MOSE PARLIAMENT.—The meeting of this assembly last night was one of more than ordinary interest. After the usual routine business, in the absence of the Hon. Mr. Laird, Speaker, the Clerk, Mr. A. MacNeill presided, and Mr. W. Donlin acted as Clerk pro tem. The adjourned debate on the second reading of the bill respecting educational qualifications of electors was resumed. The speakers on the Government side of the House were Messrs. E. Matheson, G. S. Inman and McKee, Oppositionists, Messrs. F. W. L. Moore, F. Vessey, J. MacLeod and W. A. McKee. The debate was vigorously sustained on both sides. The bill was then committed to a committee of the whole House. Mr. E. Duchesne took the chair of the committee, and after some time spent therein, the acting speaker took the chair, and the chairman reported that the committee had made some progress and had directed him to move for leave to sit again, which the House agreed to. Mr. J. A. Macdonald, Leader of the Government, gave notice that at the next sitting he would introduce a bill to abolish the Senate, and then the House adjourned until Tuesday next at 9 o'clock, p. m.

NEWS NOTES

Canada's trade and navigation returns show that the exports in 1893 were valued at \$118,619,750, as compared with \$113,963,375 in 1892, an increase of \$4,656,375. The total imports were \$129,074,266, as compared with \$127,406,065 in 1892.

The New York Chamber of Commerce has adopted a resolution urging that any changes in the tariff bill reducing the duties on articles imported from Canada should be suspended for a while.

The Indian Government proposes to get out of the difficulty created by the fall in silver by imposing a duty of 5 per cent. on all imports, including silver, but excluding cotton yarn and fabrics. This latter provision is for the benefit of English manufacturers. With the ruling authorities Manchester is a bigger power than India.

Even if New England's deserted churches are as numerous as her abandoned farms there are still some good old Puritans left. A venerable lady living near the Hub on hearing a friend say that she had been to a "what party," asked: "What do they do there?" "Why, play cards," was the response. "That's what I'd heard," was the lady's retort, "but I didn't believe it."

A report from the upper Ottawa says the great icebergs are not so much, and at four to five feet, seriously impeding the operation of the lumbermen, and that the result may be the shortening of the cut by 75,000,000 feet.

Some shanties have had to be abandoned, and at others the way has had to be cleared by shovelling. Whether there be a dearth or a glut of the lumber season, extra cost will be incurred to the extent of the price of lumber rises profits will be diminished.

In the Russian army there is one particular regiment of infantry of the guard, formed by Emperor Paul, the men of which are recruited, not so much with regard to their height or the color of their hair and complexion, as to the shape of their noses. Emperor Paul had a typical Kosak nose of the most exorbitantly up-lifted pattern, and since then out of compliment to him, all the officers and men of this particular regiment have noses of the same shape, the slight which they present on parade being somewhat startling.

The Montreal Herald tries to make a point against the National Policy because of the alleged number of unemployed in some Canadian cities. The Herald admits that the number of unemployed in Montreal is not large, but it claims that there is great distress in Toronto has suffered somewhat recently, but not on account of the National Policy. The depression in that city is due rather to the real estate and building boom of a few years ago, and the inevitable collapse, which has been, in fact, no doubt, by the more cautious policy of the banks, on account of the depression abroad. We notice also that at a meeting of Toronto clergymen held for similar measures for relieving the distress, the statement was made that the number of desperate unemployed was not so large as reported.

The Maxim gun in action has been well tested in the Martello Island campaign. In the skirmish of October 25 the Maxim gun effectively checked the natives. Although the natives were armed with Martini-Henry and Winchester rifles, they were powerless before the terrible fire of the Maxim gun, which mowed them down like wheat before a scythe. In the morning the sight was terrible. The bodies were literally a mass of pieces by the shot. Each time they approached they were quickly repulsed with the aid of the machine gun. The Armstrong 7-pounder has also rendered efficient service in the campaign. On one occasion a shell dropped harmlessly upon the ground, when the negroes immediately began firing upon it. The shell then exploded killing several.

Here is a story illustrating the ready tact of Ellen Terry, the actress. She had promised to introduce a man to Mr. Irving but had forgotten his name. On the pretext, as the story goes, that she and Mr. Irving had a dispute about the way the man's name was spelled, making a bet about it, she got him to write it on a slip of paper. She, too, when she had forgotten a name, said that she wished to settle a dispute about the spelling of the name by having it written out for her. The man then graciously scribbled his name. It was a name that is not spelled in more than a dozen different ways. It was Jones!

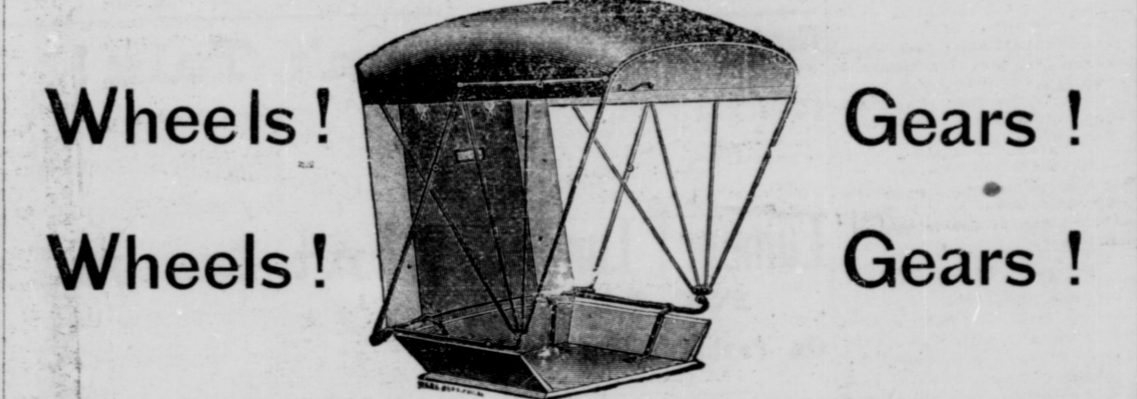
