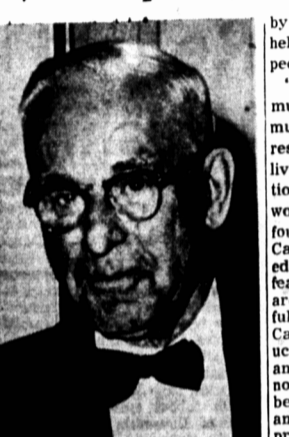


**SETS WORLD RECORD**

## Moving Towards Conquest Of Cancer, Says President

"We are moving towards the conquest of cancer through our life-saving program of Research and Education," stated Dr. W.J.P. MacMillan, O.B.E., at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Division of the Canadian Cancer Society held in the City Hall last night.

"Each year," Dr. MacMillan asserted, "the prospects for controlling and ultimately defeating cancer become brighter. The present cancer research program being carried out across Canada and in other countries of the world is the greatest ever launched against any disease. Research workers are searching every possible avenue for a clue to the cause of Cancer. Some day they will find it and then perhaps they will be able to prevent this dread disease, as they are now able to prevent small pox or polio."

Dr. MacMillan was re-elected President of the Society for 1957. Other officers elected include: Ist. Vice-president, Mr. W.H. Beaton; County Vice-Presidents - Queens: Mrs. J.G. M. Jones, Mr. Wm. Hayward, Mrs. J.A. MacMillan, and Mrs. H.F. MacPhee. Continuing his address, Dr. MacMillan declared, "Today, one out of four whom cancer attacks is being cured. And with the medical knowledge we now have one out of two could be cured if people would go to the doctor in time. A sensible fear of cancer followed

by positive action is the most helpful sign in the life of our people.

"Today, people are responding much more quickly and in much greater numbers with the result that we are saving many lives through our Cancer Educational program. This is our big work until a cure for Cancer is found. This is why the Canadian Cancer Society was formed, to educate our people to a healthy fear of Cancer. Many Canadians are alive and well and living useful lives as a direct result of our Cancer Educational program. Educating people to do anything is an enormous task, but I know of no other organization that has been able to do so much good in an educational way toward the prevention of disease as the Canadian Cancer Society. We have achieved much. The sun will pierce the thickest cloud and we must continue our educational program until all our citizens see the light and seek treatment in time for cure.

"In conclusion I wish to thank sincerely the press and radio and our wonderful army of volunteer cancer workers for their important part in promoting this great life-saving campaign.

## 43 MAJOR WARSHIPS New Ships, New Aircraft Varied Activity For R.C.N.

New ships, new aircraft, visits to ports in a score of countries, and the participation of the destroyer escort St. Laurent in the Royal Escort of Her Majesty the Queen on the occasion of a State visit to Sweden were highlights of the activities of the Royal Canadian Navy during 1956.

Three anti-submarine escort vessels of the St. Laurent class were commissioned. New jet fighter aircraft and new anti-submarine planes were added to the naval air strength. More than \$12,500,000 worth of construction was completed ashore providing needed training and operational facilities. Ships of the Atlantic, Pacific and Great Lakes fleets trained officers, cadets and men of the regular and reserve forces during cruises ranging from the Arctic to South America and from Europe to Japan.

The three anti-submarine escort vessels commissioned during the year were the Assiniboine, and the Ottawa at St. Lawrence shipyards and the Saguenay at a Halifax shipyard. These ships join HMCS St. Laurent, first of the class, and are now based at Halifax forming the Third Escort Squadron.

**ADMIRAL**  
The new Canadian designed ships won praise from naval authorities of other countries when the St. Laurent visited ports in the United States and the United Kingdom during the year. The ship proved impressive not only for her anti-submarine capabilities but also as a product of Canadian design and craftsmanship.

There are ten more destroyer escorts of this type on order, all in various stages of construction at shipyards at Halifax, Sorel, Montreal, Vancouver, and Victoria. Several are expected to be ready to join the fleet before the end of 1957.

Arctic. Earlier in the year she took part in Canada's first full-scale survey of ice conditions in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

Other ships of the fleet visited more than 60 foreign ports during training cruises for officers, cadets and men, Canadian ships and sailors also cruised the Great Lakes and the Atlantic and Pacific seaboard, stopping at many Canadian and U.S. ports.

In one of the last overseas cruises of the year the aircraft carrier Magnificent sailed for the U. K. to transport stores and equipment to the Bonaventure. Later she was to pick up R. C. A. F. Sabre jet fighters to return them to Montreal but was recalled to prepare for service with the United Nations police force in the Middle East. She is expected to sail with troops and equipment for the United Nations as Police Force in late December.

**AIR MISSIONS**  
Naval air units trained with ships and submarines of the fleet, with troops of the army in ground support exercises, and assisted the R. C. A. F. in transporting personnel and supplies in the Knob area of northern Quebec in support of the construction of the Mid-Canada line. Helicopters flew more than 50 missions in three days during the Springfield, N. S., mine disaster in November, carrying injured miners, doctors, medical supplies, blood plasma, oxygen and other stores.

The RCN acquired some new shore facilities to meet the demands of the expanding fleet. More than \$12,500,000 worth of construction was completed including a supply school and stores centre at Montreal, a hangar and married quarters at the naval air station near Dartmouth, N. S., and a supply building and cadet block at Esquimaut. Another \$4,500,000 worth of construction was started during the year.

In addition to ships of the operational fleet, the navy had nine vessels on loan to other government departments including three to the Department of Transport, two to the Department of Mines and Technical Surveys, one to the Department of Fisheries, and three to the R. C. M. P. The RCN has three frigates on loan to the Norwegian Navy, the transfer being made at Halifax early in 1956.

The freedom to go to the church of our choice, the freedom to read what we want and say what we want and to go where we want has been preserved through another year of peace.

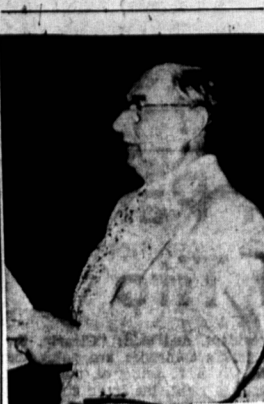
In the short range, we often forget these things. The daily battles of the dollar-sign seem more important. But how would we pay for them if we lost them?

**HALIFAX (CP) —** The weather office here says a developing disturbance near the Delaware coast of the United States is expected to move rapidly northward along the Atlantic seaboard of Nova Scotia Saturday. As a result, wet snow will fall in the southern regions beginning in the morning.

The snow will be occasionally mixed with rain in Nova Scotia, but a fall of four to six inches may be expected in Southern New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and parts of Nova Scotia. The in-

termittent light snow will continue in the north, but accumulations will be small there. Colder weather will again cover the whole district Sunday, and a few snowflurries will occur in the southern regions.

**Forecasts:**  
Prince Edward Island, Eastern N. B. Counties: Overcast; occasional wet snow and rain, becoming continuous wet snow in afternoon and changing to snowflurries by evening; mild, turning colder by evening; light winds increasing to east 15 in afternoon and to northeast 25 by evening. High-low at Charlottetown and Moncton 30 and 28. Outlook for Sunday: Cloudy with snowflurries and colder.
