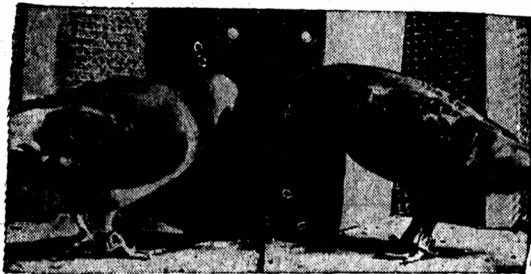

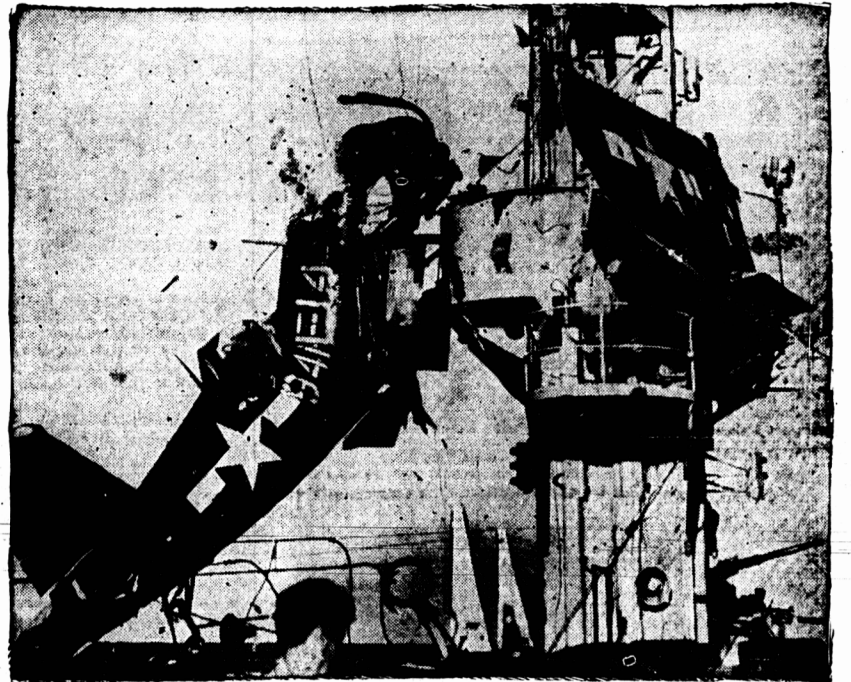


### BIRDS WITH HORSE SENSE

To demonstrate his experiments in learning, Prof. B. F. Skinner gathered pigeons in his psychological lab at Harvard, and put them to work. Hunger was the motivating force. Instead of a gold star, the "student" would get some tasty grains of corn every time he or she would achieve the correct behavior pattern. Above, the pigeons learn co-operation. They are on opposite sides of a plate glass. Each can see the others' buttons. To get fed the pigeons must peck the matching buttons at the same time. When they do this, the two feed doors open, allowing both birds a few seconds to grab as much grain as they can. The door then snaps shut and they try again for another chance. It's a different set each time. After two or three weeks the average pigeon gains excellent co-operation—and of course plenty of nutriment.

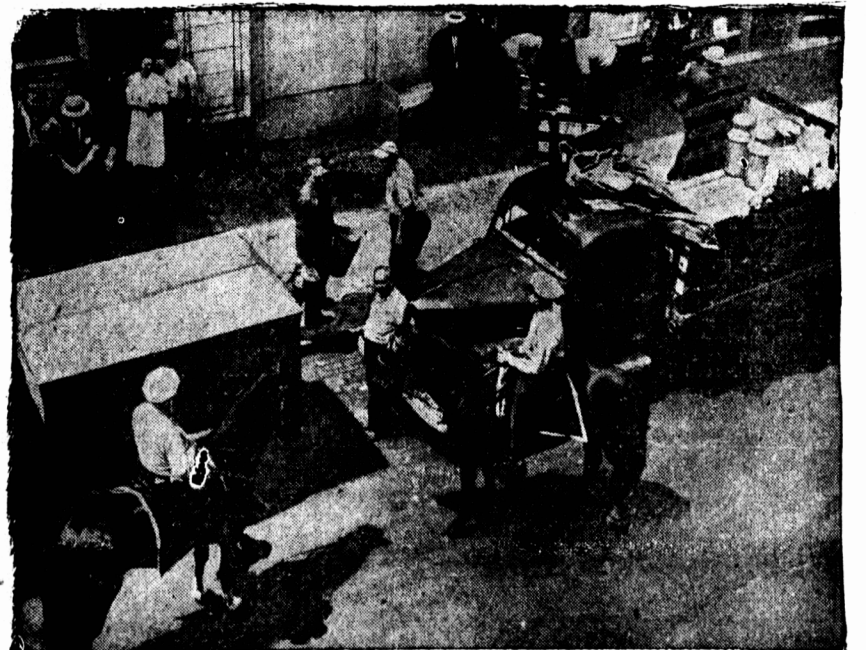

Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence are seeing for the first time the damage done to their furniture and effects which were under filthy water for weeks. Here they are shown talking with Alderman J. B. ### DISCOVER NEW OIL FIELD IN ALBERTA

Far northern Alberta gave Canada's stature as an oil producing nation new significance with the announcement that the British-American Shell Oil team had discovered what may be a major oil and gas field in the Peace River area. Location of the new find, the most northerly in the province to date, is indicated on map above. It is 36 miles west of the town of Peace River, 35 miles northwest of Imperial Oil's Normandville oil discovery made last year. Highly encouraging results have been reported from initial tests which so far have penetrated formations to about 300 feet above the Madison limestone, the producing area at Normandville. The news sparked fast stock market in S. & shares.
