

# Peking Mayor's Dismissal Hints At Purge In China

PEKING (Reuters)—Mayor Peng Chen of Peking, one of China's top leaders, has been dismissed as head of the city's Communist party amid rumors that it might be the start of a purge of other senior men.

The dismissal of Peng, 47, as first secretary of the Peking Communist party, boss of the capital—brought cheering persons into the streets of the city carrying red flags and huge portraits of Mao Tse-Tung, 73-year-old leader of the national Communist party.

The crowds shouted that the chances in Peking's rule were a victory for the thought of Chairman Mao. In shrill voices young girls read out messages of support for Peking's new first secretary, Li Hsueh-Feng, appointed in Peng's place.

Officially number nine in the national Communist Politburo, but actually nearer the top, Peng Chen is the highest-ranking Chinese leader to lose his post in 16 years of Communist rule.

His dismissal came as a climax to a big drive in recent weeks against "anti-party, anti-socialist elements" accused of being opposed to the thinking of Mao.

Though Peng himself was never named in the campaign some of his subordinates and Peking city newspapers came under fire. References to "mastermind" behind opposition to Mao's ideas were interpreted in the west as pointing at Peng.

Official sources remained silent on rumors that several other senior party officials or government ministers would be purged.

Observers here said it is likely to be only a matter of time before Peng loses the office of mayor that he has held since 1951.

Until the death of Shanghai's mayor last year, it was the tradition that the mayors of Peking and Shanghai, China's two largest cities which have the status of provinces, should at the same time be the local party chiefs.

The observers said Peng's name is expected to remain on the national Politburo until the election of a new Politburo, but his membership from now on is likely to be on paper only.

Peng, a tall, often genial man with bald head and a ready smile, had been regarded as one of China's top ideological experts who followed a tough Marxist line against the Soviet Union.

## Banks Revert To Old Policy

TORONTO (CP)—Some Canadian chartered banks have reverted to an old procedure which calls for some borrowers to leave a certain portion of their loans on deposit with the bank.

However, the borrower pays interest on the full amount of the loan although he can use only part of it. The amount left on deposit varies from customer to customer.

A bank spokesman said that as an account increases its activities, it becomes more expensive for the bank to operate so the customer deposits a portion of his loan, the interest on which covers the cost of maintaining the account.

The Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce recently sent a circular to its branches reminding them "to have their customers maintain credit balances commensurate with the services they receive and the credit lines granted to them."

The Toronto-Dominion Bank and Bank of Montreal say the practice is used mainly for active accounts, depending upon collateral requirements.

The Bank of Nova Scotia would not comment on its practice.

## Rival Union Is Planned

NEW YORK (AP)—Seven New York newspaper men announced they plan to organize a rival union of editorial employees, to oppose the striking Newspaper Guild of New York (AFL-CIO).

They said they looked with "disgust" on the guild's strike which has prevented publication of three newspapers by World Journal Tribune Inc. The strike now is in its 38th day.

The seven are cartoonist Walt Kelly who draws Pogo for the Hall Syndicate Inc., columnist Dick Schaap and Jimmy Breslin and sports writer Pete Axelrod of the old Herald Tribune; and rewrite man Samuel Crowther and sports writers Lew King and Pat Lynch of the old Journal-American.

They scheduled an organizing meeting for today.

The group claimed backing of 75 per cent of the city's editorial staff members.

The seven-called the Guild "bookkeeper-oriented"—a reference to inclusion within its ranks of advertising, circulation, business office and maintenance employees, as well as editorial workers.

## CMHC Seeking To Ration Funds

OTTAWA (CP)—A spokesman for Central Mortgage and Housing Corp. said here the Crown-owned agency is trying to ration its available loan funds as best it can to meet the needs of areas away from the big cities.

Priority is being given to the needs of the Atlantic Provinces and the resource-developing areas of Canada in approving some 31,500 loans this year, an information officer for the corporation said.

He was commenting on a report Thursday that the Toronto Metropolitan Home Builders Association had been told by CMHC officials that 600 loans were to be made in the Toronto area in the next three months.

## Resolutions Over Viet Nam Presented To Presbyterians

TORONTO (CP)—A resolution condemning North Viet Nam for encouraging and supporting hostile activities in South Viet Nam was presented to the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada by Rev. A. Donald MacLeod, 28, of New Glasgow, N.S.

A resolution presented by the assembly's committee on international affairs, however, called for Canada to continue in its non-support of U.S. intervention in South Viet Nam.

The assembly did not debate the issue as both resolutions were presented just before the assembly adjourned.

Mr. MacLeod criticized the committee on international affairs for its motion which "may do great damage to our church" in Southeast Asia.

He said: "We would further remind the committee on international affairs that they are authorized to speak for the Presbyterian Church in Canada only on the authority of the General Assembly, and that in the future they refrain from any declaration of a government or council of church that does not have this authority."

The resolution of the committee had been presented to the Canadian Council of Churches and to the Canadian government.

"It is the responsibility of the individual to take an interest in international affairs; not of the church," Mr. MacLeod said. "It is not the responsibility of the church to suggest policy, political or diplomatic, to the state."
