# Miss America Is Selected

**ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)** Deborah Bryant, the Kansas beauty who would like to become a pediatrician and do volunteer work in South Viet Nam has been her reign as Miss America 1966.

She said at a press conference she would like to work with Project Concern, the volunteer organization in Southeast Asia sponsored by the U.S. Junior chambers of commerce. "I would like to teach the natives to treat themselves," said Debbie, a 5-foot-7-inch brown-haired beauty with a 36-23-36 figure.

"This type of work is very worthwhile," she said. Miss Bryant, 19, who represented the Sunflower State in the U.S.'s oldest beauty contest, was selected Saturday night over 49 other girls. They had competed three days in evening gowns, swim suits and talent.

The Canadian Press erroneously reported earlier that Miss Canada, Linda Douma, 20, of Sidney, B.C., was among the contestants. But in fact there were no entries from Canada.

Miss Bryant was crowned by Vonda Kay Van Dyke of Phoenix, Ariz., last year's queen.

Runners-up in order, were Miss Mississippi, Patricia Puckett, 20; Miss Indiana, Eileen Smith, 18; Miss Florida, Carol Blum, 21; and Miss Wisconsin, Sharon Singstock, 20.

**WINS SCHOLARSHIP**  
First prize, in addition to the title, was a \$10,000 scholarship, an opportunity to travel 250,000 miles and an estimated \$80,000 in personal appearance contracts.

Miss Bryant said she was unable to sleep Saturday night, although she looked rested. "I have wanted to become a pediatrician since I was 12 years old," she said. "I just love children."

She will enter Kansas University as a junior when her one year's reign is over, she said, and then go on to the university's medical school. She has completed two years at Christian College.

Debbie's father is a civilian engineer working out of Clark Field in the Philippines. He is currently in Viet Nam. The new Miss America has not seen him since January.

"We're going to try to telephone him tonight," she said. "I don't believe he knows I won yet."

## Cement Plant Near Truro Moving Into Full Production

**TRURO (CP)** - First production from the new \$12,000,000 Maritime Cement Co. Ltd. plant at nearby Brookfield began rolling toward construction sites in the three Maritime provinces last week.

It catches concrete mixers spinning at top pace in the midst of a record Atlantic provin-

ces building boom estimated to be worth some \$385,000,000 this year, an increase of \$75,000,000 over 1964 values.

Official opening ceremonies for the Brookfield plant are scheduled for Sept. 29, but production wheels have been turning since July 24.

"It's just a matter of days before we can go into capacity production of 5,600,000 bags a year," says plant superintendent Donald G. Courtney. "It just boils down to taking the remaining bugs out of machinery."

When the "bugs" come out and the plant becomes fully operational, its output will increase cement production in the Atlantic provinces by approximately 80 per cent.

Maritime Cement, a subsidiary of Canada-Cement Com-

pany, operated the only plant in the Maritimes at Havelock, N.B., prior to the Brookfield opening. The Havelock operation, started in 1951, has an annual capacity of 4,000,000 bags. This output in the past has been supplemented by shipments from the company's Montreal plant.

The only other producer in the Atlantic region is North Star Cement Co. Ltd. of Corner Brook, which recently increased production from 2,000,000 to 3,000,000 bags a year.

Company officials estimate that the 1965 building program in the Maritime provinces will consume a record 2,000,000 bags of cement.

New Brunswick, with its power dam development at Mactaque and base metal concentrator at Bellefleur Point, is top customer with an estimated 3,890,000 bags, followed by Nova Scotia with some 3,000,000 bags and Prince Edward Island with 940,000 bags.

**ESTIMATE DEMAND**  
At peak producing, Mactaque is expected to devour about 40,000 barrels or 160,000 bags of cement a month. Nova Scotia's consumption is almost wholly for buildings while about half of Prince Edward Island's estimated requirements go for cement for road surfacing.

In all, it works out to a pouring job of some 6,500,000 cubic yards of concrete in the Maritimes this year.

Cement requirements in Nova Scotia construction are estimated at about 25 per cent over last year's and about one-third more in New Brunswick.

The Maritime Cement Company's Brookfield plant will use annually about 350,000 tons of limestone rock; the plant is situated on a limestone deposit at its 40-acre site. It will purchase about 5,000 tons of iron shavings from an Amherst plant for necessary iron oxide addition; 7,000 to 8,000 tons of gypsum from National Gypsum Co. Ltd. at Millford, N.S., and 40,000 tons of coal from the Dominion Coal Co.

The coal is used in a kiln operation requiring 100 tons daily to produce a 3,000 degree heating process.
