

Walter Rosecroft Grabs \$2,000 Monctonian Race

MONCTON (CP)—Walter Rosecroft, fleet nine-year-old black pacer, streaked from the back stretch Wednesday night to win the second heat of the \$2,000 Monctonian free-for-all going away.

The Rosecroft horse dusted the oval in 2:05 2-5 and captured the free-for-all stakes with the best performance in the two-dash event. He finished second to Mighty Lee in the first dash.

Hal's Man and Mighty Lee, the early leaders, willed under Walter Rosecroft's sizzling stretch run and finished second and third respectively in a photo finish.

About 4,500 persons spilled \$20,000 through the pari-mutuel windows in free-for-all betting. Walter Rosecroft paid \$10.40 to win, \$3.00 to place and \$2.10 to show in the second heat.

Mighty Lee gave backers \$4.20 to win, \$3.00 to place and \$2.10 to show in the first event. The Prince Edward Island horse had the best time of the event with a 2:05 3-5 in the first heat.

The fleet six-year-old room gelding, driven by George Callbeck, came within one-fifth of a second of the track record held

jointly by the Halifax L. and G. Stable's Dave Gratton, and Convaire, owned by Francis Breaux of Moncton. Mighty Lee is owned by Rankin MacLaine of Charlottetown, and Willard MacDonald of Summerside, P.E.I.

The Island horse's time was the best registered on Maritime tracks this season. His all-time mark is 2:04 1-5.

Walter Rosecroft, owned by Spurge Horseman of Moncton, finished second. Hal's Man, owned by Valley Stables of Florenceville, N.B., came home third, and stablemate Hal's Mae finished fourth.

Dave Gratton, who established the record time in winning the Monctonian three years ago, finished a disappointing fifth. His driver was Lloyd Walker. Joseph Clansman, owned and driven by George Turner of Dartmouth, N.S., came home sixth and Just Betty's Mark, owned by Mrs. J.D. Seaman of Charlottetown and driven by Don Seaman, trailed the field.

Each heat of the Monctonian is worth \$1,000 to the winner. If each heat produces a different winner the horse with the best summary goes into the record book as the winner of the event.

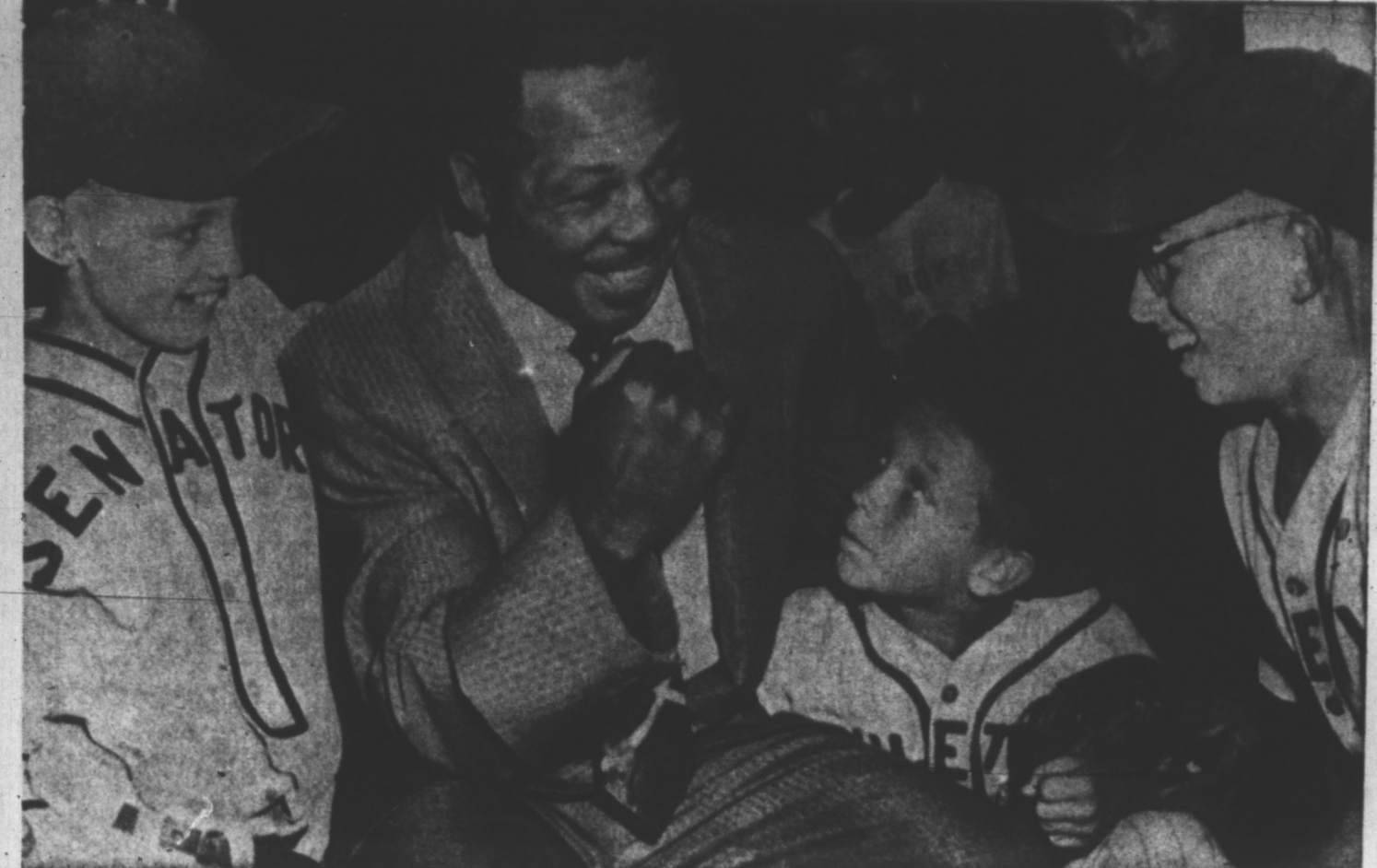

Racing Card To Highlight Lobster Carnival Tonight

The first of two big harness racing cards which are a top feature of Summerside's Lobster Carnival will be held this evening at the Raceway with the first dash of the nine-dash card going at 7:30 sharp.

The second of what should prove to be two high grade cards will be held Saturday night.

The feature racing this evening will be the AA trot and pace although any of the dashes could easily steal the show because of the talent entered.

The AA trot and pace will have six starters which will include Vivien M., Cathy Clegg, May S. Gratton, Raven-Abbe, Blake Hanover and Sky Prince. Pari-mutuel bettors will have a difficult time picking a winner from this sextet which will be aiming for a purse of \$275 per dash.

Other double dash events are the B trot, each dash worth \$200; C pace at \$175 and the D pace at \$150. Also going in a single dash D pace with at least eight entries running for a purse of \$150.

This is but the second race card of the season at Summerside. The first was held on Dominion Day and attracted a crowd of well over 3,000. Officials are looking to an equal turnout tonight.

The Saturday night card will be featured by a two-dash trot and pace with six starters. They include Nell's Lad, Lady Lakeburn, who Tuesday night trotted the fastest mile of the season in the Maritimes in 2:06-Royal Onyx, Mr. Rock, Ann's Dream, and Betty French.

World Series In New Park If Giants Win

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—If the surprising San Francisco Giants take the National League pennant, you can bet they'll play their world series games in the new 42,500 seat Candlestick Park.

This was the word Wednesday from club president Horace Stoneham's office.

"We are very confident the new stadium will be ready for the world series and possibly, it will be open for our last home stand in September," a club spokesman said.

"There is no question, if we get in the world series, we will play there."

The management, paying relatively little heed at the moment to series talk, is trying to speed the move from the Giants' cramped 22,000-seat Seals Stadium in time for the 18-game home stretch series starting Sept. 2.

They play every team in the league in this window. Gate receipts might well be fattened by a pennant fight running right up to the end of the season.

The 5th annual Maritime championship track and field meet will be held Saturday afternoon at the Queen Elizabeth Park here with athletes from every part of the Maritimes and one from the United States entered.

A field of between 50 and 60 competitors is expected to take part in the meet which gets underway at 1:15 rain or shine.

Thus far entries have been received from the navy, RCAF, Highland Games Society in Antigonish, Moncton, Amherst, Sackville, Kentville, Saint John, Charlottetown and numerous other points.

Back to defend his record in the discus will be Sandy Patterson of Boston.

Summerside officials are hopeful that Glace Bay's Joe Mullins, Maritime champion in the quarter and half-mile events will be in attendance. However, Mullins may be taking part in the Pan-American trials being held at Winnipeg Saturday. Mullins competed this week in the Highland Games at Antigonish.

Other competitors will be Peter Watson of the RCN who holds the meet's 440 and 880 records; Joe Richard of Lancaster, N.B., in the five mile and Gerald MacDonald in the pole vault.

Director of the meet is Vaughan Groom. It is being sponsored by the Rotary Club of Summerside and is sanctioned by the P.E.I. branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada.

Following are the events to be held:

Senior men:—100 and 220 yard dashes; 440, 880-yard, one mile and five-mile runs; 120-yard hurdles; high jump, broad jump, hop-step-jump, pole vault, shot put, javelin, discus and one-mile relay.

Junior men under 20 years:—100 and 220-yard dashes; 440 and 880-yard runs.

This column passes along its congratulations to the genial colonel and expresses the hope that he will grab many more victories with his trotter and pacer.

ALL ISLAND ROADS lead to Summerside this week where the western capital is staging its annual Lobster Carnival. Two of the leading features of the four-day carnival will be racing early tonight and Saturday and the Maritime championship track and field meet slated for Queen Elizabeth Park Saturday afternoon.

Crowds likely to equal the 3,000 that turned out for the Dominion Day program are thought a sure bet to take in both cards and the track meet is shaping up as one of the best yet as athletes from all parts of the Maritimes set their sights on the meet's records. No doubt several will be broken before sunset Saturday night.

SUMMERSIDE OFFICIALS are hoping that Joe Mullins of Glace Bay will be a competitor in the 440 and 880. Mullins holds Maritime records in each event and is considered by those who are supposed to know such things as the finest quarter and half-miler in the Dominion.

However, Mullins may have a date in Winnipeg where the trials for the Pan-American games slated for Chicago are being held Saturday. It is not known yet whether Joe will be taking them in or not.

Alfred Groom of Summerside, Maritime pole vault champion, may also be attending the trials and therefore could not compete at Summerside.

Mullins will be going to the trials under something of a cloud, not certain whether or not he will make the Canadian team even though he racks up the best times of any Canadian in each meet. Mullins got himself into the position by winning some months ago that the brass accompanied Canadian athletes to the 1959 British Empire Games were somewhat incompetent.

SIX MONTHS AGO in a quote heard across the nation Mullins said: "The Canadian team was the most poorly organized at Cardiff. Officials were incompetent. They spent more time in the reception parlours than they spent taking care of their athletes... They didn't have a clue about anything."

Joe's remark followed criticism levelled at him by Bob Osborn, general manager of the team at Cardiff. Osborn told a meeting of the Amateur Athletic Union in Vancouver that during the games he had felt obliged to tell one eastern track athlete his conduct had been such that he would not again be considered for a Canadian team. The "eastern track athlete" turned out to be Mullins and Joe, attending the University of Nebraska on an athletic scholarship, then gave his now famous opinion of the Canadian officials.

After this the verbal battle went into high gear. Mullins was supported in his views by two other members of the team and in the onslaught Bob Adams, coach of the team, was declared incompetent.

NOW BOB OSBORN is again general manager of the Canadian team going to Chicago and Bob Adams is a member of the selection committee that will give the final green light to team members.

It would seem that Mullins' chances of making the trip to Chicago are slim indeed.

However, the other day Osborn said: "I have no doubt Mullins is running well enough to be on the team. If the national track and field committee and the AAU approve him, I am not going to initiate any action to keep him out."

Said Neil Farrell of Hamilton, chairman of the committee which will recommend the athletes to be named to the Canadian team: "If Mullins earns a place on the team at the trials, he will be picked, as far as I am concerned."

CBC's Final Bid For Title Bout Is Rejected

MONTEAL (CP)—Eddie Quinn, promoter of the Archie Moore-Yvon Durelle light-heavyweight title fight, said Wednesday he has rejected the CBC's "final offer" of \$50,000 to televise the July 29 fight with no black-out.

Quinn said he has sent this telegram to Allan Gilroy of the CBC sports department in Toronto:

"Your final offer really does not deserve an answer; it is so ridiculous. Thanks but no thanks."

In latest negotiations between Quinn and the CBC the promoter asked for \$50,000 with no black-out but with the CBC paying for unsold seats in Montreal Forum.

Quinn said he can't afford to do otherwise, permitting television in this area, "because people will stay at home to see the fight."

Jockey Suffers Fatal Injury

BUENOS AIRES (AP)—Juan Pedro Artigas, Argentina's foremost jockey, was battered to death Thursday seconds after winning a race when his frightened mount sped 350 yards beyond the finish line, banging the rider's head against the fence posts or rail all the way.

Artigas, up on San Matias, had triumphed by three lengths in the mile and seven-furlong feature at San Isidro Park. When the jockey began pulling up on his mount, the horse flung back its head, striking Artigas on the forehead.

Apparently knocked unconscious, the jockey slid from the saddle but his foot caught in the stirrup. His head was smashed against virtually every post in the next 350 yards before San Matias was caught.
