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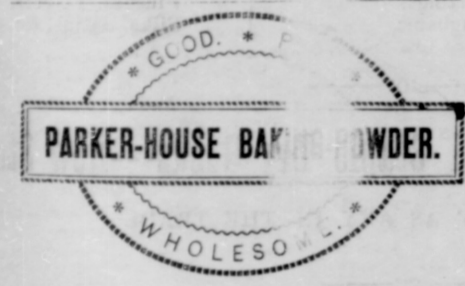

Liverpool Traders.

SPRING - - - 1887.

In a lecture recently delivered at Canajohari, N. Y., the Hon. Chauncey M. Depew thus describes a debate to which he had listened in the British House of Commons:—Sir Stafford Northcote started the ball by an indictment of the government. Of course he skipped over all the merits like a lawyer presenting his side and bunched in most glaring colors the defects. Mr. Gladstone rose to reply, and we all felt he knew the occasion demanded all his powers. In facility of speech, depth and breadth of information and powers of presentation I do not believe he has an equal in the world. He knew that the French had outgeneraled him in the East, Bismarck had stolen a march on him in Australia and Africa, his Egyptian policy had ended in a fiasco, Gordon was shut up in Khartoum, and commerce and trade were in dreadful straits. His efforts were to avoid meeting these issues and to create false one, and he did it magnificently. He attacked members of the Opposition fiercely and personally; he charged into every opening they offered. He was pathetic, eloquent, argumentative and sarcastic. The Conservative leaders tried their best to prevent the younger men from being tempted by him into side discussions and to confine him to a defence of his mistakes. But they failed, and the debate closed in a grand burst of oratory from the Premier, who had never touched a dangerous topic. As we left the House of Commons a Canadian senator said to me, "How illustrious vanish. Here I have been all my life looking to Mr. Gladstone with reverence as a statesman of almost supernatural powers and judicial fairness, and I find him this afternoon parrying and dodging and creating false issues, and rushing with apparently furious rage at members, refuting charges they have never made and generally cavorting around in a dust of his own raising, just as I have seen Sir John Macdonald do a thousand times in the Canadian Parliament when he was in tight places."

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

A Cry for Reform.

SIR.—We have just arisen from a contest, the keenest, I believe, in our political history, and although weeks have elapsed since the grand conflict, both parties still seem to stand scowling at each other over the heads of the people and crying "Victory!—Victory!" The Press of the one side shouts out, beneath a glaring heading, that the greatest statesman of America, the "grand old chieftain," Sir John, has again been returned to power with a handsome following, and we have scarcely had time to swallow this bit of information when we are called upon to listen to the rejoicings of Liberals over the fact that the reins have been snatched from the statesman of seventy-two. Telegrams are falsified, reports are garbled, and the genius of hundreds of minds is employed to blacken the fair face of truth. The Conservatives, it is said, are politically damned on account of their corrupt practices and wholesale bribery; while, on the other hand, we are told that the Blake Party buys its support with the gold of Gloucester fish-merchants. After such a state of affairs as this, it is high time for the Press of Canada to begin the work of reform at home, and leave American corruption and bribery to be dealt with by the representatives at Washington. To the honor of the *Weekly Witness*, of Montreal, it is due to say that its articles are considered more accurate, in the main, than those of any journal with which I have had to do, and are believed to be, so far as complete impartiality can be secured, almost perfect in their way.

The submissive party thralldom in which so many of our public men are fettered is a slavery incompatible with the principles of patriotism, honesty and liberty. I would, therefore, like to see the *WEEKLY EXAMINER* engage in a conflict with this growing evil, for I know its influence would be felt throughout the length and breadth of the land, and then our fair Island would take as high a stand in political morality as it does in all the other virtues. Let these political contests be fought upon the merits of the case, upon principle, and not upon such trifling issues as a desire for change, a belief in the return of a certain party to power, for I solemnly believe that to other feelings but these are the liberal party of P. E. Island indebted for their sweeping victory. This personal canvassing is a course which is ruining our hopes of honest, independent government, and until this practice is totally prohibited by law, made criminal, we will not be able to win our political battles upon the broad principles of purity, honesty, and justice.

I suppose I have already trespassed too far upon the space of your valuable journal, but if you will allow me another entrance into your columns, I will be able to realize my wish of returning to these and hundreds of subjects again.
