## Local and Other Items

—No foreign mail this evening.  
—Don't forget the concert to night in St. James' Hall.  
—There were about 340 bags of mail matter brought over by the Minto yesterday.

—If you want to know where to go tomorrow evening read the Boys' Brigade programme in this issue.

—The social service for men in the Y. M. C. A. yesterday was largely attended and greatly appreciated.

—Pretty little baskets of good home made candy at the Boys' Brigade entertainment tomorrow evening.

—No one should miss the Boys' Brigade entertainment tomorrow evening when the admission is but 15 cents.

—Miss Jessie Gordon, of Brudenell, died at the P. E. Island Hospital this morning of typhoid fever. She had been in the hospital two weeks.

—The Minto left Charlottetown for Pictou this morning at seven o'clock. She leaves Pictou on return to-morrow morning at the same hour.

—Four drunks appeared before acting Stipendiary Magistrate Blanchard this forenoon. James Hennessey, John Hughes, and Peter Keenan were each fined \$10 or 20 days, and Francis Mahar \$2 or 10 days.

—Much sympathy is felt for Mr. John Mutch, of Lot 48, who lost his oat crop as a result of his barn blowing down during the big gale last October. There were about 400 stooks of oats in the barn, besides a quantity of hay, when it was blown down. The oats heated and spoiled. The hay was also damaged. The loss is a large one and is severely felt by Mr. Mutch.

—Advices from Livadia report that the Czar's recovery is pursuing a perfectly normal course. He has a good appetite, gains strength daily, and his temperature and pulse are normal. The Imperial train has been ordered to be in readiness to leave the Crimea Dec. 28 and it is believed that the Czar and the Imperial family will return early in January.

—Money and Risks, a Toronto publication, has a sketch of the life of Mr. David Burke, General Manager of the Victoria Life Insurance Company. The sketch is accompanied by a capital likeness. Mr. Burke was born in Charlottetown in 1850, and has been connected with the insurance business since 1869. He has made rapid strides, and has long since been classed with the successful islanders abroad.

—About noon today fire was discovered in the upper part of the Robinson building on Great George Street, near Crabbe's Corner. The fire was in the portion of the building occupied by a man named Diamond, and is thought to have been caused by a defective flue. The damage by fire was not great. But there was considerable water poured into the building, much of which found its way through to the tailor shop of Mr. Daniel McLaren on the ground floor.

—The cheese trade of this province has become a very important factor. Messrs. Dillon & Spillett, during the season just closed shipped 29,500 boxes to London and Liverpool, and disposed of 1000 to the local trade. Mr. Arthur Biffin, representing Hodgson Bros., Montreal, handled 19,320 boxes, 16,200 of which were shipped to London and Liverpool, and 3,120 were sold in Charlottetown. Carvell Bros. sold 200 boxes locally and exported 2,606 boxes.
