RESCUED FROM DEATH.

Thrilling Incidents at a Fire in Boston—Several Injured.

Boston, Feb. 21.—An early morning fire in Clarendon park, a residential section adjacent to Columbus avenue, led to a number of thrilling incidents, chief of which was the rescue of a man from sure death by the bravery of several firemen in manning a life net. When the first fire engine reached the park scantily-clad men women and children were fleeing from a number of houses, only one of which was on fire, but from this side flames were coming from the basement, first and second floors. On the window-sill of the third story stood James Robinson, clad in a night shirt. Below him the flames were crackling and he called piteously for help. Lieut. Hoar, of the engine company, ordered out the life net and with ten or twelve men placed it close against the building, so close that the heat from the fire blistered and burned the men before they left their posts. Robinson was told to jump into the net, but he kept delaying through fright and all the time the flames from the basement were drawing nearer to the firemen at the net. Then came a crash of glass, and smoke poured out of the window behind Robinson, who lost his hold, falling towards the net, his body striking Lieut. Hoar and fireman Kelly on the head, slightly injuring both. Robinson fell to the ground unconscious and was later taken to the hospital. In the meantime other fire apparatus had arrived and the fire which was a fierce one, was fought vigorously. An extension ladder was displaced by a hot air explosion throwing firemen Loary and Mahoney to the ground, but as both landed on their feet from a fall of about twenty feet their condition is not serious. The fire started through the explosion of an alcohol lamp, which was being used to warm some milk for a baby.

The harvest of the well-dressed kleptomaniac during the sales does not occasion a very serious debit item in the net results of a "clearance sale." "Some of our regular customers carry off a length of good lace or a remnant of extra special ribbon," said the manager of a West End shop to a Daily Graphic correspondent. "You see," he continued, "it pays us to overlook a bit of lace or ribbon-lifting in a customer whose account averages £50 to £60 a year. Here 'takings' are so limited—perhaps the 'bowler men' are some use after all—that we let her have her trifles just as a little commission on her bill. But we don't stand that sort of thing from ladies we don't know. Of course, we can't afford to prosecute unless the 'lifter' is known to the police. Prosecutions like that would soon ruin a drapper's business. So we quietly ask the lady to restore her concealed bargains, and bow her from the door. She has the sense usually not to come back. There's many a little scene of that kind going on in our fitting rooms during the sales. Sale customers are not allowed to try on bodices in the fitting rooms, so that these little apartments behind the scenes serve for much small tragedies of the bargain sale theatre. I've seen ladies found with an inside of lace caught somehow in an open hook of a mantle, take £60 to £70 worth of jewelry and offer it to us on condition that we say nothing about the 'unfortunate little mistake.'—London Empire

Park Corner Creamery

The annual meeting of the patrons of the above named creamery was held in Irishtown Hall, on Saturday, the 18th inst., Robert Sutherland, Esq., President of the Board of Directors, presided, and the undersigned was appointed secretary.

Mr. J. S. Cousins, owner and manager of the creamery, read his report of the management of the business for the six months ending Nov. 30th, 1898. After thanking the patrons and directors for the hearty support they gave to the industry he announced the following results:

Milk was furnished by 81 patrons. The quantity of milk furnished was 867,824 lbs.; the quantity of butter-fat in milk was 27,868.55 lbs.; the average per cent of fat in milk was 3.19; the quantity of butter manufactured was 35,781 lbs.; the quantity of butter made from one pound of fat was 1.78; the average price realized for butter was 18 cts per lb.; the net value of butter fat was \$1670; the net value of milk per 100 lbs was \$53.61 cts.

He also gave some practical advice concerning the preparation of milk for the factory, and concluded by soliciting the hearty support of all interested to the end that the results of this year may be even more favorable than those of the one just close.

This report was received with great satisfaction by the large and very enthusiastic meeting. Speeches very complimentary to Mr. Cousins, manager, and to Mr. A. Sullivan, butter-maker, were made by several of the patrons, as it is remembered, it is chiefly to the enterprise and perseverance of the owner and manager of the factory, Mr. Cousins, that this great success is due. As may be seen by referring to the public account of a mass meeting held in Irishtown Hall last winter, Mr. Cousins offered to erect the required building, secure all necessary machinery and appliances, provide cold storage and manufacture the butter at 3 1/2 cts per pound. The people accepted this offer, and although Mr. Cousins had no guarantee that the people would give the support promised, nevertheless, he went earnestly to work, and by 1st June, had his creamery ready for work. As all the patrons were not prepared to furnish milk at the beginning, the patronage advanced, the patronage steadily increased until, at the end of the first term the quantity of milk furnished was as shown by result already given. Then the excellence of the butter manufactured is due to the ability of the butter-maker, Mr. A. Sullivan. His knowledge of the industry, experience in the work, and close attention to business have won for Park Corner Creamery a reputation that places it among the foremost in the province.

The officers elected for the present year are: Directors, Robert Sutherland, President; William Ramsay, Vice President; William P. Woodside, M. D. Ready, James Montgomery, Edward McKay, John Johnston. Auditor, Hon. William Campbell. The meeting was orderly and business-like throughout.

COMPARISON OF RACES.—A comparison of races by their anatomy has been attempted by two European anthropologists—the late Prof. Galcomini, of Turin, and M.
