THE MAILED.—The special train to Summerside has been cancelled and the mails transferred to the Pictou route.

SCOTT ACT.—Eight Scott Act cases at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. All were adjourned until Monday.

THE OLD STORY.—The Transcript reports that a Moncton lawyer received \$5 last Saturday for defending a suit for 90 cents. His client won, but is just \$4.10 out.

EPISCOPAL VISIT.—His Lordship Bishop McLarty, accompanied by Rev. Father Gallant, visited St. Patrick's School to-day, and expressed himself as highly pleased with the neatness and order visible throughout.

FOUL PLAY SUSPECTED.—Patrick Kelly was found dead in his room at Kingston, Ont., on Sunday. The room was full of gas. As a chair was found beneath the gas jet, foul play is suspected and the police are investigating.

HONORABLY ACQUITTED.—The investigation into the charge of drunkenness against Marshal Flynn was concluded this afternoon, and he was honorably acquitted. John Ellis swore that the Marshal was perfectly sober on the night Costello gave him drunk, and the Marshal on oath said he had not drunk spirituous liquors for the past two years.

PERSONAL.—Hon. S. Prowse, Murray Harbor, is registered at the Rankin.

B. McMillan, the youthful stamp vendor, who has for years past been a familiar figure in the Post Office corridor, is, we regret to learn, dying of consumption at his mother's residence, Great George Street. He has been confined to his bed but three or four days.

CAPTURING A STILL.—The Pictou correspondent of the Moncton Times reports that early on Monday morning special officer Charles Curless and excise officer Geo. J. Campbell made a seizure of a complete still and worm and the head of a second still, from Duncan Fraser, of Cariboo. The Inland Revenue Department will likely prosecute Mr. Fraser.

A CAUTION.—The names of a number of young gents (?) who have been found trespassing on the Exhibition Grounds, Government Farm, have been handed to the Secretary by James Rush, caretaker of Exhibition buildings and sheds. All parties frequenting the pond are hereby warned not to interfere in any way with the said buildings or sheds. M. MERRY'S ASSAULT.—Aubertin, who shot M. Merry, is an educated man, and has published a number of school books. His landlady says misfortunes maddened him, and that he is a dangerous lunatic. His father hung himself because of failure in business. Aubertin's violent whimsical temper drove his wife to seek divorce. On one occasion he tried to kill her. He has travelled through Germany, England and Belgium, and been in prison for blackmailing.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—Monday's express train from Halifax had a narrow escape when crossing the Fulleigh Mountain. When between Fulleigh and Wentworth stations, the engine struck a quantity of mud and rock, which had rolled down the mountain side. The pilot was smashed and four trucks of the locomotive thrown from the rails, the drivers remaining in position. The train was delayed an hour and a half in consequence. The place where the accident occurred is known as a flat slope, with the mountain on one side of the track and the valley on the other. Considerable work was done at this point during the last season; and all the loose earth and rocks removed from the mountain side above the track. The slide was no doubt due to the action of frost followed by the heavy rains. It is frightful to contemplate the result of a possible accident while crossing the Fulleigh Mountains.—Moncton Times.

He Died Away From Home.

INFORMATION WANTED ABOUT EDWARD KELLY, WHO DIED AT GRAND FORKS, DAK., IN SEPTEMBER LAST.

Postmaster Brecken, a few days ago, received the following letter which speaks for itself:—

To the Postmaster, Charlottetown, P. E. I.:

SIR,—A young man named Edward Kelly, died at Grand Forks, on the 17th September last. He was from Charlottetown, P. E. I. I was first acquainted with him in Manitoba, where he lived several years before coming here. He was working harvesting with me when he took sick of fever and died in a week's time. I took him to the hospital here and did all I could to help him. I buried him decently, paid hospital and doctors fees, and saw that he had his clergy before he died. I could not obtain the address of his people, he died so quickly. He told me his people lived near Charlottetown. He was a man about five feet, nine inches in height and weighed about two hundred pounds. I think he told me his father's name was Patrick Kelly, and that his father was Irish and his mother Scotch. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Landlords Resolve.

DUBLIN, Dec. 13. At a conference of landlords a delegation was appointed to submit to the Government that the landowners of Ireland were entitled to compensation for losses sustained through the action of the Government in reducing rents to a greater extent than justified, by economical causes, depriving the landowners of a revisionary interest into the occupancy of the soil, lessening the reliable receivable value of judicial rents, depriving the landowners of the right to obtain the best rent a solvent tenant is able to pay in the open market. The delegation will claim the landowners entitled to a direct pecuniary grant.

Police Investigation.

MONTREAL, Dec. 13. Before Judge Desnoyes to-day, the investigation into charges against Fahey, Neagle and Bureau was continued with closed doors. Detective Maxwell gave details as to admissions made by Fahey and Neagle and as to visits made by him to different places in his capacity as the "Kid" who was to crack different safes. Some doubt is expressed as to who Detective Wilson is. Fahey says he is not the man he represents himself to be and his record will not bear investigation. Fahey still claims that he is being persecuted.

French Politics.

PARIS, Dec. 13. President Carnot's message was submitted to the Chambers to-day. He advocates a policy of concord and appeasement, and urges the adoption of practical reforms for the improvement of the finances. He says the Chambers, in assisting the Government, will execute a programme which will give Europe the precious pledge of France's ardent desire to contribute to the consolidation of general peace, and facilitate the development of good foreign relations.

Murder Will Out.

TRURO, Dec. 13. The boy Robert Welsh, aged 14 years, has been committed for trial at the Supreme Court for killing Clifford at Truro, and Mrs. Kent, Clifford's paramour, who advised the boy to mix the shot with salt, and fire, has been jailed as an accessory.

Obituary.

HALIFAX, Dec. 13. Patrick Ryan died on board the steamer Bonavista this morning from Panama fever, contracted at Aspinwall. He was one of the crew of the brig, Delia, wrecked in the West Indies, and was brought home via Aspinwall.

British Parliament.

LONDON, Dec. 13. The Cabinet has decided to re-assemble Parliament February 7th. The Government will try to limit the debate on the Address in reply to the Queen's speech to one week.

Charges Dropped.

PARIS, Dec. 13. The court arrangement has pronounced that no case is established against M. Wilson, and the charges have been dropped.

Civic Election.

BOSTON, Dec. 13. The mayoralty contest to-day resulted in the re-election of Mayor O'Brien for another term.

Weather Bulletin.

TORONTO, Dec. 13-14 a. m. Winds mostly westerly, fair weather; not much change in temperature.

Reformatory Notice.

The members of the committee which was formed some time ago to promote the establishment of an Industrial School, or Reformatory, in Charlottetown, are still impressed with the urgent necessity of such an institution; but up to the present date only a small sum, now in the Savings Bank, has been collected towards the necessary funds for commencing operations. The Bank book being in Mrs. Edward Palmer's possession. The local Government has already provided a certain amount in this direction, to be appropriated by the Stipendiary Magistrate at his discretion, when youthful offenders are brought before him. Donations to this fund, sent in from various parts of the Island, would, with the above named sums, quickly establish this much needed and inexpensive enterprise. During the winter months there are always idle tradesmen and women to be found, who could, for a small amount, teach these boys and girls various useful occupations, which ought to include some branches of housework. Will the true-hearted Philanthropists, scattered throughout the Island, think this matter over, and so far as lies in their power promote its success?
