Labour Problems

The Canadian Congress of Labour in annual meeting at Montreal took a special look at the employment picture in the Farm Implement Industry and decided to appoint a special Council to work with Government and Industry for a solution to the problem.

Federation Meetings

In view of the fact that participation in the Pool is optional it is highly important that growers be given every opportunity to obtain information which will enable them to make a considered decision as to the advantages or disadvantages of the proposed marketing set-up.

The recent announcement that the Railways decided to reduce freight rates for the fall months and eliminate refrigerator Car charges on potatoes should be welcome news to both shippers and producers.

Butter Surplus

From time to time a section of the press gives the impression that Canada and its tax payers are about to be swamped in a sea of butter, actually on Sept. 1st, there was on hand in this country 115 million pounds or slightly over 7 pounds for each citizen, hardly a serious condition with consumption and production, rapidly approaching a balance.

Ninety Cents Per Hour

Ninety cents per hour is not an uncommon rate of pay for many workers and to satisfy our curiosity we have applied this rate to 10,000 farm workers at ten hours a day and find that it would amount to over \$3 million dollars per year.

Added to this should of course be interest, depreciation, cost of supplies, and equipment, and the numerous other items which go into the Farm Business.

At some future date we plan to do a more exact calculation to establish the average return of farm workers, at the moment we would hazard the guess that 10 cents per hour might be closer than 90 cents.

October is the month set aside by the Dairy Industry to publicize the value of Cheese and promote its consumption. That the program has been effective is borne out by the steadily increasing per capita consumption from year to year.

Cheese is a most excellent food product which could have much wider use than it now enjoys, consumers are invited to become better acquainted with its goodness and value during the October Cheese Festival.

\$60.00 Per Car

Reductions in freight rates and elimination of reefer charges will mean a difference of approximately \$60.00 on a Car moving from Charlottetown to Toronto. This charge amounts to 8 cents per bushel and will be an important factor in selling Island Potatoes in central Canadian Markets.

Farm Forum

It is not too soon for farm people to start thinking about getting their Farm Forum organized and under-way by November 2nd. Already the Burlington Farm Forum has undertaken to act as a Pre-testing group in order that the National Office will have guidance in setting up study material and discussion questions.

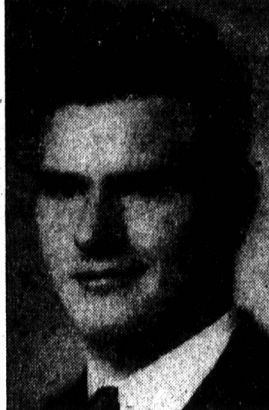

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RUSSELL LEO McDONALD

The many friends of Russell McDonald, North Wiltshire were shocked to hear of his sudden and tragic death, as a result of a drowning accident on Hay Lake in Northern British Columbia. Russell was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dominic McDonald, New Wiltshire and had gone West some six years ago. Russell became the victim of a drowning accident early in July, when a small boat, in which he was rowing over-turned and as he was unable to swim, drowned. The boat was later found overturned and with a broken oarlock. It was learned that on the day he rowed across the lake, there was a strong head-on wind which made the boat very difficult to handle, and it eventually capsized.

A search party got under way immediately and spent several days dragging the lake, but without success. Later a R. C. M. P. plane joined the search and was successful in discovering the body.

The funeral was held in Quesnel, B. C. where requiem mass was celebrated by Rev. R. Cain, C. S. S. R. who also performed the rights at the grave.

Russell was married in May of this year to the former Helen Kemila, of Saskatchewan, and was of a jovial disposition and well liked by all who knew him.

Previous to his going West he worked on the Parish farm at Vernon River where his uncle, Rt. Rev. Maurice McDonald was parish Priest.

He leaves to mourn his sorrowing wife also his bereaved parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dominic McDonald. Six brothers and four sisters, the brothers are Maurice, Kellya Cross, Frank James and Louis, in Vancouver, Stephen in Toronto and Leonard at home. The sisters are Mrs. John P. McQuaid, Green Bay, Mrs. Blscom, and Doris both of Halifax and Mrs. Johnston in Toronto.

The mass cards and letters of sympathy received by his parents testify to the esteem in which he was held by his many friends and neighbours.
