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NEW CAMPUS POLICE POLICY MINORS TO FACE DRY YEAR!

Mike Kennedy, the UPEI Student Union Comptroller in an interview with the SUN stated that "effective January 1st 1978, no one, I repeat no one, will be allowed into a Student Union licensed event without a photo I.D."

The Student Union Policy at present is that student I.D.'s must be presented at the door. Student I.D's are photo I.D.s

but the problem arises when a student tries to sign in a date or friend. What sometimes happens is the person that is being signed in does not have a photo I.D. All that is required by law is that the person present three pieces of identification, one of these being a birth certificate.

Mr. Kennedy went on to say that "We have tried in

the past to restrict admission to only those carrying photo I.D's but it sometimes happens that a person shows up at the door that is obviously of age and we have let them in."

"This years' Campus Police Force is one of the

very few incidents so far."

Inspectors from the Liquor Control Commission have been at a number of licensed events; Pigs, Pubs and Fall Fest Bashes, and they have stated that the campus police are doing a good job of enforcing the Liquor Control Act.

"Although there is an advance sale of tickets for Winter Carnival this year, holding a ticket doesn't mean a person will be allowed into all events. Campus Police will be checking I.D.'s at the door. Anyone under 18 will not be allowed into licensed events."

Mike Kennedy became Comptroller of the Student Union during the General Elections of February 77. He is responsible for Campus Police, Bartenders, the Barn and all Student Union Licensed events.

CBC SAYS WORD 'GAY' OBJECTIONABLE TO MOST CANADIANS

OTTAWA (CUP) -- Commissioners at license renewal hearings for the CBC's Ottawa outlets heard a corporation vice-president claim that "the word gay has become objectionable to many people in Canada."

CBC corporate affairs vice-president R.C. Fraser, responding to charges of discrimination from gay representatives filing interventions against the corporation, said the CBC policy of refusing public service announcements to gay groups "has nothing to do with rights."

"We have a policy of not accepting public service announcements that deal with controversial subjects. And homosexuality is a topic of

controversy in Canada today," Fraser told the Canadian Radio, Television and Telecommunications Commission Nov. 15.

Gays point out that Canadians in fact accept homosexuality, according to a Gallup poll indicating that 51% of the population favoured forbidding discrimination by sexual orientation under the Human Rights Code.

One spokesperson told the CRIC that gays were not seeking "to inform the

public on the subject of homosexuality," but simply want to publicize plans for events such "as public meetings and Friday evening coffee parties."

TRUDEAU TO READ U.P.E.I. SUN

It seems people in high places want to read the SUN. The paper has received a request for a subscription from the office of the Prime Minister.

Stephen D'Agostino of the Prime Minister's staff asked for the office to be put on the mailing list in a letter to SUN editor Larry Green Oct. 18.

In an interview

D'Agostino said he has been hired to do research into issues affecting youth and is requesting some campus newspapers to keep him in touch.

He said, "Ottawa is like living in Disneyland," and "there is no point researching issues which no one cares about".

His purpose is to find out what issues Canada's youth are interested in and to provide the Prime
