Volunteer Agency's Value In TB Control Is Stressed

Ralph E. J. Ricketts, executive secretary of the Nova Scotia Tuberculosis Association, said yesterday that the present program of tuberculosis case finding on the voluntary level in Nova Scotia is patterned precisely on that carried out in Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Ricketts was speaking at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League held yesterday at the Charlottetown Hotel.

He said that Dr. E. M. Found, who is director of TB control in P.E.I., really started a new experiment when he began leaf testing. Although at first there was some opposition to this method in other parts of Canada, it is now used extensively in many parts of the country.

Mr. Ricketts devoted much of his talk to the value and necessity of volunteer workers in the provincial tuberculosis testing programs.

Volunteers are people who have a deep personal interest in their communities, he said, and without whom the tuberculosis testing work could not be carried out.

Mr. Ricketts told the meeting that the existence of a voluntary organization as a tuberculosis detection agency is of paramount importance so that the medical people will be able to keep complete control over the disease.

He noted also that the various TB organizations must be prepared to assist to a greater degree in the field of research.

OUTLINES RESULTS

Rev. G. J. Steele, an executive member of the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League, outlined the results of the 1961 tuberculosis testing and x-ray survey in western Prince County.

He noted that residents of 112 school districts were surveyed, with a total attendance of slightly over 10,000 at the clinics. Some 400 volunteer workers assisted the TB League workers.

Of those attending the test clinics, 4,685 were x-rayed with five cases of TB being found and the patients hospitalized. Ten additional cases will remain under observation, he noted.

Dr. F. A. MacMillan, also an executive member, told the meeting that a total of 7,927 people were x-rayed by the new mobile unit purchased by the league in 1961.

Those checked included residents and staff of the Provincial Infirmary, Beach Grove Inn and the Sacred Heart Home, staff of the department of national revenue office in Charlottetown, students at PWC and SDU as well as a survey in the

Town of Summerside. Teachers at their annual convention were also checked.

Five new active cases of tuberculosis were discovered by these tests and the patients admitted to the sanatorium, the doctor noted.

CASE REGISTER

As of Dec. 31, 1961, the tuberculosis case register located at the sanatorium contained the names of 940 persons and 845 of these were examined during the year, with the result that 13 were detected as having reactivation of their disease and were hospitalized, Miss Erma Tait, RN, co-ordinating nurse of the outpatient clinic reported.

During 1961, 190 stationary tuberculosis clinics on Prince Edward Island were conducted at five centres and 3,592 persons were examined with 38 new active cases and 13 re-activation cases or a total of 51 cases requiring treatment being found, Miss Tait said. Of these 18 were under 20 years of age.

Dr. E.M. Found reported that Prince Edward Island had the greatest increase in returns for Christmas seals in Canada in 1961. He said P.E.I. had raised slightly over \$13,000, an increase of 4.8 per cent over 1960.

On the subject of the community-wide tuberculin and x-ray survey on P.E.I., his report showed that only 4.7 per cent of children 5-14 years of age surveyed in western Queens and Prince counties reacted positively to tuberculin tests, a reduction of 2.3 per cent over the previous year.

Dr. Found also touched on the role of the voluntary workers, saying that in countries where tuberculosis has shown the most marked decline voluntary organizations have been in operation.

ARE REHABILITATED

I closing he noted that two men from Central Europe who came here during World Refugee Year have both been rehabilitated and have jobs in Charlottetown. In addition to other services rendered these men the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League successfully undertook to teach them English.

Health Ass'n Meets In N.B.

FREDERICTON (CP) — The New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island branch of the Canadian Public Health Association concluded its three-day annual meeting here Friday with a talk on infectious hepatitis by Dr. C. W. Kelly, New Brunswick director of health planning services.

Dr. Kelly emphasized the increased incidence of the disease and said indications are it rapidly is becoming a major health problem.

High peaks of hepatitis occur in late autumn and early winter and epidemics occur under conditions of close living quarters, laxity of general sanitation and poor personal hygiene, he said.

Economic Survey Planned For P.E.I.

The provincial government will make use of federal technical personnel to carry out an economic survey of the province, Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter said this morning.

Mr. Rossiter said the government has plans for economic development, such as locating small industries in various parts of the province, and federal technicians will be called in to offer advice.

Two representatives of the federal department of agriculture, Cliff Retson, agricultural economist, and L. Rayner, business management specialist, met with Mr. Rossiter in Premier Walter R. Shaw's office this morning to discuss preliminary details of the survey.

Also attending were Marketing Director Reid Sangster and Research Director Hartwell Daley.

According to Mr. Rossiter, the survey will start in Prince County.

Premier Shaw said the main objective of the survey is to develop a program in the expansion of the province's natural resources.

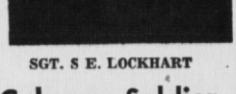
Technical personnel of various provincial government departments will assist in the survey.

Need Stressed For Sea Control

MONTREAL (CP) — Vice-admiral H. S. Rayner, chief of Canada's naval staff, said Thursday night control of the seas is just as important now as it has ever been.

Russia had recognized this fact by building a force of more than 400 submarines, he told the Montreal branch of the Navy League of Canada.

Russia was reported building a nuclear submarine fleet armed with missiles, and "perhaps it was missiles from these submarines that Premier Khrushchev had in mind when he talked about a global missile."

Green Asks Firm Stand By NATO On Arms Talks

ATHENS (CP) — External Affairs Minister Green of Canada Friday asked NATO to take a positive attitude toward the Geneva disarmament conference.

In a 20-minute speech to the NATO council, Green said it is essential that the alliance recognize in its communiqué on the current meeting the importance NATO attaches to disarmament and the cessation of nuclear weapons tests.

Green pleaded with the council to avoid making any challenging statement which might hurt the Geneva conference or a possible settlement on Berlin. The minister gave strong support to the United States action in negotiating with Russia on Berlin. He described as promising the idea which has come out of these negotiations for an international authority to help regulate access to Berlin.

Publisher Dies In London At 77

LONDON (Reuters) — Harry Guy Bartholomew, 77, who rose from newspaper office boy to chairman of the huge London Daily Mirror and Sunday Pictorial, died Friday at his home in suburban Surrey.

He succeeded as chairman of the present group, Cecil Harnsworth King, in 1951.

He was one of the pioneers of the newspaper strip cartoon and the large type-faced headlines.
