

Would Keep Secret Public Accounts Committee Sessions

MONTREAL (CP)—Alan MacNaughton, chairman of the House of Commons public accounts committee, said Monday he plans to recommend legislation to have the committee meet behind closed doors in future sessions.

Mr. MacNaughton, Liberal member of Parliament for Mount Royal, made the statement in an interview shortly after his return here from a one-week trip to England, where he studied the work of the British public accounts committee.

The 55-year-old Montreal lawyer said it would be "in the best interests of the government" if the Canadian committee held its meetings in camera like the British body.

He said he will send an informal report to Prime Minister Diefenbaker with his recommendations.

Closed sessions, Mr. MacNaughton said, would mean party politics could never enter into the deliberations of the committee and would ensure complete objectivity on the part of committee members.

In the Canadian committee's last sitting in Ottawa, Mr. MacNaughton occupied what was described as "the hottest seat in Parliament." The committee in a report to the Commons last month said taxpayers' money had not been protected in construction of a \$16,200,000 federal printing bureau at Hull, Que., under the former Liberal administration.

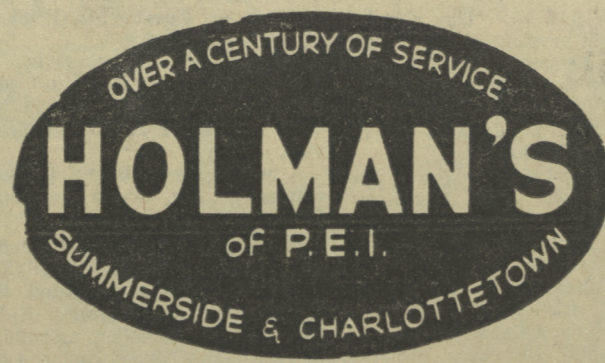
