

# S'ide Co-op Ass'n Ltd. Holds Annual Meeting

A net profit of more than \$22,000 on sales of over half a million dollars for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1955, was revealed in the financial statement of the Summerside Co-operative Association Ltd. at their annual banquet attended by upwards of 250 persons last evening in the Baptist Church hall in Summerside.

The meeting gave approval to a recommendation of the board of directors to pay 5 per cent interest on members' share capital, and a 5 per cent rebate of 5 per cent on the amount spent by the members at the co-operative. A further recommendation of the directors that this money be paid to the members in cash was also approved.

The meeting elected Mrs. Arnold Simpson, of Lot 16, as the first woman member on the board of directors of this co-operative, and three other members elected to the board for a three-year term were Edmund Gallant, Miscouche (re-elected); Sterling Miller, Kelvin; and Wm. Cairns, Free-town. Following the general meeting the directors met and Brent Clark and Vernon Mathew of Summerside were re-elected president and secretary, respectively, while Colin Waugh of Wilnot was named vice-president.

Other members of the board of directors in addition to those named are: James Marchbank, New Annan; Edward Harrington, Summerside; Leo Farrell, Lot 16; Wyman Cairns, Wilnot; and Emery Lyle, Linkletter Road.

The financial statement presented last night showed that net sales of groceries, meat, produce, eggs, feed, and equipment during the year amounted to \$560,726.78 of which \$22,053.33 remained as net profit.

A comparative balance sheet for the four years the co-operative has been in business showed that while assets have increased in that period from \$49,000 to \$67,000, liabilities have decreased from \$25,000 to \$700, and in this period net profit has risen steadily from \$2,000. In the first 10 1-2 months of business to \$22,053.33 for the past fiscal year.

The meeting was addressed by Mr. W. R. Shaw, and by Rev. J. D. Nelson MacDonald, pastor of Trinity United Church, Hallifax. Both speakers dealt with various aspects of the theme of co-operation as a way of life.

Brief congratulatory remarks on the success of the Summerside Co-operative were also voiced by Mr. Arlington Mair of Maritime Co-operative Services in Moncton.

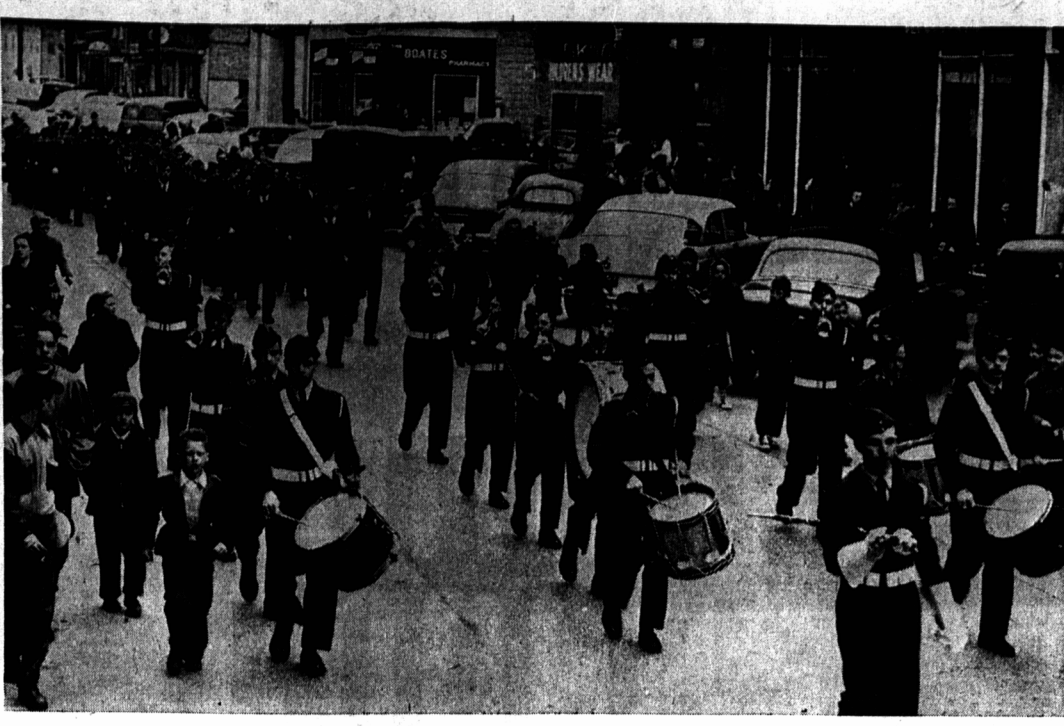
