Demand For Steel In U.S. Continues High
CLEVELAND (AP) — Increasing equipment expansion in all segments of U. S. industry is helping to keep steel demand high despite cuts in automobile production, Steel magazine says.
Right now, says Steel, "it looks like new plant and equipment expenditures will approach \$35,000,000,000 in 1956, compared with a peak of only \$32,000,000,000 in 1955."
Steel says the crane, hoist and monorail industries look for a 10-to-15-per-cent rise in sales this year, giving credit to expansion programs.
Most responsible for steel demand through expansion programs are the steel industry, roadbuilding programs and the automotive industry, Steel says.
"Demand for expansion materials is also helping to cushion the effect of reduced needs for auto parts. Parts makers are maintaining output for replacement needs of auto parts, but diversifying some production into construction machinery, building, hardware, heavy truck, aircraft, foundry, railroad and farm equipment lines."
The magazine urges the steel industry to start building up its inventories "as protection in event of a steelworkers' strike or a production drop resulting from summer vacations."
"Inventories are modest," Steel says. "In the last 14 months, users have added just about enough for 17 days of consumption at current rates."

Manufacturing Is Canada's Top Field Of Employment
OTTAWA (CP)—Canada has less than one per cent of the world's population and yet she ranks sixth in the world as a producer of manufactured goods.
Manufacturing industries now are Canada's most important field of employment and income, says Dr. O. J. Firestone, the trade department's economic adviser in measuring Canada's industrial growth over the last half-century.
One out of every four Canadians works in these industries and these employees earn one out of every three dollars that make up Canada's national income.
In his survey, published in the department's foreign trade magazine, Dr. Firestone estimated gross value of manufacturing rose to some \$17,785,000,000 in 1955 from \$84,000,000 in 1900.
EARN HIS PAY
Currently, the average factory worker turns out about \$13,000 worth of goods a year. If the cost of materials and supplies is excluded, the average worker adds more than \$6,000 a year to the net value of manufacturing.
Average wages have more than doubled in the half-century and average hours of work have declined to 41 hours a week in 1953 from 57 in 1900.
Little for export
Canadian factory workers have produced mainly for Canadians. About 85 per cent of plant production is consumed in Canada and only 15 per cent exported.
But it takes a lot of capital to keep workers employed. It takes more than \$4,000 worth of plant and equipment to keep one worker employed in manufacturing, Dr. Firestone estimated.
"Capital requirements in real terms per worker in Canada have increased by about one-half in the last 53 years. This means that industry planning to expand in Canada has to allow for continuously growing requirements per worker."

N.Y. Stock Market Up To New All-Time Peaks During Week
NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market rode up to all-time peaks last week on the heaviest trading in six months.
Brokers attributed the continued advance in part to a rapidly brightening business picture, plus an assortment of favorable corporate developments. There also were new reports of tight supply, great demand and higher prices in the copper and steel industries. Signs of inflation popped up in other fields too.
The Associated Press average of 60 stocks rose \$3.10 on the week and closed at \$188.50, just 10 cents under the latest historic high recorded Thursday. The market had notched up five all time highs in six sessions before encountering limited profit-taking on Friday.
The week's trading climbed to 15,427,675 shares, the biggest total since the 21,693,460 shares in the week ended Sept. 30, 1955, following President Eisenhower's heart attack.
Canadian issues were mixed over the five-day period. Higher values in the New York stock exchange were Aluminum Ltd., up 1/2 at 120%, Hudson's Bay Mining up 3/4 at 72 and International Nickel up 3/4 at 90. Lower issues included Distillers Seagram off 1/4 at 38 1/2, Molybdenite off 1/4 at 2, Molybdenite off 1-16 at 15, Fargo Oil up 1-16 at 2 3-16, Great Sweet Grass Oil up 1-16 at 5 11-16 and Shawinigan Mines—unsold for two weeks—closed at 72 1/2, up 3/4 from its closing price of Feb. 24. Lower were Preston East Dome Oils off 1/4 at 6 13-16, Jupiter Oils off 1/4 at 2 7-16, Sapphire Petroleum off 1/4 at 3 1/2, Scurry-Rainbow Oil off 1-16 at 2 1/2, Wilbur Petroleum remained unchanged for the fourth straight week at 1/2.

Halifax Contractor Dies At Age 76
HALIFAX (CP)—Alexander McDonald, former president and general manager of the McDonald Construction Company died here Sunday in the hospital he built.
The week's stock exchange included contractor, known throughout the province as "Big Alex", was 76. The projects of the East Bay, N.S., native included the Halifax Infirmary, Pier Two in Halifax, the city's Capitol Theatre, St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish and St. Joseph's Hospital in Glace Bay.

Sales of Shares In Royal Bank
MONTREAL (CP)—The Royal Bank of Canada Friday night announced that 840,000 shares of stock will be offered at \$36 to shareholders, other than those living in the United States.
James Muir, president of the bank, said shareholders will be offered one share for each five they hold March 20. He said the purpose of the issue "is to bring the shareholders' equity more in line with the volume of business transacted and with the total assets and liabilities of the bank, total assets having increased nearly \$400,000,000 during the past 18 months."
Sale of the shares will bring the capital account to \$50,400,000 and the rest account to 131,040,000 and the bank said. The last issue of shares was in 1954, when 700,000 were sold.
Shares are not being offered in the United States since the new issue is not registered under the U.S. Securities Act, which would require the bank to supply more information than is needed in Canada, the statement said. Shareholders in the U.S. will be given subscription rights which they may sell.
JAP MINES IDLE
TOKYO (Monday) (AP) — Japan's coal industry was brought to a standstill today by a strike of 160,000 coal miners demanding a wage increase. The strike will affect 54 coal mines and result in loss of 83,000 tons of coal a day.
