

## "Edna" Affected Wood Island Traffic

Passengers traffic via the Wood Islands-Caribou Ferry during the month of September 1954 has shown decrease of 632 compared to the same period last year. A decrease of 77 in autos and 121 in trucks is also reported.

Some of the decrease is attributed to the recent hurricane Edna which occurred on a busy week-end.

The total number of passengers, autos and trucks with last year's figures in brackets are as follows: Passengers 11,351 (11,984); autos 2,206 (2,283); trucks 964 (967).
