



Premier Walter R. Shaw Comments On Statement

Premier W. R. Shaw commented yesterday on what he termed a "rather surprising and misleading statement" made Saturday by Premier-elect Alex Campbell.

Mr. Campbell was critical of the government's delay in vacating office and expressed concern with regard to new undertakings being carried out in various departments, especially in a department of highways where, he stated, "the acting minister is continuing to sign orders for road stabilization and paving which do not appear to be part of an overall plan."

PREMIER AMAZED

"I am really amazed," said Premier Shaw, "particularly at the Liberal leader, who had not the slightest reason for the statements attributed to him."

"Mr. Campbell and I met last mid-week on the most friendly terms to discuss transfer of government. The date of Wednesday, July 27, was suggested and tentatively agreed on and I was let him know definitely next morning if this was satisfactory. I do so but suggested we would continue until Wednesday evening and pass the responsibility over on Thursday morning."

"There was complete mutual accord with this arrangement," the Premier said. "From the final on the election, I assured the new government publicly and the new Premier in person of my sincere cooperation in promoting the best interests of the province. I arranged with my office secretary to remain on after the change-over in order to assist the Premier and his new assistant in carrying on the work."

"In view of this apparent agreeable arrangement," the Premier said, "I was stunned to see the very unfair and misleading remarks from the Premier-elect."

PREVIOUS ELECTION

"In 1959 the election was held on September first, the Conservatives were sworn in on September 16th and really took over on the morning of the 17th. The recent election was held on July eleventh and we will surrender on Wednesday evening, July twenty-seventh. The periods between are practically the same. Trade Representative Calls On Merchants

Several Charlottetown merchants and other civic officials received a call yesterday from John Carey, the Irish Government Trade Representative to Canada. Mr. Carey has his office in Montreal but is at present making a tour of the Atlantic Provinces in an effort to increase trade with his country.

"Ireland," he said, "imports annually from Canada about 22 million dollars worth of commodities and exports to this country about \$7,000,000. The Irish government, he added, "is interested in promoting the sale of more Irish goods in this country in an effort to improve the trade balance."

Mr. Carey noted that Ireland was a small country with a population of only about 3,000,000 and that the country couldn't hope to compete with mass production. "What we are striving for quality of both workmanship and design," he said.

"Foreign trade increases annually, and our chief exports are fashion items, but other well-known exports include fabrics, floor coverings, snow boots, which is a bit unusual since Ireland has only about 3" of snow annually, packed food stuffs such as biscuits, jams, jellies and candy, surgical and pharmaceutical supplies and some construction equipment."

"We are anxious to improve the trade in balance and in general improve the economic conditions in Ireland," Mr. Carey explained. "In 1840 the population of the country was 8,000,000. It has dropped off to 3,000,000 and annually some 25,000 young people mostly between the ages of 18 and 30 leave the country. If we can promote industry and create more jobs, we are hoping that this drain of the country's life blood will stop."

"Ireland's major trade market," Mr. Carey said, "is, of course, England and Scotland. Next to these countries comes

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Word Received No Trials Soon

WASHINGTON AP — The White House says it had word Saturday that the North Vietnamese government did not intend to bring captured American airmen to trial in the near future.

In a cable to the Columbia Broadcasting System Sunday, North Vietnamese President Ho Chi Minh said there is "no trial in view" for the captured airmen.

Last Thursday, CBS had sent a name leader asking whether he had decided to place the airmen on trial. The four-word cable was Ho's reply.

A White House spokesman said the Ho Chi Minh message "confirms information we had Saturday about North Vietnamese intentions."

Press Secretary Bill D. Moyers said word reached President Johnson through diplomatic sources while the president was touring the mid-west Saturday, which is consistent with what the Columbia Broadcasting System was told.

"We aren't exactly sure what this means," Moyers told reporters. "We are watching it very closely, and beyond that cannot go."

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
