Will Establish War Supply Bd.

OTTAWA, Sept. 13.—(CP)—Purchases of munitions and other war supplies will be handled immediately by a "War Supply Board" one department being required. Passage of a bill in the House of Commons to create a Department of Munitions and Supply.

Prime Minister Mackenzie King said the board would be appointed by Order-in-Council under the War Measures Act and in the event a department being required the bill authorizing it would be proclaimed.

The War Supply Board or in the alternative the Department of Munitions and Supply will replace the defence purchasing board created at the last session of Parliament. That board said Mr. Mackenzie King was set up for peacetime conditions.

Executive powers provided for the Minister of Munitions and Supply drew mild objection from Conservative Leader R. J. Manion who suggested the Minister would be able to nationalize all industry in Canada. He questioned whether or man should have so much power.

Queen's Smile Like a Dream

LONDON, Sept. 12.—Catherine Cripps recovered consciousness in a hospital after being knocked down by a bus.

She opened her eyes and saw Queen Elizabeth standing over her. The Queen smiled. Miss Cripps thought she was dreaming.
