Inventor Of Airless Tire Dies In Ohio

DAYTON, O. (AP)—John A. MacMillan, 79, inventor of the airless auto tire, died on June 7 after several years of failing health.

MacMillan was born on a farm on Prince Edward Island Nov. 16, 1872. He was educated at Prince of Wales College and later taught school on the island. Among the surviving relatives is a sister, Mrs. Elizabeth MacDonald of 32 Pownall Street, Charlottetown.

In 1908 he went to work for the Dayton Rubber Manufacturing Co., bringing with him the airless hard tire for autos. The company did not begin to produce pneumatic tires until 1916.

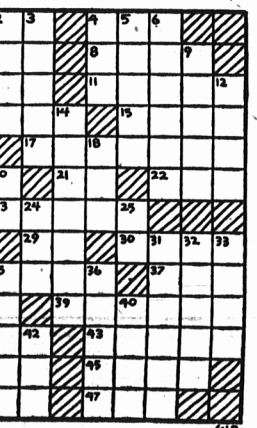
MacMillan served as general manager and president of Dayton Rubber from 1916 to 1936 at which time he was named chairman of the board of directors. He held that post until 1945.

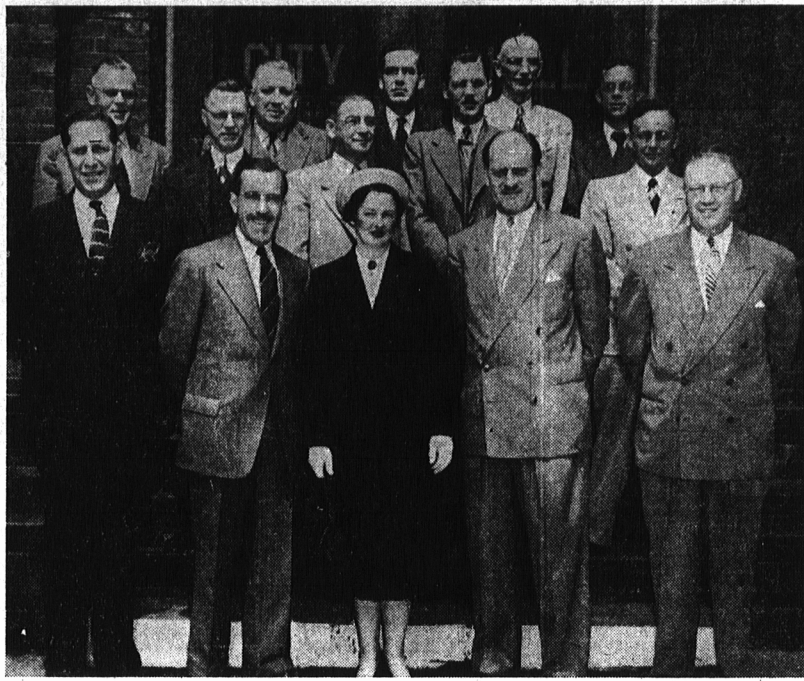
