HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Periodic washing of white sweaters or stoles, favorite evening wraps for women, will not cause them to turn yellow if a new all-fabric bleach is used.

To prepare: Grind or grate carrots and potatoes. Add flour sifted with remaining dry ingredients in order given.

Fill well-buttered 1/4 qt. pudding mold 2/3 with batter. Cover tight; place on rack in big saucepan; cover; steam steadily 4 hours.

Remove from steamer, unroll and cool for 30 minutes. Cover pudding and cool completely on rack.

Store in covered tin or jar in refrigerator.

To serve, replace pudding in mold (battered), steam 1 hour or until hot. Serve with Hard Sauce. Makes 12 to 16 servings.

Note: If it is necessary to add more water to sauce pan in which pudding is boiling, be sure it is boiling.
