angels whipped Washington 4-2 and the Yankees won AL's top spot away from New York Yankees, who split with Kansas City, 1-1, and fell half-game back of Philadelphia 16-1 and 7-3, staying a half-game ahead of San Francisco, a double winner over New York Mets.

The Yanks exploded their home run power for a 7-3 romp after being swamped by the Athletics in the first game, 11-1, and a tell-half-game back of the Angels. San Francisco trounced the Mets 11-4 and 16-3.

TWIN SPLIT WITH BOSONS

In other games—Minnesota and Boston divided a pair, the Twins taking the opener 4-2 and the Red Sox winning the second 8-5; Cleveland won two extra-inning affairs from Detroit, 1-0, on Gene Green's pinch single in the 10th and 8-2 on Don Dilardi's grand slam in the 10th; Chicago outscored Cleveland 7-3 and Cincinnati 6-1 in a single game.

In eight action, Pittsburgh led 7-0 in the fifth inning of the first game of a doubleheader. The Houston in Coastal Atlantic Region. St. Louis 7-5 in the completion of their suspended game of Tuesday night which preceded a regularly scheduled game.

The Angels got two-run homers sweep over the Senators. Ken McBride took his seventh straight pitching victory in the first game, which was riddled from Dean Chance. Ted Boswell of Peoria, Ill., won the second.
