

### Threats Made Against Life Of Queen

MUNICH (Reuters)—Threats against the life of Britain's Queen Elizabeth now visiting West Germany, have been made in several letters received here, it was officially announced Wednesday night.

Munich police, who denied for several hours that threats had been made against the Queen, finally admitted that threatening letters were received.

But the head of the city's security police said he believed the authors were mentally deranged and said the police attached no particular importance to the letters.

The Queen arrives Friday in Munich on her 11-day tour of West Germany, which began Tuesday in Bonn.

#### ARREST ASSEMBLYMAN

SEOUL (AP)—South Korea's Central Intelligence Agency has arrested Assemblyman Kim Hyung-il of the opposition Minjung (Masses) Party on sedition charges. Informed sources said Kim was linked with an alleged plot to overthrow the government of President Chung Hee Park. Twenty army officers and civilians, including a brigadier-general and eight colonels, have been arrested.

# Huestis Retrial Opens With 8 Witnesses

SUMMERSIDE — The retrial of the Derwin Bell Huestis case was adjourned until this morning at 10.30 by Mr. Justice R.R. Bell in Supreme Court here yesterday.

Huestis, from Cape Traverse, appeared before the Supreme Court last November on a charge of leaving the scene of an accident at Carleton in which James Archibald MacKenzie of Carleton Siding was fatally injured and later died after being taken to Prince County Hospital. The case was adjourned when the jury returned with a split vote.

A petit jury has been selected for the case of the accused. The jury consists of: John Rayner, Howland; Charles Frost, Summerside; Ernest Callbeck, Summerside RR.; J. Alden Mease, Kensington; Iorem Norman Hogg, Summerside; Allan Clow, Freetown; William MacDonald, Coleman; Leith Clark, St. Eleonors; James E. Milligan, Northam; Gerald Clover, Spring Valley; Parker Crockett, Summerside; and Emanuel Ross of MacNeill's Mills.

Yesterday's hearing was adjourned following lengthy testimony with further evidence to be submitted today. Representing the accused is Alex B. Campbell. George R. MacMahon is crown prosecutor.

**CALLED RCMP**

Francis Reginald Noonan of Carleton and a CNR employee, told the jury that on the night of the accident, July 14, 1964, his wife informed him that a man was lying in the ditch. The witness related he found him immediately upon leaving his house. He then called the Borden RCMP.

Dr. David Stewart of Craiput attended the scene in front of Mr. Noonan's residence in the Carleton area. Dr. Stewart stated he found a man unconscious, his leg in bad condition and suffering from brain injuries.

Ivan Jack Newrick, a mechanic employed in Borden, told the jury he checked for the RCMP in August, the wiring system and ignition of a 1955 Monarch belonging to Huestis.

Wallis Muttart of Cape Traverse said he saw Huestis at the Royal Canadian Legion at 11.00 p.m. the night of the accident. Muttart said the accused appeared normal at the time and he asked to come home with Muttart because his car had a flat tire. Muttart said to the best of his knowledge the accused owned a 1955 Monarch.

**SAW RED LIGHT**

After Muttart and Huestis left the Legion after 11 p.m. they proceeded south on the road which leads onto the old Borden highway then straight out the old highway. A red flashing light was noticed on the Trans Canada Highway — north of Cairns Canteen. Muttart assumed it was the RCMP. The condition of Huestis was reported normal at this time. Muttart then went home and later at 12.30 a.m. July 15, Constable Alan Burchill of the Borden RCMP called at his residence and asked if Huestis was there. The accused, asleep at the time, got dressed then left with Burchill. The accused's vehicle was described as a 1955 pale green Monarch, distinguished by a horse's sulky on the engine hood.

Corporal Roderick MacKenzie of the identification branch of the Charlottetown RCMP said he went to Borden and took photos — representing the scene on July 15. He examined the accused's car and said the damage appeared very fresh.

Constable William Edward Whelan of the Borden RCMP stated he was called out to the accident scene at 11 a.m. on July 14. The constable stated he

## Ratepayers Up In Arms Over Liquor Store Site

SUMMERSIDE — Ratepayers from 20 rural districts whose children are students at Athena regional high school are up in arms over the provincial government's recent disclosure of the new liquor outlet site on North Granville Street—a short distance from both Athena and the Prince County Vocational School.

Some 400 ratepayers and interested citizens attended a special meeting at the school last night to discuss this urgent situation and plan a counter-attack against this government announcement.

A resolution was passed that a committee representing the districts which consists of some 6,000 ratepayers, meet with Premier Shaw and the chairman of the provincial liquor commission today to present a strong protest on the government move.

Heading the committee is the chairman of the Athena Regional High School, Earl Cannon, who presided at last night's meeting.

The provincial minister of health, Hon. Hubert MacNeill, who was in attendance, consented to make arrangements for an audience with the Premier today but he did caution that the premier had a busy schedule with Hon. Judy LaMarsh visiting the provincial capital today.

"This situation of relocating the Summerside liquor store, now situated in the heart of the business district on Water Street, has been brewing for some time, and the town felt that with its relocation the problem of traffic congestion on the town's main street would be cut down drastically.

One of the first suggested sites was further south on Granville Street on government property near the senior citizens homes; but this did not meet with approval. At one of the town council meetings, members of the council objected strongly to the suggestion of this site as they felt it would be situated in the residential area.

Hon. Hubert MacNeill admitted last night that he had also made the suggestion at one time that the outlet be situated on government owned land near the senior citizens homes but added that his suggestion had not met with approval. Other sites looked at, he said, were at Hippocampus Corner on Water Street West and one on the MacEwen Road in Summerside East, but all had been passed over for the site on Granville Street.

As soon as this site was disclosed a group connected with the school and yesterday went to Charlottetown to meet with government officials. Mr. Cannon reported last night that while in Charlottetown the group had been held at "Arm's length" and had been unable to find out any constructive information.

Answers to such questions as who had made the deal for this new outlet, who had chosen the site and how it had been chosen along with a number of other questions, could not be obtained, he said. "Everybody kept passing the buck," he added.

Apparently a company, reportedly not yet finished in the Royal Gazette, has been formed which purchased the property where the outlet will be situated and will erect a building and then rent it to the government as a liquor store. In charge at the construction site which is in the excavation stage is Councilor Eric Johnston, who is president of Johnston's Sheet Metal here.

With the construction underway the ratepayers feel this is an urgent situation which must be dealt with immediately before it has gone too far. Members of

The study—reference No. 135, requested by the finance ministry—is mainly concerned with definition of the term "manufacture" in customs tariffs applying to these imports.

SUMMERSIDE — Horace Wright and Edwin Lewis were re-elected trustees for Athena Regional High School at the annual district meeting here Tuesday night. Mr. Wright represents Bedouque, Fernwood and Chelton areas while Mr. Lewis is the representative of Freetown, Wilnot and Travellers Rest districts.

The matter of the formation of larger units of school administration together with the consolidation of P.E.I. elementary schools was discussed. Regulation of elementary schools have already been published in newspapers.

A plan is being devised for the formation of larger units of administration within the province and it has been suggested that this plan is being prepared on the basis of five larger units of administration in the province.

At the last meeting of the association of P.E.I. regional high school boards, a resolution was passed unanimously supporting the principles of larger units of administration based on the present regional high school setup.
