Grey Cup goes home to Toronto

Flutie named game Most Valuable Player

For many years, the main topic of discussion in the pregame show for the Grey Cup was the weather. The Fog Bowl, the Mud Bowl, and the Snow Bowl, all live in infamy in the memories of many Canadian Football fans. That was not the case for Sunday's game in Edmonton. The weather was fine and the crowd was awesome. The third largest attendance at a Grey Cup game made plenty of noise, mostly for the Saskatchewan Roughriders, who were the underdogs coming into the game versus the Toronto Argonauts.

The Argonauts won 47-16.

The Argonauts were heralded as possessing the best defence in the league, and performing in front of a hostile crowd against a team that had momentum on its side. The Saskatchewan Roughriders actually came into the post season play with a losing record, and they would become the first CFL team in the modern era to have the losing record and win the coveted trophy.

The game started off quite well for the Riders in the West as Shannon Baker returned the opening kickoff 74 yards and was well within Argonaut territory. They capitalized with a field goal and jumped to a three point lead. That would be the only lead that Saskatchewan would have for the rest of the game as Doug Flutie took over and dominated the offensive side of play.

Two consecutive touchdowns by Flutie catapulted Toronto into the lead and they would never look back. Some frustrations did show very early on by Roughrider players as a few confrontations interrupted play. But when it came to business never usual, the Argonauts controlled the offensive and, most importantly, the defensive end.

By the end of the first half, "Mr. November", Saskatchewan quarterback Reggie Slack, led a quick and efficient offensive strike as runningback Daniels scored on a much needed touchdown. They then attempted a two point conversion but failed. That said it all for the underdog team from Regina. The two teams went into the locker room at the half with Toronto taking a convincing lead, but the Roughriders looked poised to strike.

However, punt returns were the name of the game and Toronto's special teams ran away with the win as the Argo's Smith scored a touchdown at the beginning of the second half. After that, Doug Flutie punished Saskatchewan's poor defence and gained the MVP honours for the third time with three touchdowns as proof of his dominance.

The game may not have been exciting, but seeing the turnout from the fans is an optimistic sign that the Canadian Football League will remain a national characteristic at least for another year.
