'Ham' Operators Gathering Here

Amateur or "ham" radio operators from the Maritimes, parts of Quebec, Ontario and the New England states, will gather at Charlottetown for a two-day convention Saturday and Sunday. Hosts will be the members of the Keith Rogers Memorial Radio Club, Charlottetown.

The attending amateur radio operators are affiliated with the American Radio Relay League of New York, N.Y. One of the guest speakers at the conference will be a representative of the league, Louis McCloy of New York.

Registration for the convention will start at 9 a.m. Saturday, and the convention will end Sunday evening.

The scene of the convention is the Canadian Legion Home at Charlottetown.

There are about 450 delegates registered in advance.

A highlight of the convention will be a giant motorcycle Sunday afternoon to the southern section of the Island. About 100 radio-equipped cars are expected to take part, with the city police and RCMP also participating.

The last conference of ARRL operators was held two years ago in Halifax and about 200 ham operators attended. The last convention held in Prince Edward Island was in 1947.

Purpose of the convention will be to allow the short wave amateur radio operators who are in contact with each other over the air, to meet. The convention will also be educational in nature, with lectures from the U.S.

Prizes for various events that will be staged during the two-day convention, have been donated by local and national electrical firms.

The host club has about 12 members at present, and has been organized about 10 years. Club president is Robert Carr, of Charlottetown.

Charlottetown Events Are Noted In Commons

The Charlottetown conference of 1964 illustrated that many humane endeavours begun poorly may end brilliantly. Heath Macquarrie, Queens MP, told

the House of Commons Tuesday. Mr. Macquarrie, bringing to the attention of the House that it was the anniversary of an event of national importance and historic significance, said the conference delegates "laid the foundations of the great and free dominion whose people we collectively represent in this chamber."

Souris HS Increases Enrollment

SOUBIS—Souris High School opened for business Wednesday and 383 students registered during the morning. More were expected to register to bring the total to 270, an increase of 60 students over last year.

Ten more students than last year have registered for grade 12, and the figure of 44 students for this high school class is reportedly the biggest in years. A new principal, Albert Fogarty, has been appointed to administer the school. Mr. Fogarty is from Seven Mile Road, and has a BA from Saint Dunstan's University. He has taught for the last two years at Montague Regional High School.

Nineteen teachers have been contracted for the coming year, the same number as in 1963-64. Of these seven are new: Roger Solomon, BSc (SDU), from Souris; Peter Haskey, BA (SDU), from East Baltic; Winston Kough, Superior Two license, from Tignish; Loyola Griffin, BA (SDU), from New Westville; Mrs. Claude Dixon, Superior license, from Fortune; and Sister St. Patricia, Superior license, from Charlottetown.

TB Director Travelling To Paris, U.K.

Dr. Eric Found, provincial director of tuberculosis control, and Mrs. Found, leave Charlottetown Sunday by air for Paris, and Great Britain.

They will spend eight days in Paris where Dr. Found will represent Canada at the annual meeting of the International Union Against Tuberculosis. Some 27 nations are expected to have representatives at the eight-day meeting during which every phase in the work of TB control will be covered.

On completion of the Paris sessions Dr. and Mrs. Found will then proceed to Great Britain, where he will continue his studies in the field of tuberculosis under the grant awarded earlier this year by the Canadian Tuberculosis Association and is known as the "Travelling Great Britain Scholarship."

While in Great Britain Dr. Found will be given the opportunity to visit a number of treatment centres, and sanatoriums to observe the methods used in the U.K. in the detection and treatment of tuberculosis.

The scholarship awarded to Dr. Found is tenable for a period of two months.

Mrs. Clifford Moore of Charlottetown, underwent an operation recently at the Charlottetown Hospital and is progressing favorably reports state.

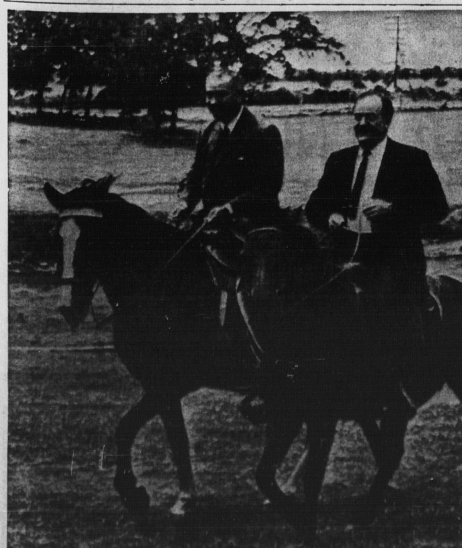
PAVEMENT TORN UP

LOANS FOR STUDENTS

Guaranteed by the Government of Canada

Purpose: The purpose of the Canada Student Loans Act is to facilitate bank loans for students who need financial help to continue full-time studies beyond secondary school level at Universities and other educational institutions.

Who can apply: Any Canadian citizen, or anyone resident in Canada for one year who intends to live in Canada after completion of studies, may apply for a loan under the Act. An applicant must be enrolled or intend to enroll as a full-time student at an educational institution approved by provincial authorities, and must meet the standards of academic qualification and financial need established by the student loan authority in the Province in which he applies.

Amount of loans: Depending upon individual circumstances and financial need, loans up to \$1,000 a year may be made, with a maximum of \$5,000 during a student's academic career. The Provincial Authority receiving applications and determining eligibility will issue a certificate to each eligible student stating the maximum amount the student may borrow. This Certificate of Eligibility is required before a student can arrange a Government Guaranteed Student Loan with the bank of his choice.

Repayment: Interest-Free and Delayed Repayment Period
To assist students, the interest on loans during the period a student continues full-time studies, and for six months thereafter, will be paid by the Government of Canada. During this same period no repayment of principal is required, nor will any service charge or fee be payable by the student.

Method of Repayment
Borrowers will begin to pay interest and to repay loans six months after they cease to be full-time students. The current interest rate to students is 5 1/4 % per annum. Normally the repayment period will be five to ten years. Borrowers have the right to repay loans in part or in full at any time without penalty.

Life Insured
In the event of the death of a borrower responsibility for repayment of the loans will be assumed by the Government of Canada.

Where to apply: Students resident in Prince Edward Island, regardless of where they intend to study, should apply for a Certificate of Eligibility to:
