Murray Harbor Election.

We congratulate the Country, and more particularly the Murray Harbor District, on the triumphant return of the Hon. Samuel Prowse. Mr. Prowse is a man of whom any District in the Province might well feel proud.

Mr. Prowse was too much of a man to deceive the people on land matters in order to catch their support; but, although, for a time, forced to succumb before prejudices excited by designing men, he has now the satisfaction to find the people endorsing his straightforward, honest course.

Dr. Robertson's and Mr. McFadyen's deceitful canvass in May last and the contemptible double-shuffle of the former in regard to his resignation has already borne legitimate fruit.

"Oh, what a tangled web we weave, When first we practice to deceive."

There are several good reasons why Mr. McFadyen should resign his seat. We will only mention two of them just now. The vote of yesterday must convince him, as it does everybody else, that he does not represent the majority of the electors of the District.

That Resignation—Where is it?

It is now about time that Mr. S. F. Perry's resignation should be forth coming. The distance between Tignish and Charlottetown being about twice as great as between Montague and Charlottetown, it is to be assumed that Mr. Perry's resignation would require a proportionally longer time than Dr. Robertson's in reaching the metropolis.

It will be interesting and desirable that the House of Assembly should as matters of privilege inquire into these resignations. It cannot surely be possible that a member elect after having deliberately resigned to two members, will dare to claim the seat; and it is equally preposterous to suppose that any two members can be found so base as to withhold a resignation so made from the Lieutenant Governor.

There seems to be every prospect now of Egypt falling into the all-embracing arms of England. Report goes that the Sultan wishes to cede that country to England on terms similar to the cession of Cyprus.

Sober Second Thought of the Country Practically Expressed.

THE GOVERNMENT WELL SUSTAINED.

HON. MR. PROWSE polled yesterday a hundred and thirty-three votes more than he obtained in May last, sixty-eight more than Dr. Robertson, and forty-five more than Mr. McFadyen, who at that time stood at the head of the poll.

Provincial Exhibition, 1882.

A general meeting of the Board of Commissioners, appointed by the Government to manage this Exhibition, was held at the Law Courts Building, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, July 25th.

The undersigned, from the Committee appointed to prepare a prize list, reports that the Committee carefully considered the subject, in connection with the instructions from the general meeting, and submits the accompanying list of prizes, amounting to \$1,445.

The Committee desires to explain that though it has been deemed necessary in former years not to allow the total of the prize list materially to exceed the appropriation, yet, under existing circumstances, it is considered that there is sufficient reason to expect that the receipts from entries of live stock, from sums taken at the doors on the Exhibition days, and from other sources, will suffice to cover the increased expenditure in prizes, as well as the incidental expenses.

Moreover, the late Board left in store a quantity of useful materials, which will be available for use this year, and thus save considerable expense.

The Prize List as prepared by the Committee was then read by the Chairman, and after considerable discussion on some of the most important industries of the Province, the said Prize List having been slightly altered in some cases, was approved and adopted.

It was unanimously agreed upon that the Provincial Exhibition, 1882, be held at Governor's Field and Drill Shed, on Wednesday and Thursday, the 11th and 12th of October next.

The Prize List which is now being published for general distribution contains several important improvements on former years. Additional prizes are awarded in many important classes.
